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JAMBORORA 77 UNDER WAY

The President Dr Patrick Helyer officially opened Jamborora 77, the international camp being held by the Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland in the grounds of Mount Mellary Abbey on Tuesday night last. The camp which has been organised to mark the Golden Jubilee of the CBSI will continue until August 5. Some 10,000 scouts are at present camping on the 200 acre site including 1,500 who have travelled from a total of 21 different countries some as far away as Australia and New Zealand.

The camp itself is almost an independent town with its own supermarket, telephone exchange, churches, post office, bank and hospital. One indication of the size of the operation is the amount of food required for a camp with a population of the size of the town of Malinbeg, 86 thousand tons of milk, one hundred thousand eggs, twelve thousand pounds of butter and 21 tons of jam. And every time that they appear on the menu over one mile of standard sausages will have to be fried. The camp's Open Day will be held on Sunday next, July 31 when visitors will have the opportunity of seeing boys from all over the world camping according to their local customs and of attending a special open air offering of Sean O'Riada's Mass at 3 p.m. which will be celebrated by over 80 priests, including the Apostolic Nuncio, the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and the Archbishop of Cashel. The attendance will include the Taoiseach, members of the Government and leaders of the Opposition parties.

Monday August 1 will perhaps be the highlight of the camp for the boys themselves. In the morning they will dress up in ancient Gaelic costumes and operate an open air fair ground in which they will barter services and souvenirs the same way as was done at the last real Tara festival some 1500 years ago. In the afternoon there will be a trial of "It's A Knockout" challenges designed to cater for almost 8,500 participants and in the evening a concert by the Chieftains will be followed by a night of singing and dancing on the sub camp.

Jamborora 77 is the largest undertaking of its kind in the history of Irish scouting and it will undoubtedly provide an exciting and memorable experience for all those who are taking part.

On behalf of all our readers I bid the scouts from all over Ireland and those who have come from other parts of the world a hearty good night and express the wish that their visit to our shores will prove a happy and rewarding one!

FEARS WEEK-END VIOLENCE

Fears that violence and vandalism could rear their ugly heads over the coming bank holiday week-end have been expressed by a number of local residents and business people in Ardmore.

This popular seaside resort which up to recent years was an ideal place for a quiet summer holiday has been experiencing an unwelcome intrusion by elements who come from as far away as Dublin and have caused a great deal of vandalism and created fear amongst the people who normally live there as well as the visits so many of whom have been going there for years. In an effort to combat these activities and to ensure that Ardmore should continue as the peaceful and safe place it has always been a call has gone out for a strengthening of the Garda presence in the area.

A prominent business man in Ardmore has pointed out to us that at present there are only two on the local force—a sergeant and a garda—and

because of arrangements which govern the normal working hours of the Garda, it has almost been standard practice that there is no one on official duty there at week-ends and especially on Sundays which appear to be particularly flash-point times. He also pointed out that not many years ago Ardmore was a 4-man station and up to a few months ago had three men but when the third man was then transferred there was no replacement made.

He described this reduction in the Garda strength in Ardmore as ridiculous at a time when there would be up to four or five thousand people there and said that it was no exaggeration that local business people and in particular the owners of licensed premises were always fearful that rowdiness and violence could break out.

When we asked the Garda authorities to comment on the matter they agreed that the position as stated in regard to the manpower at Ardmore station was correct but that there was nothing they could do in the present circumstances to increase the strength or extend the duty hours involved. The County Council has also admitted that there is very little they can do to put down the type of huggery that has unfortunately begun to show itself in Ardmore.

This, indeed is a great pity as it could well mean that unless this type of lawlessness is nipped in the bud, the peace and quiet that has been the normal scene in this tranquil seaside resort could well be disrupted. Law-abiding people are entitled to expect protection from thugs and should get it. Let us hope nothing untoward will happen.

THOSE BROKEN BOTTLES

Hardly had last week's issue of the "Leader" been out on the streets for a few hours when we had a caller to the office as a follow-up to the appeal which we made in the column last week about broken glass.

On Thursday evening Joe Riordan paid us a visit to tell us how a young visitor fishing in the river Colgan the previous night had sustained a severe gash while wading in the river. He told us that from the Rialty Bridge up to the factory of Waterford Joinery the river is littered with broken glass.

The culprits are young and not so young fellows who search the nearby town dump for bottles and other glass containers and then throw them into the river. This practice must be condemned out of hand but it seems that there are those who just do these things no matter what is said to them.

Anyone who might have occasion to walk in that stretch of the river and especially the parents of young children who go swimming there should take warning that this broken glass presents a great danger.

