### AN EXPRESS EXPRESS

Much can be said in favour of the Expressway bus services run by CIE and the facilities they provide in affording fast passages on long journeys for those who have to depend on public transport. And where such services are concerned on an on-the-dot time schedule is a sine qua non. When something occurs that occasions a loss of time it is a matter which is a cause for criticism. However when the reverse occurs and a bus runs ahead of time it can equally be a cause for criticism. When a timetable is arranged it is essential that it should be adhered to if the public for which the service is provided for are to be properly looked after. If a bus is scheduled to depart from a stop point at say 9.20 p.m. then it should certainly not leave before that time whatever may be said for leaving later. And where matters like this are concerned even a few minutes take on a great importance.

I refer to this matter as I have good reason to believe that the Express bus to Cork last Sunday night ran ahead of schedule causing a major inconvenience to at least one traveller. An efficient service is one which keeps up to the time schedule laid down. It becomes no more efficient by showing that it can outpace itself.

### HAS LONG ASSOCIATION WITH OLD BORO'

A recent copy of "The Irish Post" which has a large circulation among the Irish communities in Britain carries an interesting feature on a lady who has had long association with the Old Boro' of Dungarvan. She is Mrs Catherine Boddy who now lives in Newport, South Wales, but who has family connections with the town stretching back for several generations.

Born in Dungarvan 70 years ago, Mrs Boddy was a young girl of 12 years when she moved with her family to Wales. Her father, Michael Hannigan, was a crew member on one of the schooners which plied between Dungarvan and Newport and eventually he decided to settle in Wales in 1919. Up to the time of leaving Dungarvan young Catherine Hannigan was a pupil at the Mercy Convent. In due course she grew up and got married to a local man, Frederick Boddy, in Newport and had one daughter, Frances, now Mrs. Llewellyn James who has a five year old daughter of her own.

Mrs Boddy who is now a widow has never lost her love for her native town and she and her daughter are regular visitors to Dungarvan where they have many friends.

A most interesting fact about Mrs Boddy's association with the town is that her lifeboat crew which went out from Dungarvan to the aid of the ill-fated "Moreby" which was lost off Ballinacourty on Christmas Eve, 1895.

## NEW BRIDGE AT FIDDOWN A SOCIAL NECESSITY

In a report submitted to the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday, the County Engineer Mr J. D. Hally referred to previous discussions on County Council meetings on the question of the repair of Fiddown Bridge and specifically on the question of whether or not Waterford County Council in conjunction with Kilkenny County Council should take over the maintenance of the bridge which is at present the responsibility of CIE.

He pointed out that a report recently commissioned by CIE from a Consulting Engineer stated that the Kilkenny section of the bridge (with a total length of 445 feet 8 ins) was unlikely to function safely for much more than ten years or so even under limited traffic loads. On the other hand the Consulting Engineer considered that in regard to the Waterford span (329 feet 3 ins) there is every reason to believe that this section would have a life expectancy of twenty years or so before renewal would become essential. However during this period the load prohibition on vehicles over one ton laden weight would have to continue to be enforced.

Mr Hally's report went on to say that the probable cost of the new bridge would be of the order of £300,000 and the economies of spending such a large

amount of money on a bridge carrying a relatively small volume of traffic was something which would have to be considered very seriously. However it added "nevertheless the bridge serves a far number of people and its loss would undoubtedly be an inconvenience to the residents of the area."

The report then posed the crucial question in the following terms: given that there is to be a new bridge—who is to pay for it? I see no reason why Waterford County Council should do so and Mr. Eassey, Co. Engineer, Kilkenny, is of like opinion insofar as Kilkenny County Council is concerned.

The report concluded by stating that it is worth noting that assuming the accuracy of the estimate of £300,000 for the bridge, the amount which would be available for the purchase of approximately 2150 cows.

### MEMBERS' VIEWS

Deputy A. Deasy said that they should inform CIE that the Councils would be prepared to maintain the structure if CIE agreed to erect a new bridge.

Clr. T. Kyne—I doubt if they would be prepared to do that.

Clr. M. Henebery said that Fiddown bridge was necessary for the life of the area and the surrounding area for despite what the report stated it carried a great volume of traffic. If the bridge was not put into proper condition there would be a great loss to everyone and this included the farming community, especially where land drainage were concerned.

Aid. W. Kennedy T.D. said that the bridge was a social necessity in the area and something definite would have to be done about it. It was not possible at this stage to estimate what advantages would result to the entire area by having a proper bridge even where four lanes crossing the river would face up to our responsibilities now with Kilkenny County Council he said and get down to setting the job down.

Clr. P. Coffey said that the matter was a 3 way responsibility with CIE having the biggest part but we were not acting up properly and we were trying to put the matter on the County Councils of Waterford and Kilkenny. The replacement of the old bridge was an absolute necessity he said as it was a matter of life and death for the river. Sur for a distance of nearly 30 miles.

Finally on the proposal of Deputy J. Kelly it was agreed that a meeting should be arranged as soon as possible between the County Council members of the Kilkenny and Waterford areas including the Chairman and Vice-Chairman and members of Kilkenny County Council to discuss the position.

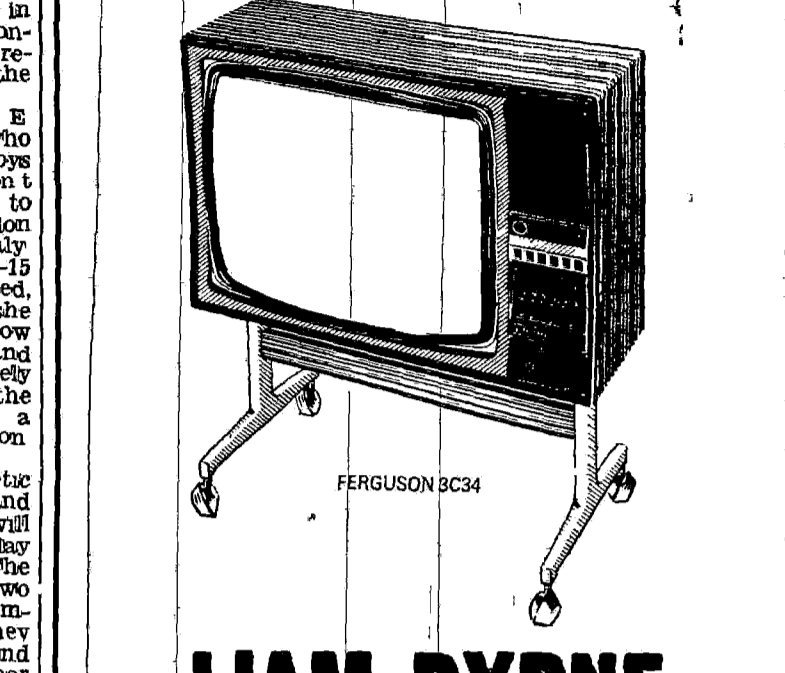
