ELECTION '77

The date for the general
election has been set and
nominations will close at 12
(noon) on Saturday next, June
4. Election fever is mounting
and although the campaign
will be a brief one the pace
is accelerating fast and there
should be plenty of fireworks
before we reach polling day
in a fortnight's time on
Thursday, June 16.

The parties have all pub-
lished their election mani-
festoes and as usual, promises,
promises, promises are the
order of the day. But as one
well-known local humorist re-
marked to me the people are
laughing already at these
promises as they know that
many of them are being made
simply to be broken. Of
course that's what politics is
all about, though, wooing the
public to win their votes by
whatever means is thought
best.

As I say the promises will
be showered upon us in the
next fortnight and before pol-
ling day if we were to believe
them all we could well expect
to be given the sun, moon and
stars but all that is only in
the heat of the moment and
should not be taken too
seriously. When the votes
have all been cast and count-
ed when the victories and
defeats have been recorded
and when the next govern-
ment takes over, everything
will return to normal and
certain amount of amnesia
will set in. Remember politics
is supposed to be the science
of the possible and what seems
to be possible to-day need not
necessarily be so to-morrow.

But whatever about that let
us hope that the campaign
will be fought clean and fair
and that there will be no mud-
slinging or personal attacks
indulged in by or on any of
the candidates.

A LADY IN THE RACE
Principal news in this con-
stituency during the week was
that the National Executive of
Fianna Fail at their meeting
in Dublin last Monday night
decided to add the name of
Clr. Ra. O'Brien, Dungarvan
to the three candidates al-
ready selected by the Party's
Constituency Convention held
in Dungarvan a little more
than a fortnight ago.

Mrs. O'Brien who occupies
the Chair of the local Urban
Council this year only came
on the political scene at the
last local elections but she has
moved up the field very much
since and has been elected to
the Select Committee of 15
which forms part of the
Fianna Fail National Executive
in the last two years. Her bid
at the Constituency Conven-
tion to win one of the three
nominations showed that she
has succeeded in gaining a
great deal of support from
the various Cumairn in the
Dail Ceanntar area and in the
end she was only narrowly
beaten.

Since the Convention there
has been quite a deal of
behind-the-scenes activity as
Mrs. O'Brien and her sup-
porters sought to get the
agreement of the National
Executive to nominate her as
a fourth candidate. There
were those within the party
who were of opinion that three
runners would be enough but
Mrs. O'Brien seems to have
put up a more convincing case
to the Executive and so has
won the nomination. I under-
stand that one of the main
arguments in favour of Mrs.
O'Brien's nomination was that
there was only one local can-
didate standing in Dungarvan,
Fine Gael Senator Austin
Deasy who would more or less
have things all his own way
there without any local op-
position.

So now we have a lady
candidate standing in the con-
stituency for the first time in
a long time. It is not the first
time ever as those of the older
generation will remember the
days when Mrs. Redmond
stood for Cumann na
nGaedheal and later Fine Gael
and succeeded on several oc-
casions in topping the poll.

The addition of Mrs. O'Brien's
name to the list of candidates
will make the contest a very
much more interesting affair
and most certainly will add
glamour to the scene.

FINE GAEL CONVENTION
Fine Gael held their Con-
vention last Saturday night
when 500 delegates crowded
into the Friary Hall in Dun-
garvan. It turned out to be
as enthusiastic a convention
as the party has ever held in
the constituency and was per-
meated throughout with an
atmosphere of confident as-
surance.

It was decided that only
two candidates should stand
although there was a lobby
from the area in and about
Portlaoigh which tried to win
favour for the suggestion that
there should be three, obvi-
ously with the aim of having
local County Councillor Pat
Coffey included. There was
also a suggestion that a lady
candidate from the Dunmore
East area might be considered
but this never got anywhere
either.

The Convention showed no
hesitation in selecting the
party's two candidates—the
outgoing deputy Eddie Collins,
Waterford and Senator Austin
Deasy, Dungarvan—both of
whom were given a big
ovation.



