PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

AN INCREDIBLE ELECTION

The general election of 1977 has now gone into the history books where it will be recorded as the most incredible to date in the annals of the State. Those of us who assessed a swing away from the Coalition in the days prior to the poll never foresaw that there would be such a massive swing which has almost completely annihilated Fine Gael, the principal partner in the government of the past four years, left the Labour Party, the junior partners, in not so bad a position, and swept Fianna Fail back to power with an absolutely fantastic majority in a veritable landslide.

How all this happened to come about has with hindsight been analysed over the past week by political and journalistic commentators but I believe that the correct assessment of Fianna Fail's overwhelming victory was due not so much to any great extent to a surge to Mr Lynch's party as to disillusionment with the Coalition and the poor leadership of Mr Cosgrave leading to a massive repudiation of its economic and other policies.

Without doubt, too, the Fianna Fail election manifesto won widespread support for the party on the issues of prices inflation and unemployment and it now remains for the new government, which will take office on July 5, to show that it is up to the challenge it has so effectively taken on.

Here in Waterford we had one of the few predictable results in this otherwise rather fantastic election although there were some minor surprises such as the rise of Dungarvan Senator Austin Deasy to second position in the poll just 700 behind long sitting Fianna Fail Deputy Billy Kennedy, the drop in the popularity of Deputy Eddie Collins, the big support which Sinn Fein's Paddy Gallagher won which saw him fighting for the last seat after eight counts, the great first time run by Dungarvan's Clr. Rio O'Brien, who in some ways might be called the stormy petrel of the election here who beat Labour's Frankie King and her Fianna Fail party colleague Sean Whelan in first preferences. The poor showing of the Multi-Channel TV candidate Billy Kirwan did not, of course, reflect the true feelings of the people where multi-channel reception is concerned, but it did show how ill-advised it was to make it an issue in an election of such political intensity.

By and large the election passed off fairly quietly here although there were some areas of tension. Posters were torn and defaced in some areas and this led to an incident in Tallow on the eve of the poll when an ESB pole was set on fire, a street banner was burned and some scuffles took place between rival supporters.

In Dungarvan on the morning of the poll allegations of intimidation were made at the polling booth at St. Joseph's Hospital (County Home), in which some patients at the hospital were involved and which were the subject of a protest by the Labour Party who claimed that at least one patient was threatened that he would lose his bed if he did not vote in a certain manner. I understand that we may not yet have heard the end of this matter.

Otherwise things went fairly smoothly throughout the constituency. It is over now for another four or five (?) years and in congratulating those elected I feel particularly pleased that we will still have a Dungarvan Deputy in Dail.

OVER £7m TO RUN S.E.
REGION HOSPITALS

The South Eastern Health Board spent approximately £7,347,000 on the running of its 20 general hospitals last year according to figures released last week by the Board.

Nearly £5 m. of this was spent on salaries and wages with the 300-bed Ardkeen Hospital predictably soaking up the lion's share of this—over £1,400,000.

The district hospitals in the South Eastern area cost just over one million pounds last year, over £800,000 of which was spent on wages. There are twelve such hospitals in the region, the largest being the 55-bed unit, in Tipperary which cost a total of £142,000.

ENFORCE CAR
PARK BYE LAWS
SAYS COUNCILLOR

Stating that three caravans were at present parked in the town park Clr. P. Whelan said at last Monday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council that despite the notices and the bye-laws that were publicly displayed these would not be binding something must be done. The bye-laws were not being adhered to and the Council should see that they were enforced or they would have more caravans being parked there.

ENTRANCE BLOCKED

Clr. T. Wade said that they should also ask drivers who park cars there while going to Mass not to block the entrance and to show some sense of consideration for others who want to get in and out of the car park.

Clr. Whelan agreed and said

that the right of way into and out of the car park was often blocked by people who came along and just "throw" their cars there. He suggested that the Garda be asked to take a trip around there occasionally and catch some of the culprits.

age of 60 years. It is free

painless and takes only a few minutes.

WATERFORD CAME CLOSE TO SHATTERING CORK BEST DISPLAY FOR SOME TIME

Cork 4-13; Waterford 3-11

Waterford hurlers had their finest game for many years at Semple Stadium, Thurles, on Sunday last when they ran All-Ireland champions Cork, to five points in the Munster senior hurling championship semi-final.

Before an estimated 9,000 point brought the sides level with nine minutes to go, Waterford who had given everything they had faded under the late pressure and Cork came through in the closing stages for a win which for most of the game looked unlikely.

Although Cork's experience saw them through in the end, this was one of Waterford's best displays for some time. They showed that they had the skill before and all that was missing was the drive and motivation. They found these on Sunday last and came close to bringing down the favourites and All-Ireland champions. The game did not run out good for them as they can stand the test with the best in the country.

Last Sunday's game was a memorable one for many reasons. The hurling was top class, the exchanges were exciting and there were plenty of goalmouth thrills. However, as far as Waterford was concerned it showed a new awareness of pride in a team fighting for their hurling existence. And it was a proud day for Waterford as the team to a man, responded to the challenge in magnificent fashion.

Waterford had to re-arrange their defence when Peter Whelan cried off but there was no sign of apathy or indifference as they came at Cork with a vengeance right from the very start.

Surprised on by the brilliant hurling of Pat McGrath, John Galvin, Mossie Whelan and Mossie Walsh Waterford looked anything but underdogs as they amazed both supporters and opponents with a fiery and determined effort which set the champions reeling in the opening half.

Waterford had the first score

point from full forward Pat

Kelly, who made a goal just three minutes later

memories of Walsh Park a decade ago when Waterford defeated Cork came flooding to mind.

Sixty seconds later Sean O'Leary goals for Cork but Waterford with the wind at midfield stuck to their task and were unfatiguedly 1-7 to 1-6 ahead at the halfway stage.




