## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

**REGIONAL HEALTH BOARD ESTIMATES**

The Report and Estimates for the services to be provided for the South Eastern Regional Health Board for 1978 were submitted to a meeting of the Board held in Kilkenny last week. The document is a large and most formidable one which deals with every aspect of the activities carried out under the Board but as far as the general public are concerned the most important fact is the total cost involved.

This is laid out in the introductory report submitted by the Chief Executive Officer of the Board, Mr. P. G. McQuillan in which he points out that the total cost of the services administered by the Board in 1977 was estimated at £35,737,000. To provide at the same level of service in 1978 the estimated cost amounts to £39,417,900.

The report adds that this figure of nearly £40 million is based on wage and price levels current in 1977 so that the true cost of the services for 1978 will be higher than this to the extent that wage and price levels may rise in 1978.

As I have said, the document containing the details of the estimates is a most formidable one as is indeed the total to which they all add up.

**FINE GAEL LEADER VISITS RING COLLEGE**

A distinguished visitor to Ring College on last Saturday morning, November 19, was Mr. Garrett Fitzgerald, Leader of the Fine Gael Party. The visit was of a casual nature made by Mr. Fitzgerald when he was travelling from Wexford to Macroom in the course of his visits to the various constituencies around the county.

For the popular Fine Gael leader the visit was not a first time ever one but one which recalled memories of years gone by when as a student he studied Irish in Ring College in 1935/36, doing refresher courses there in 1938, '39 and '40. But last Saturday was the first occasion on which he was back there since then.

It was natural then that the memories of those years should flood back as he went around the school and saw all the old places which he knew in his youth. He was most impressed by the many new buildings but also expressed pleasure at the fact that the old buildings were still standing in an good order.

The only disappointment of the visit was that he missed the Pádraig Ó Donnabháin, a man he particularly wanted to meet on the occasion. They would have had many stories to swap with each other and memories to revive because when Garrett Fitzgerald was a student in the College, Michael was a member of the staff and was teacher in charge of the dormitory where he stayed.

**GOOD AND BAD**

A Press announcement from the Department of Posts and Telegraphs released last week recalled that in January last year a local telephone call from coinbox telephones would be increased from 4p to 5p and that the increased charge would come into effect later this year according as coinbox mechanisms were altered.

Work on altering the mechanisms of the 30,000 (or so) coinbox telephones in automatic areas is about to start, if it has not already done so, and it is expected that all public coinboxes, for example, those in street kiosks and post offices, will be modified in the course of a month (or so) while all privately rented coinboxes will have been done within a further six weeks (or so).

Callers will need to insert a 5p coin before a local call can be dialed once the modification of the coinbox has been carried out. That is the bit of bad news in the announcement.

However, the public will be sure to welcome the fact that the modification will also provide a facility in the making of trunk calls from coinboxes which has long been called for in that it will be possible to use a 10p piece as well as 5p and 2p coins. It has always been a nuisance when the making of these calls has been concerned that a bagful of small coins was needed to make even a few calls in the past.

The Post Office announcement also pointed out that the charge for a local call from coinbox telephones in non-automatic areas would be deferred until a date to be announced later.

**THE PARISH OF LISMORE AND BALLYDUFF**

This week we continue our little history of the Parish of Lismore and Ballyduff with particular reference to what went on in the Kiely-Ussher estate at Ballysaggartmore in 1847 according to a report compiled by a special press correspondent who visited the area that year. In recent issues we recounted statements given by tenants of the estate as recorded by the correspondent and continue with interviews taken from other tenants at this time.

Denis Lawton, tenant of Mr. Ussher said: "I hold 26 acres of mountain and 1 cm there about ten years last Lady-day I was called up last March to give up the bog on my ground. I refused. My yearly rent is £6-9-7½d. On March 25 I got notice to quit and last week two bailiffs were put on me and the landlord was charging me three shillings a day for them. I took him £5 to Ballysaggartmore House but he refused to take it. Ere yesterday, having sold my horse, I brought £9 to Mr. Smith the agent. Mr. Smith said he could not settle until he saw his master, and then Mr. Ussher told Smith to keep the £9 until he could get £3 more the "cant" day. He seized my cow and two

cows belonging to my sister who lives with me. In eight days more, he will "cant" the cows for £3, the balance due up to last March. The land was all bog and mountain when I went there. Now there are four acres fit for seed but I have nothing to put in them.

