





HEARTENING DISPLAY BY WATERFORD

Kilkenny 2-10, Waterford 0-13

Waterford senior hurlers showed a flash of their real hurling ability when they made Kilkenny fight every inch of the way in the A.I.B. senior hurling tournament final at Walsh Park, Waterford on Sunday last.

Kilkenny, who were at full strength were hot favourites to ground an experimental Waterford fifteen but the Deise men had other ideas and they proved conclusively that when the mood takes them, they can match the best in the game.

Waterford led 0-4 at the interval after having played with their strong breeze. Under the circumstances the lead looked anything but safe, but such was Waterford's determination and new found confidence that Kilkenny did not take the lead until four minutes from the end of a hectic second half.

It was at this stage that Waterford's stamina left them down to allow Kilkenny through for two further points, but the result apart Waterford's display was heartening and certainly augurs well for the championship.

Kilkenny were very strong in defence with the fine quarter keeper Noel Skehan, Pat Henderson, Fan Larkin and Brian Coady denied Waterford a much needed goal. Frank Cummins and Liam O'Brien held a slight edge at midfield, and Mick Crotty, Matt Ruth and Eddie Keher were best in a forward division which only found the openings in the final quarter.

Waterford's goalkeeper Ned Power made an auspicious debut to the side while Pat McGrath, John Dalton and Sean Twomey were sound in defence. Paddy Whelan was prominent at midfield and Deolan Fitzpatrick and newcomer Noel Connors were best in an attack which will have to improve on their team work.

MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP FIXTURES

Thurles will be the venue should Cork and Waterford meet in the Munster senior hurling championship semi-final on June 19 next, the provincial council decided at a week-end meeting in Malinbeg, Co. Tyrone.

The Council was obviously anxious that the game would be played at Pairc Uí Caoimh, but Waterford recalled that the home and away agreement between the counties is confined to first round championship fixtures and does not extend to semi-finals.

Waterford fully accepted, however, that they are committed to travelling to Cork for their next two first round championship meetings with Cork.

Meanwhile, Kilkenny will be the venue for Waterford's first round game with Kerry on May 29 and should the Kingdom cause a surprise their semi-final clash with Cork will also be played at Kilkenny on June 19.

In senior football, Kerry will have a home venue for their semi-final meeting with Limerick or Tipperary on July 3 but Cork will have to await the outcome of the Clare and Waterford first round tie to see if they will be at home to Clare at Fermoy in the June 12 semi-final or away to Waterford at Dungarvan on the same date.

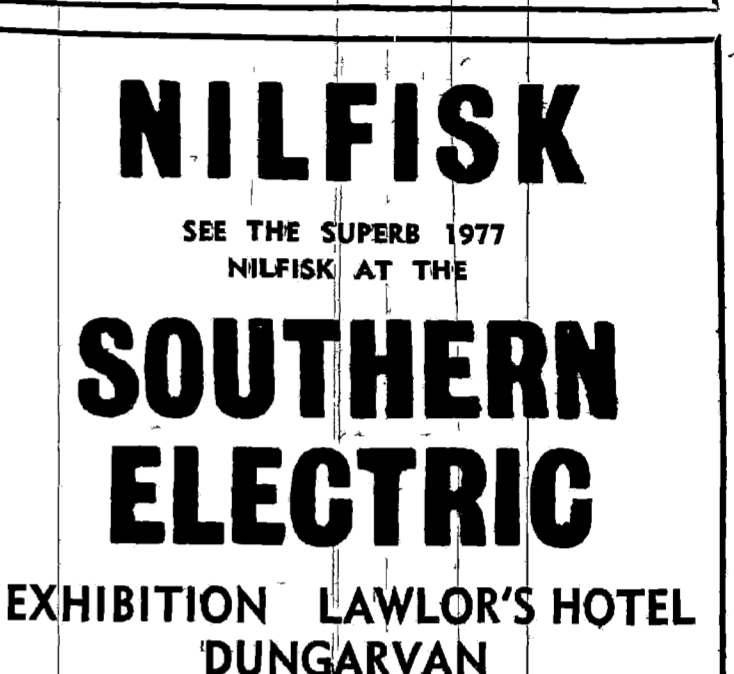

BUILDING LICENCE TENDERS FOR ABBEYSIDE SITE

It was unanimously agreed at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last week that tenders be sought from building contractors and developers for a building licence to erect houses on the Council's 5-acre site at Skeehorne Abbeyside. Discussion on the matter was initiated by a motion proposed by Senator A. Deasy which asked that the land be disposed of as private sites to people wishing to build their own houses.

Cliff T. Wade held that some of the land should be kept for the erection of houses for elderly citizens of Abbeyside. The Co. Manager Mr C. O'Connor said that in regard to the provision of additional houses for senior citizens, a conference was to be held with Department officials and the architect and it was proposed to seek approval for 12 such houses to be erected at Childers Estate in the part originally set aside for a shopping centre. The agreed lay-out for the new scheme to be built at Sheridan's site at Gallowhill would also be discussed he said.

In regard to further proposals for the 5 acres owned by the Council at Abbeyside he pointed out that this was now the only land which the Council had there and no Council houses had been built in Abbeyside since the McCarthyville scheme.

The matter could be approached in three ways, he said: (1) the Council could advertise on a license basis for contractors to tender for the building of houses or (2) a scheme of Council houses could be built, or (3) there could be a mixed development. The difficulty he saw in advertising 6 or 7 sites for private purchases was that these would be faced with a very expensive job as they would have to connect up the sewerage running as far back as the McInerney scheme. He explained the view that the land should be leased for private development and that a building licence be granted by the Council to the highest bidder in respect of the lay-out which would be submitted for approval.

Mr T. Kyme T.D. said that it was unrealistic to think that anyone would build a £10,000 house there if a Council scheme was going to go up close by later on. He said that the only thing to do was to either hold the site for an entire Council scheme or lease it now to private contractors. Finally the Council agreed to seek tenders for building licence for private development of the site.