While it may be true to say that change is always in the air, some occasions prove to be periods of quite exceptional change. Last week was one of those when the Trinity Sitings of the Circuit Court for County Waterford took place in Dungarvan.

Sitting on the bench was a new judge, Judge Timothy Desmond, who although assigned to the South-Eastern Circuit area, following the transfer of Judge Fawcitt to Cork city, was in fact, only doing a one-off job as he will shortly be going to another area. PROTESTS AS FIANNA FAIL VOTE GENEVA TRIP FOR THREE

Party politics took over in a big way at a meeting of the Dungarvan County Council in Dungarvan last Monday when the Fianna Fail members of the Council used their overwhelming majority on the Council to vote trips to Geneva for three of their members.

The matter was introduced in a letter from the Transport Ltd Dublin which had been appointed agents to arrange for the transport and accommodation of delegates appointed to attend the International Congress Exhibition which will be held in Geneva from September 4 to September 10. The theme of which will be "Towards More Human and Urban Technology". It was stated that the Council were empowered to send three delegates to the Congress.

Mr. C. Curran, Chairman, then raised the matter of sending delegates and pointed out that all other organisations such as trade unions, farmers and Chambers of Commerce were continually sending delegates to Brussels, Strasbourg and other European centres but Local Authorities had been very slow in this regard and he did not think that they should continue to follow this line. They should do as the other organisations were doing he said.

Cllr P. Cahill (FF) then proposed that the Council send three delegates to the Congress and this was seconded by Mr. J. Walsh.

Another change which last week's Circuit Sittings also marked was the impending retirement of the State Solicitor for the County and City, Dr. Desmond Courahan who has held that position for the past thirty years. His place will be taken by the new appointee at the next sessions and then we will have yet another new face!

It has truly been a period of great change in the legal scene in the county.

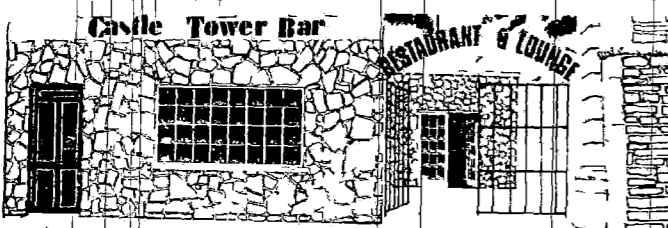

COURT TOLD SOW RAN INTO A CAR

How a sow ran into the front of a car causing damage to the extent of £62.20 was described at Dungarvan Circuit Court during the hearing of a claim for negligent driving of the animal on the public road brought by James Hayes, Deelish, Dungarvan owner of the car against James Gurry Ballythomas, Rathgormack, owner of the sow.

Mrs Catherine Hayes wife of the plaintiff in the action stated in evidence that on Sunday afternoon November 7 last she was driving her husband's car from Kilsheelan towards Dungarvan and at Ballythomas on a bend in the road she saw a car driven by the defendant coming against her. The driver had his hand out and was waving a stick. She stopped and then she saw a sow which ran straight into the front of the car.

Witness said that she had a conversation with the defendant during which she claimed he agreed to pay for the damage done to her car. She subsequently got an estimate of £66.20 for the repairs but the defendant although he rang her a couple of times never paid this.

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CAR WAS WRITE-OFF AFTER COLLISION

Judge T. N. Desmond was told at Dunganarvan Circuit Court that following a collision between two cars one of them which was being driven home from Grange Creamery was a complete write-off.

He is hearing an action in which Michael Salmon farmer, Grallaigh, Grange claimed damages totalling £800 against Joseph Chambers, Yeoman Road, Cork for the alleged negligent driving of a car at Grange.

Mr J. Gordon B.L. instructed by the learned Solicitor for the applicant told the Court that liability had been admitted by the respondent and it was only for the Court to assess the amount of the damages.

Michael Salmon in evidence said that on the day in question he was returning home from Grange Creamery in his car and at a gradual speed against him at great speed. The car struck him and he received injuries to his knee eye and ribs. He did not go to a doctor as it was during the busy season and he was saving hay and was afraid if he went to a doctor that he would be hospitalised.

Judge Desmond said that he accepted the evidence of the plaintiff's car after the collision and said that it was a complete write-off. From his examination he formed the opinion that the car had been an exceptionally good one and he fixed its pre-accident value at £450. The salvage value of the car after the accident was only £116.99.

Brian Foley, Garage Owner, Dunganarvan gave similar evidence.

Judge Desmond said that he would fix the value of the car at £440 and would allow £200 for the personal injuries suffered by the applicant and granted a decree for a total of £240 with costs.
