ABBESIDE BRIDGE

It seems that some members of Dungarvan Urban Council have come under pressure since the Council approved the proposals of the County Council to demolish the old hump-back bridge over the Colligan at Abbesside and replace it with a new bridge of modern design. They want to hold on to the past and see no change.

There has been a great deal of sentimental chit-chat about architectural beauty, English Portland stone, the heritage of the Duke of Devonshire and the old traditions of sitting on the bridge and looking dreamily across the harbour to Helwick.

The point has been made too that the old bridge is still structurally sound and does not constitute a traffic hazard.

I have held from the beginning that the best proposition is a new wide bridge which will enable pedestrians and cyclists to cross it without the fear of being crushed by one of the huge articulated vehicles (they get bigger every day) which pound across there in dozens every day, a bridge which will give a full view to traffic from both ends and one which in width will accommodate the heavy traffic which it has to handle.

And if you stand on the bridge now (at the risk of your life) you can only gaze on a dirty quay which will surely inspire no sentiments about red sails and little fishing boats.

I still believe a new, wide modern bridge is the best proposition here.

MACRA NA TUATHIE SILVER JUBILEE

Co Waterford Macra na Tuaithe Club leaders will be strongly represented at the organisation's three-day annual Conference in Galway this coming week-end (25th-27th) which coincides with the 25th anniversary of the foundation of the first Macra na Tuaithe branch in Mooncoin, Co Kilkenny in 1952.

Unfortunately, the historic Silver Jubilee coincides with an unprecedented financial crisis in Macra na Tuaithe, now the country's biggest youth organisation with well over 10,000 members.

The Government grant has been pegged at £70,000—the same as last year—for 1977 and the organisation's National Chairman, Fr Joseph Coghlan of Farranree, Co Cork, commented bluntly in a pre-Conference statement, "We are dismayed and disillusioned by this approach and we no longer know or understand the criteria on which such Government decisions are based."

Macra na Tuaithe is now faced with the stark prospect of cutting down on the activities of its 300 clubs unless the Government decision is quickly reversed. Even if the grant merely kept pace with inflation the annual subvention should now be over £90,000.

Despite the current financial crisis, Macra na Tuaithe can, however, look back on a quarter of a century of unparalleled success as a progressive youth organisation inspired with a vision held by the Vocational Schools of extending education beyond the classroom and an ideal of achieving the integration of the development of the individual, the home, and the community.

The group of dedicated workers who helped to found Macra na Tuaithe 25 years ago were convinced of the value of applying the philosophy of self-help to education and learning. Their example continues to inspire those who see voluntary leadership in out-of-school education as a service to others, to their community and to their country.

Waterford played a significant role in the founding of

Macra na Tuaithe One of the earliest clubs was established in Dungarvan. Vocational School in which Mr. Tom Maher provided leadership from the school while Mr. Ned Phelan, Ballyneety was community leader.

AN DAMH-SCOIL SA RINN

The Gaeltacht of Ring swung out of its hibernating slumbers last week-end as hundreds moved in to mark the holding of a Seminar and several "sessions" on singing and music in the "sean-nos," the traditional style so much favoured by several of our native Irish singers.

Lectures were given during the day-light hours by such well-known authorities in this field as Tomas O'Connell, Noreen O'Suilleabhain, Aine Ni Duacaille, Seamus Mac Mathuna and Peadar O'Riada but it was in the evening, and later, that things really began to stir as tin-whistlers, accordion and melodeon players (not forgetting the bodhrans), with flute and banjo players joined together to belt out the best of Irish music.

The sean-nos singing was rendered at its very best by such singers as Sean Mac Donacha, Josephine Begley, Tomas O Tuama with whom the local champions Ann Mulqueen and Nioclus Toibin more than held their own.

There were sessions each night over the week-end at Tig an Cheoil, at Tessie's and at Tig Mhuirthe and also there was Sean Bon Breathnach of Radio na Gaeltachta picking up the action live, as it happened, with his team.

The Damh-Scoil was sponsored by the County Vocational Education Committee and after this initial success must be headed towards becoming an annual event in the Gaeltacht.

