### PAYING FOR A WAR MACHINE

According to the "Los Angeles Times" the Pentagon, the nerve centre of the U.S. War Machine, will pay more to retired military personnel this year than their Army pays to all its active-duty soldiers, more than their Air Force has budgeted this year to buy planes and missiles and more than their Navy's budget for shipbuilding. While the U.S. military budget has almost doubled since 1962, military pension costs have increased tenfold. For 1977 the pension cost is \$8.23 billion. Unless the system is changed, the annual pension cost could exceed \$30 billion by the year 2000! The U.S. is surely becoming a real military welfare state while there are still millions of hungry and impoverished people trying to exist in other parts of the world.

### "HEAVY-FOOTED" DRIVERS ARE FUEL WASTERS

According to the European Community Newsletter issued last week a change in motorists' buying habits and driving habits has been called for by Irish EEC Commissioner Richard Burke. Mr Burke who is a member of the Commission with special responsibility for Transport was speaking at the 30th Conference of the International Organisation of Motor Traders when he said "It is essential that the consumer should be able to compare the standard fuel consumption figures of the models on the market before making a choice." The Commission has therefore decided to promote a standard consumption test developed by the Economic Commission for Europe of the United Nations.

"Heavy-footed" drivers are major wasters of energy and, working with the motor industry, the European Commission is also looking for ways to change this common driving habit. "As far as private motoring is concerned the consumer should be encouraged to drive his car more economically, to keep it properly tuned and serviced and to choose his next car with economy very much in mind," said Mr Burke.

Commission policy is to reduce energy consumption by promoting better fuel use rather than by the more dramatic approach of trying to cut down consumption regardless of stout will continue unchanged.





# FEILE na nGAEEL '77

**WATERFORD HOSTS NATIONAL FESTIVAL  
OF JUVENILE HURLING**

Only six years after the first Feile na nGael was held in Tipperary, the name has become a household word throughout Ireland—not just the hurling counties or even the 26 counties, but all 32 counties. This year, for the first time, it falls to the honour of Waterford to act as hosts to the Juvenile hurlers from every part of Ireland as they come to show their skills, to learn from others and to make hurling friends that will probably last for their lifetime, in many cases. That is the way Feile na nGael has been since the beginning. That beginning—fittingly enough—was in the cradle-town of the G.A.A. Thurles which acted as the main centre of activities when Tipperary put on that first experimental Feile in 1971. They could not have dreamt then of the success their idea would achieve and the extent to which all counties would develop it.

It is now fairly well established that the great advance in interest in hurling over the last few years and the development of several counties once considered weak is attributable to Feile na nGael.

Feile has proved a great incentive to the youth to perfect their hurling skills. It has established contacts between the traditionally strong counties and those who have little background in the game. And it has given a glamour to hurling for youngsters.

**HISTORY OF FEILE**

The group of imaginative and enthusiastic hurling men of Tipperary who instigated the concept of Feile na nGael

were led by Seamus O'Riain, the former President of the G.A.A. The Irish Bottlers of Coca-Cola were approached and agreed to sponsor the festival. They have done so every year since 1971 and do so again this year.

The idea has been to motivate the young of Ireland to play the game of hurling as a valuable part of our heritage and to provide incentives to perfect the art and skills of the game. In the attractive atmosphere of Feile, the boys (and girls) are brought to appreciate the value of hurling as an unique and distinctive Irish game.

Around the central kernel of hurling, a whole lot of other social and educational aspects have developed with the years. Each centie where the Feile is held contributes its own fund of ideas and initiative. A particular feature of the Waterford festival this year was the Literary and Art competition among schoolgoers. Some remarkably accomplished entries have been received for this competition—on a hurling theme.

It has been remarked that each county in which Feile was held won the All-Ireland during the term. Alas Waterford will be first to break that sequence. The Feile moves next year to Kilkenny.

**SIXTY FOUR TEAM BLITZ**

As the time table on this page shows, the activities of the week-end in Waterford begin with the arrival of the teams from each of the other 31 counties on Friday July 15. Before that however one of the main symbols of the Festival, The Bronze Hurley, will be handed over by the Chairman of the Organising Committee of last year's Feile in Cork to the Chairman of Waterford's Organising Committee for 1977.

