**RING APPEAL**

## PENS MAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### MARAUDING DOGS

The losses caused through the killing and maiming of cattle by marauding dogs was once more spot-lighted at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday following a rather lengthy discussion no easy solution to the problem was suggested.

Cllr Michael Hartly who initiated the discussion referred to the growing number of sheep owners to the menéon and criticised the existing legislation because of its inability to cope with the situation. He described these killer dogs as prize-winners because they were able to overcome the efforts of the farmers concerned and even the law itself to effectively deal with them.

Appeals to dog owners to keep their animals under control, especially during the hours of darkness appear to be of little use because, as Portlaoise Councillor, Michael Henebry, pointed out, many of these animals are "nobody's babies" owned by nobody after having been dumped around the countryside by their original owners. From there on they exist in a wild state and have to fend for themselves.

The matter is a very serious one as the losses which these dogs cause can be quite considerable and the problem is one which requires close attention in an urgent way.

**SPOT FINES**  
I must warn motorists this week that for the future they must beware. As and from Saturday last, October 1, the on-the-spot fine system introduced for motorists who fail to have a tax or registration disc displayed, or who contravene general parking laws or local parking by-laws, come into force throughout the country. Here in County Waterford a week's "grace" was allowed to motorists but the law as it applies will be rigorously enforced by the gardaí as from Monday next, October 10!

This means that motorists who fail to comply with any of the regulations may be caught committing any of the scheduled offences defined on the spot. The fines, which vary for the different offences will be payable at the local garda station but if a motorist fails to pay the fine and appears to make a court appearance where the offence will be dealt with in the ordinary way by the District Justice.

The enforcement of these new regulations coming as it does after last week's call by Dungarvan Urban Council to the Garda authorities to put the pressure on parking offenders in the town in an effort to put an end to the traffic jams which have been causing up the principal streets in recent months should prove just what the doctor ordered as far as the gardaí are concerned.

A Garda spokesman also made it clear when I discussed the position with him on Tuesday that once the ticket concerning the fine has been issued, there will be no way of getting out of it and the use of any influence to dodge the issue will be futile.

There can be no denying the fact that traffic conditions in Dungarvan all through the summer were chaotic and parking motorists who just ignored the road markings and the parking signs were responsible in a major way for this. Single or double yellow lines were treated merely as road decorations with no significance while one side parking signs were treated as if they never existed.

And so now motorists, you have been warned. The law as it stands will be enforced from Monday next and if you wish to take a chance by putting your car in a place where it should not be you must also be prepared to pay

**THE BRUSSELS SCENE**  
As mentioned last week, I was one of a group of Irish Provincial Journalists who made an information visit to Brussels as guests of the Commission of the European Communities recently. For two days we attended a big number of briefing sessions which covered matters relating to agriculture, regional and social policy and the prospects for direct elections and Community enlargement.

In regard to the regional fund the message we got was that applications for monies for any local schemes which might qualify would have to be channelled through the government and it was a matter for the local representatives in each area to make themselves aware of the entitlements which could be got from the fund.

On the agricultural scene the spokesman made the point that farmers would be foolish to expect any great increases in prices during the coming year. The continuing problem of surpluses was also discussed, with particular reference to milk, dairy products and beef and in regard to milk production it was pointed out that the co-responsibility levy would have to be met and if this did not succeed in easing the problem further measures would have to be enforced.

In regard to fishers we were blankly told by the Director-General of Fisheries that as far as this country was concerned the application of the 50 mile limit was just not on. The spokesman on this aspect of Community policy was adamant on this point and it would appear that our fisheries lobby will have a most difficult time trying to obtain any concessions from Brussels where this most controversial matter is concerned.

On the question of direct elections to the Parliament of Europe the spokesman on this point said that they would be significant merely from the points of symbolism and the democratic respectability they would give the institution as they would not change the locus of power which would continue to remain with the Commission. The view that eventually the EEC would develop into a rather loose federation of states with free trade was not too strongly opposed. The possibility that these elections would not take place next year but possibly run into 1979 was also mentioned.

On the first night of our visit we were guests at dinner at Auberge St. Michel which is located in the Grand Place in Brussels. The Grand Place is really a showpiece of beautiful architecture where the old Guildhalls had their headquarters in days gone by and surrounded by cobble-stoned streets it really was an old world setting. At dinner we met members of the Irish permanent Press Corps.

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
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

ADJUDICATORS' REPORTS ON  
TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

## Tallow

**HIGHLY COMMENDED**  
Over the past few years Tallow has maintained a steady improvement in the Tidy Towns competition and this year is listed in the highly commend section of the report with a total of 109 marks out of a maximum of 150.

The following is the complete report (maximum marks in brackets).