UNIQUE ACHIEVEMENTS OF JACK LYNCH

This is a sub-heading in the ninth chapter of "Cork's Hurling Story" written by Tim Horgan and recently published by Anvil Books Ltd. Under it the author gives a brief but very informative resume of the young life of Jack Lynch who was one of the greats in Cork hurling and football in the early 40s.

The back-ground information given about the man who in the interim has become one of the big names in the political scene in this country, is particularly interesting in this general election year when Jack Lynch will again head Fianna Fail in their effort to return to government.

In the period 1939-1947 Jack Lynch won six consecutive All-Ireland medals which for the soft-spoken Glen Rovers man was a unique achievement. Tim Horgan writes about him as follows: "Born on August 15, 1917, Jack was the son of a Bantry tailor, Dan Lynch, who with his wife, Sarah, raised a family of four boys and two girls in the Shandon district of the city. "We were comfortable enough for the time," recalled Fr Charlie Lynch, the third of the boys in the family. "There was always enough on the table and we were well dressed with our father a tailor."

"Hurling and football were accepted in our house," said Jack "in just the same way as we accepted our Sunday dinner. No one was ever asked to play hurling or football. We just played it and, peculiarly enough, most of that early sport was played beside the graveyard at Shandon, which was almost next door to our house. It was there that my brothers, Theo, Charlie and Finbarr, first got the feel and grip of a hurley. My other brother Jimmy, died before I was born.

"I was only ten years of age when I joined Glen Rovers. I figured out the Glen minor (CONTINUED ON PAGE SIX)

Tragic Death of Dr. Michael E. O'Neill

Not only the people of Dungarvan and district but the people of the entire county were stunned when news of the death of Dr. Michael E. O'Neill, Killooney House, Ballinacorney, Assistant Chief Medical Officer for Waterford under the South Eastern Health Board which occurred with tragic suddenness while on duty in Clonmel became known last Saturday, March 19.

A native of Kiltarney, Co Kerry Dr. O'Neill took up duty under the old Waterford Health Authority over ten years ago having come from Yorkshire and since then a number of the Regional Health Board took over the administration of the health services for the County he was based in Dungarvan.

As Assistant Chief Medical Officer he was responsible for all the public health services in the county, dealing among other things with housing and school medical inspections while one of the fields in which he devoted his time and energy far beyond the call of duty was concerned with mental handicap and the treatment of psychiatric patients. He dealt with the many delicate problems which came his way from day to day with consideration, understanding and a charisma that made him unique.

The work he did in helping to establish St. John's Special School for Handicapped Children in Dungarvan will never really be known nor indeed will so many of the other good works which he always did so quietly and so unobtrusively. At the official opening of the school on Monday February 21 the Minister for Education Mr. Peter Barry paid a special but well-deserved tribute to Dr. O'Neill and to the members of his staff for the wonderful work he had done for the school and for the children from all over the region who were attending at a tribute which Dr. O'Neill courteously accepted with his usual humility. That was less than a month before his death which has now taken him from us with such tragic suddenness and at a time when there was still so much for him to do in the manner in which only he could do it.

He was a man devoted and devoted to his profession, loved by young and old and by all who had the privilege of knowing him. His passing has left us all with a sense of deep personal loss.

To his wife Mrs. Gwen O'Neill, his family of four sons and one daughter and to his sister and other relatives our sincere sympathy is extended. The remains accompanied by a very large and most representative cortege, were removed from St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, on last Sunday evening to Abbesside Parish church where they were received by Very Rev. M. Farrell, P.P. assisted by Rev. N. O'Mahony O.C. and a number of other clergy.

Following Requiem Mass on Monday morning the funeral took place to St. Laurence's Cemetery, Ballinacorney where the interment took place. Very Rev. Fr. Farrell, P.P. officiated at the graveside assisted by Rev. Fr. O'Mahony, O.C. Very Rev. D. O'Brien, P.P. Fourmilewater and Very Rev. P. O'Donnell, O.S.A. St. Augustine's College, Abbesside and a number of other priests.
