ing He told me he had a few fields cultivated but could get no seed. He had applied to the landlord to help him to get seed, but the answer he received was 'give up the land and go about your business'.

"Such is the case with hundreds of tenants on the mountain lands of Ballysaggartmore and adjoining districts at the present time. If the poor farmers could be supplied with seed oats, wheat or rye, were they able to keep a cow, a horse, or some sheep by their industry they would have been able to meet the demand for rent and support their families. The cow, the horse, the wearing apparel, the furniture and even in extreme cases the bedclothes were pawned to support existence.

Fifteen or sixteen once fairly comfortable homes have been levelled and while I am writing, I hear the steward and his bailiffs are, on Monday next, preparing the same fate for all tenants unable to meet the demand for rent.

"As I have been informed the whole tenancy amounting with their families to over 700 persons on the Ballysaggart estate are proscribed. The land which the tenants got when it was not worth taking, when, according to the evidence given before the Land Commission, by the Very Rev Dr Fogarty (Parish Priest of Lismore at the time), though having it rent free, they found it difficult even to produce the common necessities of life—the food that now by hard labour had been brought under production, and which in these three years of scarcity and famine made little return for the labour expended, must revert to the landlord. The producers of that fertility must be cleared off the estate and from their humble but happy homes but to ensure the impossibility of their making a living, the very year of suffering, hunger and sickness, the landlord issued an order taking from his tenants all rights to the turf lands on their holdings. By this decree many of them lost a valuable source of their small incomes as they were prevented from selling turf which was not needed for their own use."

## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### PRESS EXCLUDED

The ongoing controversy about the parking bye-laws in Dungarvan and the application of on-the-spot fines was taken a step further last Monday night when the local Urban Council held a meeting from which certain members of the Press were excluded to discuss the current position with Garda Superintendent M. English. The reasoning behind the exclusion of the Press is something that I cannot say, perhaps the Urban Councilors did not want to let the public know what they were on about or thought that they could prise more concessions from the Garda authorities in a "star chamber" session.

I understand that the meeting lasted for about two hours and that it was agreed, under pressure, to issue a prepared statement to the press as to what occurred later. This had not come to hand at the time of writing so I have to rely on the information which has leaked through to me. In a nutshell this was that the Superintendent, stood firm against any proposal to allow one hour parking on one side of Main Street, a concession which the Main Street traders who had formed part of the deputation which attended the previous "open" meeting of the Council had sought. However I understand that the Council passed a resolution calling on the Minister to initiate moves to make this change. Whether this was carried unanimously or just by a majority vote, I do not know. I also understand that there was a call for the application of the one hour limit on the parking at Chapel Lane and Lower Main Street. If this is so, it looks as if the Council are hell bent in taking every bit of full-time parking from motorists in the town and that they will have to look for a further public car park as the space there will become overtaxed.

There was quite a bit of reaction to the new enforcement of the on-the-spot fines too, by the street traders who took over the Square on the old monthly "fair day" in Dungarvan on Wednesday last week. Those who parked on the Square had dockets placed on the windscreens of their vehicles but they took little notice as they believe that their street trading licences and the old charter designating the Square as a trading area will supersede the traffic laws and they are prepared to test this issue in the courts.

On a point of information I understand that where a vehicle is illegally parked in a one hour area only one docket can be issued for whatever period it remains there provided the vehicle is not moved. I refer to this as it was one of the topics which was mentioned in my presence when the situation, which has been "the talk of the town" since it blew up, was discussed last week.

But whatever about the claims of the street traders as regards their rights to park and trade on the Square they should be called to book for behind them when they leave on Wednesday evening of last week I went to the Square as up to the last of them was packing up to depart and the whole area was covered with litter. Certainly leaving the town centre in this kind of mess after their visits is really rubbishing it in!

**DEVELOPMENT AWARD FOR RING GAELTACHT**  
As briefly announced in the "Leader" last week the Ring Gaeltacht won a prize of £500 in this year's Gaeltacht Community Development Awards Scheme initiated by Gaeltarra Eireann and sponsored for the first time by the Commission of the European Communities. The prize goes to the Development Committee of An Rinn and at the Dublin presentation of the awards by the Minister for the Gaeltacht, Mr. Denis Gallagher, T.D. last week, Mr. Michael Maye, the regional officer for Gaeltarra, received the award on behalf of the Chairman and Secretary of the Ring Development Committee, Seamus Mac Craith and Tomás O'Ceallaigh who are both teachers. A local presentation in An Rinn is to be arranged.

This year the European Commission joined eleven major Irish companies in co-sponsoring a special prize fund Gaeltarra Eireann's aim in initiating this 5-year scheme three years ago was to encourage the establishment of development committees and groups which would undertake worthwhile development projects within and with the co-operation of their own communities, and to provide through the prize-fund financial assistance for the continued development of such projects.

Thirty-eight communities now participate and the activities in which they have become involved relate to every aspect of life—agriculture, fishing, industry, education, health, tourism and the environment. That Ring came out on top in face of all this competition speaks volumes for their effort and efficiency and they are to be congratulated. The Comhairle Pobail in Ring will decide, in due course, how the prize-money will be spent.