**Effort** Community effort has been sustained this year and many of the points have to be in the year's report have been attended to. The committee should view the treatment of the litter and derelict buildings problems as priorities for future years. Marks (35) 23

**Tidiness** The overall litter control was quite good, but a lot of litter was noted on the Main Street, it is a continuing source of lost marks and should be remedied as soon as possible. Derelict and vacant buildings are a problem especially on the Main Street and the treatment of these should be a priority for next year. These should be blocked up and white washed. The Creamery and South of Ireland Petrol Depot are still problem areas which need attention as they give a very shabby appearance to the town. Marks (20) 10

**Presentation of Buildings** — Shops, Businesses, Premises etc. In general the occupied business premises and shops have been very well presented. The Church of Ireland is well presented, although the railings need to be painted. The National school looked quite untidy especially the prefabs which needs to be repainted. The old girls' national school needs to be tidied up. The O'Brien Bros Garage looked very well as do all garages in the town. The Garda Station looked well presented and the windows of the old garda house need to be painted for next year. The facades of both the Bride Valley Stores looked very shabby and should be white washed for next year. A start has been made in cleaning up the Church of Ireland graveyard—this is very encouraging. More work needs to be done here, perhaps it would receive more attention if it was open to the public and some seats were provided. Marks (20) 18

**Presentation of National Amenities, Open Spaces etc.** — The Grange was very well presented this year and the new paintwork looked very well. The open spaces are well presented in general but there are many small incidents of open spaces e.g. open garden buildings or spaces in minor roads which need more care especially grass cutting. The river is still neglected. Access to the river should be improved and the open space developed into a sitting area probably—Marks (20) 16

**Presentation and Appearance of Residential Areas** (15) 13 — Housing areas have been very well presented. The housing estates are excellent and it is hoped that the open spaces will be completed and well presented for next year. The older houses are excellently presented and the greater attention needs to be given to the young trees in the Main Street—Marks (20) 17

**Presentation and Appearance of Residential Areas Including Their Open Spaces** — The Alms House has been much better presented but much work still needs to be done. This would be a real asset to the town if it were totally renovated. The terraced cottages are a feature of the town and are very well presented. The utilisation of narrow courtyards has added very much to their appearance and to the character of the whole town. Marks (15) 13

**Presentation of Street Furniture On Roads, Car Parks, Open Spaces etc.** — In general the street furniture has been well presented this year. The public seats have been well presented again this year. Village pumps are well suited for the size of the litter bins and would need to be repaired and repainted for next year—Marks (15) 12

**CATEGORY C** (150) 114  
Effort (35) 28 — A sustained effort was evident from the Committee. Many presentations of business and commercial premises were outstanding. However, some site marking behind the general high standard the Committee should prepare a plan of attack aimed at remedying some of the major problems for next year, e.g. the derelict buildings problem and the litter problem.

**Fitness** (20) 12 — Litter control was quite weak especially on the main street. There appears to be a lack of litter bins so greater community involvement and vigilance is required to remedy this problem. The litter and derelict and vacant buildings still remains. The Committee should tackle this, especially where it appears in the main street. In the short term these premises should be kept clean and whitewashed or painted but in the long term other uses must be found for them. Many of these buildings are fine stone buildings and it is a pity to see them deteriorate.

**Presentation of Buildings** (20) 18 — In general shops and business premises are very well presented, especially Wash's Hotel and Russells. The Gada Station has fallen below the general high standard in the town and should be tidied up and repaired. The Church of Ireland and the Catholic church had been presented, although the Grange of the latter should be painted and tidied up a little for next year. The gates to the Beacon Factory need to be painted and the open spaces in this area are very untidy and some dumping was noticed. The schools are quite well presented although the national school needs to be repainted for next year. The walls of the buildings owned by the business owners are lagging behind the general standard and these owners should be encouraged to improve their premises.

**Presentation of Natural Amenities** (25) 20 — In general open spaces are very well presented, although created attention needs to be paid to weeding. The treatment of the square is quite good although the problem of glass growing through the paving stones hasn't been tackled. The open space beside the bar is very untidy and a lot of progress could be made here with tree or shrub planting.

**Presentation of Approach Roads, etc.** (20) 16 — In general the roads are quite good although many of the hedges need to be trimmed especially on the northern road. Weeding is necessary on many of the verges and footpaths throughout the town and the use of a spray weedkiller is suggested.

**Presentation and Appearance of Residential Areas** (15) 13 — Housing areas have been very well presented. The housing estates are excellent and it is hoped that the open spaces will be completed and well presented for next year. The older houses are excellently presented and the greater use of colour is successfully brightening up the whole town. The problem of derelict buildings remains and should be given priority for future years.

**Presentation of Street Furniture On Roads, Car Parks, Open Spaces etc.** — The street furniture has been well presented this year. The public seats have been well presented again this year. Village pumps are well suited for the size of the litter bins and would need to be repaired and repainted for next year as they are becoming a little shabby.

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
