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STREET TRADING IN DUNGARVAN

The controversial issue of street trading in Dunganarvan and in particular in the town centre at Grattan Square has come up for discussion at meetings of the local Urban Council several times in the last couple of years. The biggest problem of the issue has centred around the rights which such traders claimed under some of the old charters of the town and the question as to whether the Council could enforce a ban on their operations without running the risk of a law action was never satisfactorily answered.

Now the matter has taken a new turn and there is a real possibility that the traders with their vans and stalls may at last be banished from the Square under the town's Traffic and Parking Bye-laws which were enacted in 1972. The question as to whether the traders could legally claim exemption from the one-hour parking restriction of the Square during business hours was initially mentioned in this column and when the point was raised at a recent Council meeting by Cllr John A. Murphy it was agreed that the opinion of the Council's Law Advisor Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solicitor, should be sought in clarification.

This has now been given and in the course of his letter to the Council on the matter, Mr. Farrell states "I am quite satisfied that Street Traders are not exempt from the one business hour parking regulation referring to Grattan Square, provided of course, that the necessary parking signs are displayed on the Square where they can be seen by any person using the Square for parking purposes and I think that they are so displayed at the moment."

Mr. Farrell goes further and states "In my opinion Street Traders are further prohibited from parking on the Square of all because of Bye-law 6(1)(a) which says that a vehicle may be parked only if it complies with the following conditions, that is to say that it is not a vehicle used in connection with the sale of goods or any service. This, in my opinion, would mean that Street Traders selling from their vans and stalls at any time during business hours on the Square. You will understand that any other motorist could park on the Square for up to one hour and before that hour was up could move to another part of the Square for another hour if he could find a vacant position, but this Bye-law regarding the sale of goods by traders does not apply and therefore such traders are prohibited altogether from parking anywhere on the Square and selling goods from such vehicles."

As the enforcing of the parking bye-laws is a matter for the Garda, Mr. Farrell suggested that the Council might first discuss this aspect with Supt. M. English before making a firm decision in the matter.

When the members of the Council were informed of the Law Advisor's opinion at their last meeting, the Town Clerk, Mr. Bertie White, stated that he had as suggested by Mr. Farrell, been in touch with Supt. English on the matter and the Supt. had informed him that he would first submit the opinion to his own legal advisers for a direction. Supt. English added that as soon as this became available he would inform the Council. As a consequence the Council agreed to defer a decision until the Supt.'s views were made known to them.

The opinion expressed by Mr. Farrell has been welcomed by the traders and business people of the town who have been voicing mounting opposition to the presence of these street traders especially in the town centre and the putting of the position is

Following the closure Clr M. Henery and P. Coffey of Portlaw raised the matter at meetings of Waterford County Council pointing out the inconvenience caused to employees at Portlaw tannery who were forced to make long detours to and from work as a result. Their protests were taken up by other local authorities and by local Dail deputies and by the people concerned themselves. The result has been the carrying out of fast emergency repairs and the reopening of the bridge some weeks ahead of the time forecast.

However it would appear that the problem is not yet entirely solved as CIE feel that they should not now be burdened with the maintenance costs of the bridge and have in fact approached the Waterford and Kilkenny County Councils on a number of occasions with a view to having it transferred to them. Neither of the Councils would agree to the Board's proposal and the matter rests there at present.

BRIGHT FUTURE

Good news in Dunganarvan last week was the optimism expressed, albeit cautiously, in the annual review by the Chairman of Irish Leathers Ltd who stated that in the current year continued growth in sales and profits was being looked for.

The turnover of the Company for the year ended December 31, 1976 was £19,028,894 as compared with £13,290,187 for the previous year and the pre-tax profit for '76 at £907,532 showed a big increase on the previous year when the figure under this head was £641,167.

The progress of the Irish Leathers Company will be very welcome in Dunganarvan where one of their factories is one of the mainstays of the economy of the town and district. It does, of course, a great deal of steady, well-paid employment.

