DUNGARVAN V BALLYAGGART

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HOAX PHONE CALLS
Some months ago I wrote about the despicable practice of anonymous phone calls carried on by certain gossip mongers whose only aim in life appears to be to cause as much trouble and dissension as they possibly can. Equally despicable is the practice of using the public telephone service to make hoax phone calls for mischievous purposes.

There appears to be a good deal of both going on in the Dungarvan area in recent months (and because of the anonymous nature of the practice it is extremely difficult for the law to lay hands on the perpetrators). Some of these calls are made simply to frighten, some are just obscene while others are aimed at causing as much general upset as possible. One in the latter category was made last Saturday night when shortly after 11.30 p.m. a private telephone subscriber in Dungarvan had an anonymous call made to his house to say that there was a bomb either in the house or somewhere in the vicinity. It was certainly a frightening thing to receive such a call close to midnight and the householder did what he should do in the circumstances and immediately alerted the Garda.

The result was that the house and those adjoining had to be evacuated while a search was carried out and people found themselves out in the open while this was being done. They were unable to return until the search was completed and the search had passed. The fact that the whole thing turned out to be a hoax was of little consolation to the people concerned.

This kind of public mischief must be condemned in the strongest possible manner and if and when anyone is found doing it or similar acts they should be treated in the same merciless manner as they treat the "victims". Hiding at the end of a phone to create trouble and upheaval goes beyond a joke and it can be no excuse to say that those who practice this kind of thing have warped minds or a twisted sense of humour. They are simply badly minded trouble makers and should be treated accordingly.

THE TOWERS
If you would really like to see something out of the ordinary then I would recommend a visit to Barranmore Wood a few miles out from Lismore on the road to Ballyduff where you will find, hidden in a most beautiful setting, deep in the wood, a really fantastic building known as The Towers.

Thanks to Waterford County Council who have devoted part of this year's Amenity Grant to the work, the building, which for many years has been smothered in the trees and dense undergrowth in the wood, has been cut loose from its enveloping sylvan surroundings. Now it stands in a clearing and presents a fantastic view at the end of a pedestrian way which has also been cleared and surfaced by the Council.

Responding to the urgings of Mr Tom Linnan, Engineer in charge of the reclamation work, I have visited the Towers twice in recent weeks and I unreservedly recommend readers of this column to go and see the place for themselves. Without doubt great credit is due to Mr Linnan for his foresight in assessing the tourist potential of the Towers and their beautiful surroundings and for the fine work which has been carried out there by the gang of Council workers under Mr Dick Fennessy.

RTE POLITICAL PROFESSORS "A SHOWER OF DONKEYS"

The panel of political commentators engaged by RTE television to comment on the results of the recent general election during the RTE television coverage on the occasion were described as "a shower of donkeys" at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Tuesday.

The remark was made following the reading of a letter from Mr. Louis McRedmond, Head of Information RTE in reply to a protest made by the Council about the coverage given by RTE television to the Waterford constituency during the election. The letter pointed out that as RTE had only 3 television outside broadcast units it was necessary for them to concentrate on what appeared to be nationally newsworthy and Waterford did not qualify for high profile national coverage.

Cllr T. K. Ryan, former Labour Deputy in the Dail until he retired this year said that they had not sought an outside broadcast unit for the constituency. He said that details of the count in Waterford be given out as they came in. The people only wanted the figures, he said, and did not want to listen to the comments of the professors who were on all the time and who knew little about what they were talking about and who were only a shower of donkeys.

Deputy A. Deasy agreed and said that these people knew as little about what was going on as anyone else.

Cllr K. O'Ryan retorted 'it only shows once again that Dublin is Ireland'.

The letter was noted.

MASS AT KNOCKBOY

The people of fouraeneena and surrounding areas will be celebrating the feast of the blessed Virgin Mary this evening at 7 p.m. on Thursday September 8th at the feast of the Nativity of the blessed Virgin Mary. They will come there to thank God for the gift of His only son received and which was first brought to this area at the end of the century by St. Brendan.

At Knockboy he built his first church and around it in the course of time grew the parish of Seskinane. Called after his father-in-law, he was locally and affectionately called—'the parish of Seskinane'.

The church of Seskinane served the spiritual needs of the people of what is today a very large parish, the parish of Touraeneena and the Nire.

During the Penal Times the days of Seskinane were a glory came to an end, the priests were driven away and the Mass was offered there no more.

From then until 1823 A.D. when St. Mary's Church, Touraeneena was built and 1865 when the Church of St. Helena of the Holy Cross was built at the Nire Mass was offered in small ways. He had the priests were sheltered in the homes of the people. An old tradition holds that St. Oliver Plunkett and his friend Dr. Brennan, Bishop of Waterford visited Seskinane.

At the Mass on September 8th a chalice will be used which was given to St. Brendan of Seskinane in 1802 and the altar cloth to be used has been preserved by the Barron family of Knockboy and used only for Mass for over 100 years.

PRE-EMPLOYMENT COURSES AT DUNGARVAN AND KILMACTHOMAS VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS

Many boys and girls on leaving school both this year and over the past few years have experienced difficulty in obtaining employment. This is due to many factors such as the world recession, inflation and so forth but there are less obvious but none the less real reasons. Increasingly modern industrial society demands individuals with personal resources and flexibility to cope with the complexities of the labour market and the rapid change of work roles in the service industries the most rapidly growing section of industry personal and inter-personal skills and particularly important and all young workers must have the ability to plan and make life and career decisions if they are successful in working life of these pre-employment courses is that of bridging the gap between the values and experiences normally part of traditional education and those current in the adult world of work. Pre-employment courses are structured into three main areas which while expressed separately are inter-related and inter-dependent.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT The emphasis on personal development of the individual taking the programme reflects the importance attached to giving young people an understanding of the values of adult life and the resources to come to terms with adult reality. The whole programme is in this sense a stage in the maturation of the individual in his or her choosing an adult role (and all the elements of the course will knit together to provide the student with the knowledge and skills to move from school to work.

WORK EXPERIENCE Work experience is an attempt to provide each student with formal experience of work situations. It is hoped that this experience will be real experience gained on the shop floor with a view to enabling students to understand the realities of work and work roles. It is not a probation period or taking up work in an organisation but rather a means of broadening the awareness of young people of the variety of work roles available to them.

TECHNICAL KNOWLEDGE In the Technical Knowledge sector we will be two areas of study each being broadly based enough to allow entry into a series of possible occupations. Learning experiences in these sectors will be organised so as to lay the strongest possible emphasis on practical work and on personal initiative and standards in the completion of tasks assigned in addition group project work which would afford small groups of students the opportunity of working together on the completion of an assignment according to a planned schedule will form an integral part of the course. In this way the student is strengthening his preparation for working life not only by the enlargement of the range of vocational outlets to which he may aspire but also to the cultivation of skills, disciplines and attitudes which have a general applicability in any work situation.

Industries Business establishments, Agricultural Organisations and Local Authorities are co-operating with the Vocational Committee in organising these courses. These courses will be conducted at the Vocational Schools at Dungarvan and Kilmacthomas. It is expected that there will be a heavy demand for places and since the number of places is limited early enrolment is advisable. Details of these courses appear in our advertisement columns.