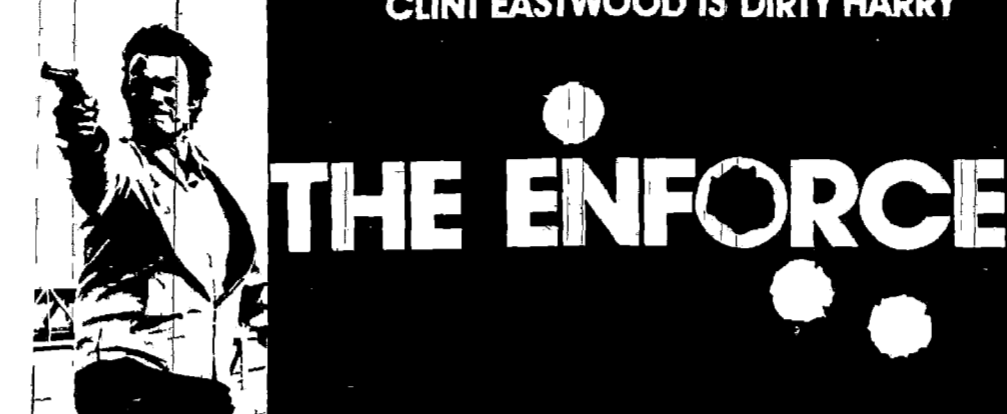

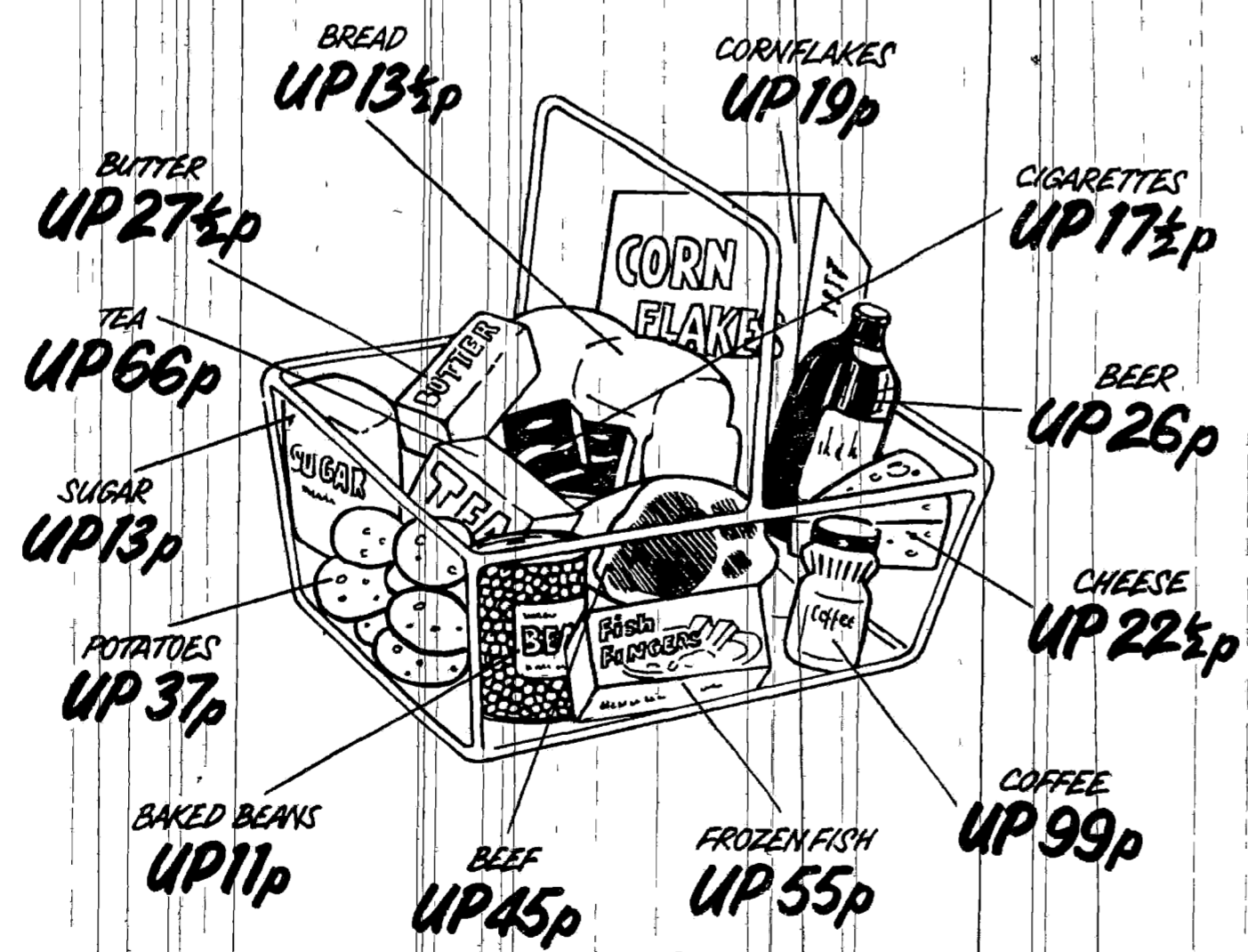

MITCHELS TO BEAT
DUNGARVAN/EIRE OG
AFFANE AND NIRE TO GET THROUGH
(By Commentator)**

NEXT SUNDAY
Now that the first rounds are finished and the championships have reached the county-down stage, it will be a case of all sections go from here on. This will certainly be the case with the Mitchels versus Dungarvan/Eire Og senior football tie at Leamybrien on Sunday afternoon and unless there is a major upset the Dungarvan based group side will say goodbye to the senior football grade for at least another season.

Mitchels who did not look county champions last month when losing to the Clashmore/Old Parish group side will be a much different proposition now that their county football has started. Tom Gough, Tony Wheelan, Kieran Power, Vinny Kirwan, Tom Power, Michael Kirwan and company are not asked to allow their senior football to be the ones to end their reign as county champions.

The group team will be without goalkeeper John Sheehan and will also have to find replacements for one or two others who will not be available. They lost 2-4 to 1-5 against Portlaw in the first rounds and will have to show considerable improvement, if they stand any chance of winning here. I doubt if they will.

Because of an ordination in Clashmore on Sunday the senior junior football game on Saturday was excellent.

Next year it is estimated that the cost of running the Association for one year will be £40,000 as against £35,000 for last year.