Fr. Berrie Troy of Cork will hand the hurley to Sean de Burca Waterford Chairman at the border of Cork and Waterford. It will be carried by relay of runners from the various juvenile hurling clubs along the route—Tallow, Ballyduff, Lismore, Cappoquin, Shamrocks, Bricky Rangers, Eire Og, Dungarvan, etc., arriving in Dungarvan on Thursday evening, July 14 at 8.30 p.m.

The reception will await the Bronze Hurley in Dungarvan by the Chairman and members of the Urban District Council. On the following afternoon at 3.00 p.m. it will commence its journey from Dungarvan to Waterford arriving for the Civic Reception by the Mayor at the City Hall.

Meanwhile all the teams will have arrived together with the officials and attendants. Approximately 1,500 people will be involved. They will be accommodated in the homes of the people in the club areas throughout the county and city. Each Waterford club entertains one visiting club.

The hurling will begin on Saturday morning July 16 at 11 a.m. at the home ground of each of the home clubs. The visitors will play their hosts for the right to progress to the second round.

The second rounds and semi-finals will be held at selected central venues in the afternoon of Saturday, with the semi-finals in the evening.

The finals take place at the central venue for Feile na nGael.

nGael '77 which is Parc Breathnach Portlaoise. Before this, however on Sunday forenoon, the most spectacular part of the whole Feile—the Parade of all the participating teams—will take place.

**BIG JOB OF ORGANISATION**

With the scale so large and the range so widespread it is obvious that the organisation of Feile na nGael is one of the most demanding tasks possible to imagine. It is almost beyond belief that it is carried out by a little group of hard-working G.A.A. members—entirely in their spare time.

This they do however.

The Waterford Committee has been working for the best part of a year in preparation of the Feile of next weekend. Sean de Burca, the Chairman from Passage worked in conjunction with the Cork Committee last year so as to gain experience of the skills and problems. In effect therefore, it has been almost two years at work.

The Secretary who has borne the heaviest burden of the work is Monaghan-born Vincent Mulligan of Abbeyside on whom both the Waterford clubs and the groups from the other counties have depended to keep them in touch. Vincent's dedication to the job has been key to the Waterford effort in organising Feile.

Others on the local Committee who have pulled their weight since January last with little respite—Noel Brown (Treasurer) Roanmore, Seamus O'Brien (Secretary), Western Board G.A.A., Francis Walsh, P. O'Leary, Rev. Bro. Kiley Chopton, Padraig Mac Gearail, Treasurer, Western Board Foley, Bricky Rangers, Daithi de Paor, Treasurer, County Board Seamus O'Briain, PRO County Board.

**SPECIAL EVENT**

A Special Event at this year's Feile will be a Seven-a-side competition of the skills of the same in which many of the biggest names in the game will participate—Eddie Keeler, Fahey, Larkin, Noel Skehan, Pat Hartigan, etc.

**A LOSERS' GROUP THIS TIME**

Waterford's courageous decision to introduce a Losers Group this year's Feile has met with widespread approval. As a result, teams are now assured of at least two games and for those who in past years have bitten the dust in the first round the possibility of sectional honours in a Losers' Group looks large and enticing.

ing. While it may not carry the status of overall winners this special competition is sure to provide an abundance of thrilling games where the earnestness of the boys endeavour will be well matched of championship proportions.

When one considers the magnitude of the task one can only marvel at the foresight and courage of the organisers. Heretofore 64 teams—Four Sections of eight and graded according to county standard—competed in a straight knock-out system with the last two in each section contesting the final after the Grand Parade on Sunday.

Now for those teams defeated in the first round on the Saturday morning—and remember many of them will have travelled as much as 300 miles on the Friday—the interest completed at this stage heretofore will pick themselves up and in a last desperate bid for honour throw caution to the winds and play as they have never played before.

Thus at eight venues in the afternoon not only will we have the cream of the country's under-14 hurlers endeavouring to achieve the ambition of their young lives by qualifying for the final proper but 32 teams from areas where literally hurling has been starved to the point of death will also endeavour to achieve what will be for them the climax of a never-to-be-forgotten experience.

And the whole purpose of the exercise will have been achieved if at the end of the day teams representing such counties as Tyrone, Louth, Sligo, Monaghan, Leitrim and Donegal can proudly hold aloft their trophies and crowns. Watch out all you Corkmen, Claremen, Tipperary and Waterforders.
