COUNTY BOARD MEETING
The County Board meeting was held on Monday night at the County Board Rooms, out of the Disciplinary Committee meeting held in connection with incidents which took place following the Kilrossary Area one goal semi final at the Kilrossary club were re-arranged for the conduct of elements of their supporters and were a demand that they should be held responsible for such conduct in the future.

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STILL CONTROVERSIAL
The parking bye-laws in Dungarvan which have proved such a controversial problem over the past three years still continue to be a subject on which there are great differences of opinion and very divided views. This was clearly indicated by a discussion which took place at the monthly meeting of the local Council last Monday night when a deputation of traders from all the principal streets affected, with the exception of O'Connell Street sought to have the bye-laws changed in one way or another.

The Main Street traders expressed the view that they were being victimised and discriminated against because this was the only street in the town where parking on either side is completely restricted. Traders on the Square, where a one hour limit is in force, felt that this was too short a limit and sought to have it extended to at least two hours while the point was also made that residents of the Square who use their vehicles for business purposes should be permitted to park them indefinitely outside their premises.

On the other hand the traders of Moly Street, where indefinite parking on one side is allowed, sought to have a one hour restriction enforced there in order to move the local long-term parkers who have now moved in there from the restricted streets.

When the deputation had made their points and had withdrawn, the Council members took up the discussion among themselves and eventually there was a pronounced divergence of opinion. Things became so woolly that the end with Councilors in sixes and sevens with each other that it looked as if no decision as to what should be done would be reached.

As a compromise it was agreed that Garda Supt M. English be invited to attend a meeting of the Council to discuss the points put forward by the deputation but as far as I can see this will amount to nothing as the Council Chairman pointed out that when he discussed the Main Street problem with the Supt, the latter told him that there was no hope of changing the bye-laws and that this was just something that could not just be done.

That I think, is the message which came over loud and clear together with the addendum that the position be given a reasonable chance and that in time it would be accepted.

However it would appear that in relation to the other streets in the town, the Main Street traders have a reasonable grievance while the position in Moly Street is also one which should be looked at again. Hourly parking on one side in each of the main business streets of the town and

DUNGARVAN PARKING LAWS CANNOT BE CHANGED SAYS GARDA SUPERINTENDENT

Mr D. Goode, Chairman Dungarvan Urban Council told members of a 20-strong deputation of town traders who attended the monthly meeting of the Council last Monday night that the bye-laws in Main Street, it was "true to say that business in the street had dropped off. I am not."

The Chairman said that the law of the land demanded that the bye-laws be accepted by the on the spot fines which had come into operation on October 1st.

Mr J. Murphy said that the Square was the hub of the town and he did not think one-hour parking there was feasible to allow people to do their shopping or to have a meal.

Mr T. Byrne said that as far as he was concerned he would accept the law as it stood and that he would support the bye-laws.

Finally the matter ended when a proposal made by Mr P. Whelan that the Supt be invited to a meeting of the Council to discuss the suggestions put forward by the members of the deputation was passed unanimously.

At this stage the deputation withdrew and the Council then proceeded to discuss the situation.

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ARDMORE ARE CHAMPIONS

STRADBALLY THWARTED IN RIP ROARING FINAL

ARDMORE 2-0; STRADBALLY 0-11

The 90th county senior football final has come and gone and Ardmore are the new champions and certain it was that the Village of St Declan was the scene of Sunday night's drama as the men who blazed their way to glory at Fraher field, Dungarvan on Sunday evening were welcomed home with a record attendance for a football final were treated to a rip roaring game as Ardmore, runners up for their second year, thwarted Stradbally in their seventh attempt to win their title. That Ardmore survived by just a point is indicative of the closeness of a final which produced all the drama and tension associated with such an occasion. The venue was a sea of blue and white and red and white colours and the atmosphere was electric and while the game might not have produced football to suit the pursuit it was memorable in every other way. Perhaps luck might have favoured Ardmore nevertheless they are worthy and deserving champions. To survive the second half barrage they took from Stradbally, and still come out on top entitles them to the mantle of the county's best senior football team for 1977. It was a final in which Ardmore with a rampant display

laid the seeds for victory in a first half in which they enjoyed almost total dominance. Stradbally who looked anything but potential champions in this first half were a side transformed in the second period, they took the game to, and almost caught the winners.

SET ALIGHT

Frankie North set Ardmore alight when he pointed early seconds after the start. Matt Cronin added a minor just ninety seconds later and had pointed again before Stradbally had a chance to settle down. Ardmore played vintage stuff as they outpaced a struggling Stradbally and Frankie North sent reply their fourth point. Stradbally brought Pat Clancy to centre half-back and slowly they began to improve. Tom Considine who was operating as an extra midfielder in an effort to curb Ardmore's superiority in the area suddenly found himself with a clean view of goal but his well placed shot was superbly saved by a diving effort from Ardmore keeper, John Colbert.

It was a save which had a vital bearing on the outcome and within ten minutes Stradbally were struck another hammer blow as a shot from a 60 yards Deo Hennessy free found its way to Stradbally net as keeper Bill Dunford was cut off from sight of the ball by a back peddling defence.

Still the losers continued to settle down and they contained Ardmore until the 20th minute when a Noel Conway point left them ahead by 15 to nil. A minute later however Pat Butler scored a point from free to open Stradbally's account. Despite a further Ardmore point the accuracy of Pat Butler from placed balls kept Stradbally in touch at the interval when they trailed by 16 to 0.

