CISTERCIAN PRIEST BECOMES SCOUT History was made at Mount Melleroe recently when a Cistercian priest Rev Fr Francis (Caton) OCSO, a native of Horseleap, Co Offaly, was invested a member of the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland and became an Official Scout Chaplain, in preparation for 'Jamborora 77' which will be held in the grounds of Melleroe in July.

FRANCIS WAS THE last president of the Mount Melleroe Secondary College which was closed some years ago. He joined the Cistercians in 1951, was professed in 1953 and was ordained in 1958. The Chief Scout, Mr Jim Holly, B.E., Waterford County Engineer, Dungarvan, formally invested him, Mr Reg Ryan, director of Jamborora presented his chaplain's epaulettes and Scout Leader Gerard de Vignot of Clontarf, Dublin acted as sponsor. The ceremony took place in the college chapel.

EXTENSIVE FIRE DAMAGE TO DUNGARVAN HOTEL

Two units of Dungarvan Fire Brigade with the assistance of units from three other brigades, Cappagh, Youghal, and Kilmactomas were called out to a fire which caused extensive damage to the Devonshire Arms Hotel, Dungarvan in the early hours of last Tuesday morning.

The alarm was raised shortly after 2 am when a night-shift worker at the nearby Waterford Co-op Creamery, James Malone, spotted flames shooting up from the kitchen, located on the ground floor at the back of the hotel and the Dungarvan brigade and gardai were once alerted that the fire was spreading.

The local brigade were on the scene within minutes but even in that short time the fire had begun to take a firm hold and Station Officer Ned Morrissey at once sent for the assistance of the other 3 brigades.

Sixteen occupants of the hotel including nine guests and six staff were all fortunately got from the blazing building in time, but had to dash out in their night attire all well later accommodated in Lawlor's Hotel next door.

It appears that the fire started in the kitchen as the result of a gas leak and spread up to the first floor and was beginning to creep on to the top floor before it was eventually brought under control. The fire area shows extensive damage which has been estimated to run to between £25,000 and £30,000.

Station Officer Morrissey told a Leader reporter on Tuesday that even when they got to the fire he thought it would be impossible to bring it under control. "Certainly" he said, "if it was only ten minutes later we got there the whole building would have come up."

The members of the Dungarvan Brigade are to be congratulated for their immediate response to the blaze as it was this and in the manner in which they subsequently fought the blaze assisted by the other brigades that saved the building from being completely burned out.

NOMINATED TO FILL VACANCY ON COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE The vacancy on the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture caused by the recent resignation of Mr Tom Foley Knockrook Stradbally has been filled by another Stradbally man, Mr Tom Foley.

The decision was made by unanimous approval at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday when the proposal to select Mr Foley as a replacement was agreed. Mr Foley is a member of the Fianna Fail and was nominated by Mr Kieran O'Riain who is the present Chairman of the Committee of Agriculture and seconded by Mr Michael Henery.

Senator Austin Deasy speaking on behalf of Fine Gael said that they were not contesting the vacancy as they wished to support the situation under which Fianna Fail did not contest the last vacancy when a Fine Gael member had resigned.

Mr Frankie King said that the Labour Party did not wish to contest the matter either and the Chairman, Mr O. Curran, then declared Mr Cunningham unanimously selected.

G.A.A. NOTES
SURVIVAL AS HURLING
COUNTY THREATENED - BUT
WATERFORD WILL WIN

(By Commentator)
WATERFORD v KERRY
Only a few years ago, a
meeting with Kerry in hurling
would have aroused very little
interest and only the real pes-
simists would give Kerry an
outside chance of winning.
Now all that has changed and
on Sunday next Waterford will
travel to Kilmarny with noth-
ing more than a fifty-fifty
chance of getting through to a
Munster semi-final meeting
with Cork on the third Sunday
in June.

The change is explained by
the fact that Waterford's hurl-
ing stock has declined consid-
erably and hurling in Kerry
has improved immeasurably
over four or five years.
Last year, Kerry won the
junior All-Ireland title and ran
Galway dangerously close in
the championship. On last
Sunday week at Abbeydorney in
a tournament, Kerry defeated
Galway and in doing so scored
no less than nineteen points.
When we played Galway in
the National League a few
months ago the final score was
2-17 to 1-0. In an earlier
round of the league we could
manage only three points
against Limerick.

Those who have analysed the
situation are agreed that our
hurling decline is due entirely
to our low scoring potential. In
support of this it can be point-
ed out that in our last five
matches not more than two
goals were conceded in any
game. These include league
games against Limerick and
Galway and the A.I.B. tourna-
ment final against Kilkenny.

It would, therefore appear to
be a case of strengthening our
attack and everything will be
fine again. A simple solution,
if the material can be found.
The selectors believe that the
material has been found and
that Seanie Hannon as corner-
forward with Tom Casey, Dun-
hill and Nick Connors, Passage
both brought on to the half-
forward line can generate
more scoring power. With
Declan Fitzpatrick, the county's
top scorer, Martin Hickey and
Jim Greene this could be the
answer to the big problem.

Overall the team shows six
