FARMERS TO USE BALLOONS TO COMBAT PIGEON MENACE

Farmers in the renowned vegetable growing area of Balleenacorney, frustrated at the continuing losses being sustained by them as a result of the pigeon menace to their vegetable crops are planning to experiment with new combative measures unique in this country.

In conjunction with the Agricultural Institute the Ballinacorney vegetable growers plan to anchor gas filled balloons 42 inches in diameter 12 1/2 over their vegetable fields, and then it is believed will do the trick as far as the dreaded pigeon menace is concerned.

A very light gas will be used and will anchor the vegetable fields like one massive kite. However, as it will be like a hawk pigeon will not go anywhere near the vegetable fields while the balloon is in this position.

This new method unique to Ireland has already been tried successfully in Britain. The horticultural staff of the County Agricultural Committee of Agriculture have deeply involved themselves in the new experiment and are absolutely confident of success.

One balloon will cover a total of eight acres. The balloon itself will cost £26 and one cylinder of gas, which will last about a year costs £30. Thus a total outlay of £56 over a full year would seem to be good value for the protection of eight acres of vegetables.

The farmers too will be taking other unique steps to combat the menace of crows and rooks. Narrow plastic tubes will be suspended about ten feet above a field of crops and these too will keep the crows and rooks away while at the same time machinery can be used and worked under the tapes.

In recent years the damage to the huge vegetable fields all over the county, but in particular the Ballinacorney area has been enormous. The pigeon scheme introduced by the Committee of Agriculture only met with a very limited success and will not be used again. Winter cauliflowers, spring cabbage and grain suffered disastrously from pigeons and so this gas filled balloon is now seen as the effective alternative.

The county's Chief Agricultural Officer Mr. George Frost is confident that the new balloons will provide the answer to the pigeon problem. It has been tried very successfully in England and such is the research and work out into the water that it will prove equally beneficial to the county Waterford vegetable growers.

£43,000 INCREASE IN PROVISIONAL AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE ESTIMATE

It will cost a record £203,303 to run the affairs of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in 1978. That was the provisional allocation unanimously adopted by the members at Monday's meeting in Dungarvan and represents an increase of more than £43,000 on the current year's estimate.

Mr. George T. Frost, C.A.O. in explaining the various projected expenditures told the meeting that provision was made in the estimates for the appointment of five additional permanent instructors in agriculture as well as the creation of a new post of Deputy C.A.O. (Education).

Mr. Frost said that at present they had nine instructors in agriculture but this only gave them a farmer-instructor ratio of 422. But by appointing an additional instructor it would be a much more acceptable figure all round.

The C.A.O. in supporting the creation of the new post of Deputy C.A.O. (Education) said the Waterford Committee was the only one of the 27 county committees of agriculture in the country that had not made such an appointment.

Mr. James Caney, Department of Agriculture Inspector who attended the meeting said he would strongly recommend to the meeting that both appointments be made.

In the coming year instruction in agriculture will cost £24,965. An increase of £6,394 on the current year. Scholarships will cost the committee £15,780 next year as against £3,100 at present, the sizeable decision to award a greater number of scholarships in the coming year.

On the proposal of Mr. J. Cullinane seconded by Mr. P. Crothy the meeting unanimously agreed to make provision for the appointment of the new Deputy C.A.O. (Education) in the proposal of Mr. S. Fahey it was unanimously agreed to make provision in the estimates for the appointment of an additional permanent instructor in agriculture.

On Deputy Fahey's proposal the provisional estimate as presented to the meeting was also unanimously adopted.

Seconding its adoption Mr. C. Curran said all of their instructors were giving a magnificent service to the farmers of the county. We have every reason to feel proud of them.

Mr. Curran added that it was good to see all players did well in a good team performance but perhaps, Nicholas O'Donovan, John Hickey, John Fives, Eugene McLoughlin, Tom Brien and Pat Curran did that little bit more.

BALLYDUFF CLINCH VICTORY IN FINAL QUARTER

THRILLING QUARTER FINAL REPLAY

Ballyduff unleashed all their reserves of energy and stamina in the final quarter of this thrilling senior hurling quarter final replay at Dungarvan on Saturday night last. It was as if the Ballyduff men had reserved their best hurling for this final quarter onslaught.

If Ballyduff can maintain the form they showed in the last quarter then they can face the semi-final with a certain amount of confidence. However they were again below par in attack where only Liam Cunningham and Seamus Flynn showed good form.