Both sides made wholesale substitutions after half time but Stradbally benefited more from the moves. The switch which brought Michael Coffey from defence to attack was the more notable one as far as Stradbally were concerned.

TRANSFORMATION

They showed a complete transformation throughout the half and began to win control at midfield and consequently there was a complete change about as Ardmore found themselves under severe pressure. Three Pat Butler points from free and one from play within eight minutes left just two points between the sides (16 to 0) but Pat Butler pointed to have the minimum between them in the 41st minute and two minutes later Butler pointed a "flity" to bring the sides level for the first and only time during the game.

Ardmore were on the run but the advent of Noel Conway and James O'Donnell at midfield began to pay dividends as Conway, in particular succeeded in winning quite an amount of the ball in the area.

They began to fight back and in a concentrated raid on the side Tom O'Connor managed to force the ball into the net for what proved to be Ardmore's only score of the half. But what was a golden goal at the time it was without doubt, the most important score that O'Connor will ever get.

It gave new heart to Ardmore and they attacked again and only for the timely intervention of keeper Bill Dunford O'Connor would have gotten a second goal.

The tension mounted as Stradbally stormed back and Power broke through for a point but Ardmore were not to leave just two minutes left for play still Stradbally came and with two minutes left for play forced a free Pat Butler playing it seemed to be a pre conceived plan, instead of taking his point sent the ball wing ward as an intended pass for corner forward Tony Keane.

The signals were crossed however as Keane, obviously not expecting the move, turned his back to Butler and the ball ran loose to an Ardmore defender who promptly cleared it.

It proved costly but of folly for Stradbally as Butler pointed just on the call of time to leave only a point between the sides. Time ran out for Stradbally however.

However there can be no denying that while Ardmore had the luck they were also deserving winners of the title.

They averaged Stradbally in the first half and although not as effective in the second, nonetheless held on to win albeit by the proverbial skins of their teeth.

TEAM WORK

Team work played an important part in their victory but there were some fine individual performances also. Godkeeper John Colbert was an inspiring captain and his first half save contributed much to Ardmore's hour of glory. It was as if he had deserved his finest performance of the season for this final.

Pat Pender, Pat Hennessy (unjured), and Denis Conway were all superb in defence while others to cite in honour, the field were Noel O'Connor, Deo Hennessy, Frankie North, Noel Conway and sub Tom O'Connor whose golden goal must have made him the best of Ardmore on Sunday night.

For Stradbally keeper Bill Dun

ford was excellent, and could in no way be faulted for the shots that beat him. Pat Clancy emerged as their man of the match in defence where he got good assistance from Alo Curran and Liam Connors. Others to play well particularly in the second half were Ritchie Dunford, Pat Power, Pat Butler, Tom Cunningham and Tom Considine.

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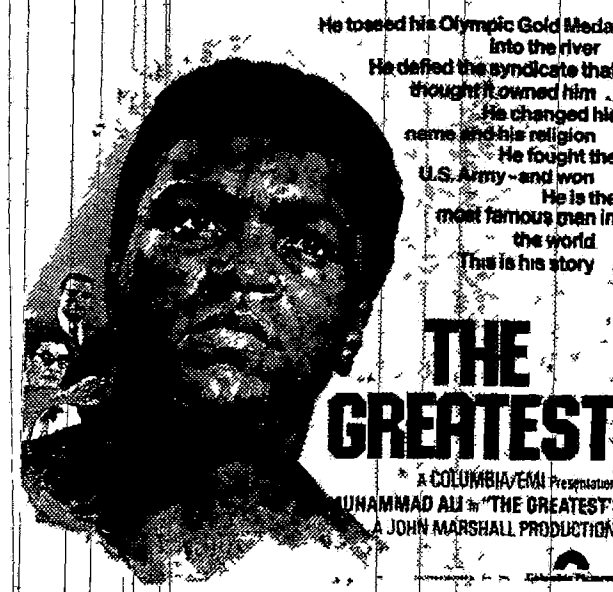

ing He told me he had a few fields cultivated but could get no seed. He had applied to the landlord to help him to get seed, but the answer he received was 'give up the land and go about your business!'

"Such is the case with hundreds of tenants on the mountain lands of Ballysaggartmore and adjoining districts at the present time. If the poor farmers could be supplied with seed oats, wheat or rye, were they able to keep a cow, a horse, or some sheep by their industry they would have been able to meet the demand for rent and support their families. The cow, the horse, the wearing apparel, the furniture and even in extreme cases the bedclothes, were pawned to support existence.

"Fifteen or sixteen once fairly comfortable homes have been levelled and while I am writing, I hear the steward and his bailiffs are, on Monday next, preparing the same fate for tenants unable to meet the demand for rent.

"As I have been informed the whole tenantry amounting with their families to over 700 persons on the Ballysaggart estate are proscribed. The land which the tenants got when it was not worth taking, when, according to the evidence given before the Land Commission by the Very Rev Dr Fogarty (Parish Priest of Lismore at the time), though having it rent free, they found it difficult even to produce the common necessities of life—the land that now, by hard labour had been brought under production and which in these three years of scarcity and famine had little return for the labour expended, must revert to the landlord. The producers of that fertility must be cleared off the estate and from their humble but happy homes. But to ensure the impossibility of their making a living, this very year of suffering, hunger and sickness, the landlord issued an order taking from his tenants all rights to the turf lands on their holdings. By this decree many of them lost a valuable source of their small incomes as they were prevented from selling turf which was not needed for their own use."