Announced at the same time was the appointment of Mr. Donald O'Brien as the new Chief Executive of the Irish Leathers Group. Formerly Production Director, Mr. O'Brien has a long association with Dunganarvan and the leather trade and the announcement of his new appointment has been the source of general satisfaction in the locality.

NEW MUSICAL AND CHORAL SOCIETY FOR WATERFORD

After a number of years in which Waterford traditionally found itself without a musical society of its own, while neighbouring towns such as Carrick-on-Suir, New Ross and Clonmel were attracting considerable enthusiasm from Waterford to their various Musical Productions it is heartening to hear news of the formation of a new musical society in the city. It is the Edmund Rice Choral & Musical Society, formed as part of the Mount St. Mary's Pulpit Union activities and based in Mount St. Mary's.

The Society formed last November is already preparing for its production of "H.M.S. Pinafore" which goes on stage in the Theatre Royal Waterford in the next few days. It is the Society's aim to present the city's International Festival of Light Opera in 1978.

Some of the leading parts in "Pinafore" will be played by local artists but thanks to the generous sponsorship of one local based Shipping Company the principal is the Covent Garden Opera House. The fees and expenses will be borne in full by that firm.

The producer of the show is Mrs. Cummins who has had several successes in Clonmel and the Musical Director is Paddy Butler, B.M.S. who teaches in the school in Waterford. We look forward to hearing of the progress of the Edmund Rice Choral & Musical Society and wish them every success.

YOUTH CLUB NEWS

It was announced at the last meeting that steady progress was being made in the plans to form a youth club in Dunganarvan.

Reports were submitted by the sub-committees set up to investigate the acquisition of a premises and also the raising of finance.

The use of a small room for committee meetings has been given by Waterford Co-op, and a large room has been made available to the club by kind permission of Rev. Fr. Carey. It is hoped that the use of these premises will be very beneficial because the general feeling is that to be really successful the club would need a "home" of its own.

The Finance Committee revealed that they are considering several fund-raising activities, details of which will be made known shortly. They have also been promised financial help from Waterford Co-op to whom we are extremely grateful. It is also hoped that other firms, business and people and the public in general will respond generously when the call goes out for help for the venture.

The constitution and planning has yet to be done but with the same spirit and enthusiasm continuing it should not be long before a good Youth Club will be in operation in the town.

HAVE WE LOST OUR IDENTITY

The British magazine "The Economist" in a 15-page survey of the Republic published last week claims that Ireland is a country that has lost an identity and has not, perhaps, as yet found a new one, or at least, one that satisfies the Irish themselves.

Pointing out that in 1961-'66 the population rose by 66,000, in '66-'71 by 94,000 and in 1971-'76 by 185,000 the Economist says that this means that 30,000 industrial jobs need now to be created every year for the next ten years, a prospect which "is enough to strike cold in every politician's heart."

The survey says that despite political independence the Republic is still economically and monetarily linked with Britain and quotes one Irish T.D. as saying "We have as much real independence now as if the Union Jack were flying over the GPO."

The survey covered such things as population, employment and political parties, the budget, foreign investment, mineral resources, emigration, fishing, tourism and the Church and comes up with the conclusion that "Ireland now faces a challenge that only a new dynamism can overcome. It will require big changes in attitudes—to politics, work, even religion—if a relapse into poverty and unmanageable unemployment is to be avoided and there are less than ten years in which to do it."

FIDDOWN BRIDGE

The closure of the old toll bridge over the river Suir at Fiddown by C.I.E. recently drew a storm of protests to such an extent that emergency repairs were pushed ahead and the bridge was reopened again last week ahead of schedule.

As so much publicity followed the closure of the bridge it is of interest to note that it was originally constructed by the Waterford and Limerick Railway Company under an Act passed in 1851 for the purpose of giving access to the railway station at Fiddown. The station, however, was closed in 1964 and the bridge which links Counties Waterford and Kilkenny is now used exclusively for road traffic purposes. C.I.E. are still responsible for the maintenance of the bridge but found it necessary on March 11 to close it to vehicular traffic in the interests of safety and to

THE 1977 LABOUR FORCE SURVEY
GENERAL INFORMATION