The Ballyduff defence showed considerable improvement on the drawn game. Centre back Seamus Hannon was unshakable and with 'keeper' Michael Sheehy getting great cover from Michael Hannon and Maurice Geary and with Seamus Daly and Eugene in a menudous form on the wings in the half line the Erin's Own score power was curtailed dramatically.

Ballyduff scored their first point after only two minutes and were 0-5 to 0-1 ahead after 18 minutes. They lost much of their early impetus and urgency for a spell and Erin's Own required the arrears to two points 0-7 to 0-5 at the interval.

DRIFT NET CASES ARE ADJOURNED

What are believed to be the first prosecutions brought under the controversial regulations introduced by the Commission of Enquiry relating to the use of drift nets were heard by District Justice W F O'Connell at Youghal Court.

Before the court were Patrick Morrissey, Ballyvaughan, Grange, Ardmore and Denis Lennihan, Ballinacorney. Ardmore Morrissey pleaded not guilty to illegally fishing with drift nets in excess of fairly meshed at Dyseret Ardmore on April 12 last while Lennihan also pleaded not guilty to having on board his boat at Dyseret on April 29 last a drift net exceeding 30 meshes in depth contrary to a bye-law of the Fisheries (Consolidation) Act 1959.

In the case against Morrissey evidence for the Fishery Board was given by Inspector Edward Woulfe who stated that when he approached the defendant at Dyseret on April 12 he admitted fishing with illegal sixty mesh nets.

Corroborative evidence was given by Inspector Michael Panning and Waterkeeper J Fraher. The defendant in evidence however denied that he used 60 mesh nets on that date. He agreed that fishermen from Ardmore Youghal Ballyvaughan and Knockadon had all used the outlawed 60 mesh nets during a period of protest against the introduction of the 30 mesh nets. However on the date of the offence he used only the 30 mesh net.

Mr Brozman stated that when the inspectors of the Fishery Board saw the 60 mesh drift net being loaded on to Lennihan's boat at Dyseret on April 29 the boat was then above the low water mark. That he submitted that the exclusive fishery limits of the State.

COUNCIL CALL FOR MORE GARDAI IN ARDMORE

This was a matter of controversy locally and while the Council had done something to ease the problem steps would have to be taken to prevent a repetition next year, said Mr C Curran, Chairman, at a meeting of Waterford Co Council in Dungarvan last week when he referred to the illegal camping and caravanning which had taken place on a Council site at Curragh Ardmore during the past summer.

Mr Deasy - Sometimes there are none at the peak season they should have a sufficient force in Ardmore to deal with the situation.

Mr Deasy said that the Garda force was to be increased and this would be a good time to ask that a number of Garda's in Ardmore be increased and also that a squad car be sent to the area occasionally. The Council agreed to approve this suggestion.

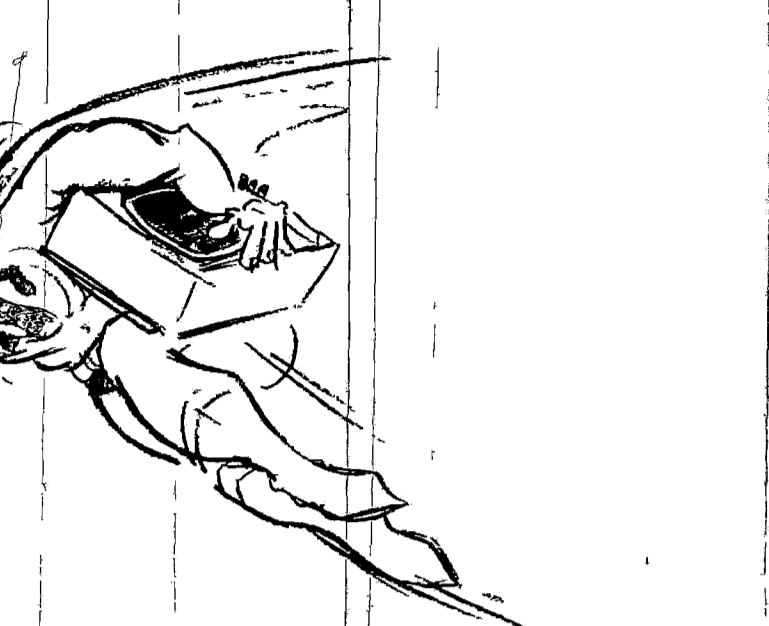