Thomas Keefe said he held, jointly with his brothers, 42 acres of mountain land. They were there upwards of fourteen years. When they got the land they had three cows, fourteen sheep and about fifty pounds between them. After all his work, last year he had to sell his stock to feed the family and had not now a grain of seed for the ploughed fields. He expected as he could not pay the rent he would soon be on the road.

Other tenants on the estate are then recorded as having made the following statements. John Landers said that he had 25 acres of mountain at Ballysaggart which he claimed and worked for the past eleven years. On account of the crops failing in these hard years he now owes one and a half year's rent. Mr. Ussher and his steward came and demanded possession but he refused to go with his help. His family who he said were satisfied for a long while, had to live on one meal in the twenty-four hours.

The report then goes on to state that William Windon told me he had forty-five acres of land but fifteen acres of it had been taken off him by the landlord and now that he was unable to meet the rent he had got notice to quit. Pat Bennett also told me he had fifty-two acres from Mr. Ussher but had to give up twenty-two acres of turf ground and now that he was in arrears for some rent all he had was seized by the bailiffs—pigs, cows and almost all he had. He was eleven years working on the land. He had good arable land before he was driven out there.

"James Fitzgerald said that he held twenty acres, good and bad, and was on the holding for nearly twelve years past. When he got it it was all barren mountain. He owed Mr. Ussher two and a half year's rent last March which he was unable to pay because of his losses in the last two years. A few weeks ago Mr. Ussher came and took all he had—oats and rye and did not leave him and his family as much as would get their supper that night. Mr. Ussher "canted" his horse for himself and took it to his farmyard. Afterwards Ussher sent his steward, Smith, to get possession of the house, but he did not obtain it. He had now neither horse, nor sheep, nor goat and had been tilling the mountain for the last twelve years. There were six in family and his wife had to pawn her cloak last week to buy a little meal to keep them from starvation."

From these accounts it can be seen that landlords like Kiely-Ussher were a law unto themselves in those times and treated their tenants like slaves. The tenants had absolutely no redress and the only freedom they seem to have had, after spending their energy for years in turning a barren mountain into arable

land, was to die of starvation and want.

As there has been such a great interest shown in the accounts which we have been reprinting from the history of the time I propose to continue with them. What is left will be dealt with within a few weeks or so and readers anxious to retain the record should cut them out and keep them.

**FIRST SNOW**

The first snow-fall of the winter covered the countryside last week-end bringing with it the usual hazards for everyone. There has been an early onset of winter this year as the weather has been most severe since October. The weather men hold out little hope that things will ease much for the remainder of the month while their forecasts for December indicate a continuation of very cold spells with a possible white Christmas. However, one old weather expert feels that if the worst of the weather comes now it will turn mild later. This would be the hope of us all.

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## FIRST MOVES TO BUILD NEW SECONDARY C.B. SCHOOL IN DUNGARVAN

The absolute necessity of providing a new Christian Brothers Secondary School in Dungarvan to replace the existing outdated building was forcibly stressed at a splendidly attended public meeting in the CBS Hall on Monday night last.

The representative attendance included local public representatives, business and industrial interests and a large cross section of the general community.

With Dept. of Education approval now forthcoming for the school, the most immediate task on hand is the raising of the mandatory local contribution estimated to be £40,000 plus. And when the newly elected committee meet immediately following the public meeting many fund raising possibilities were discussed and three special sub-committees formed to go into the whole question of fund raising.

The public meeting was addressed at the outset by Rev. Bro. Floyd Superior who traced the history of the Brothers since their coming to Dungarvan almost a century and a half ago.

Bro. Floyd told an attentive gathering that the foundation stone of the present secondary school was laid in 1874. In all of that time the people of Dungarvan and district have stood by the Brothers and I am sure that in this latest venture they will do so again, he said.

The meeting was then presided over by Mr. Declan Goode, Chairman, Dungarvan U.D.C. who predicted confidently that the Brothers would find willing support from all quarters in their efforts to raise that £40,000 total.

The meeting was also addressed by Rev. Bro. Nevin who revealed that the Brothers would be giving a free site to the Dept. for the new secondary school. It would embrace the existing garden and part of the playing field. An 80% Dept. grant would be made available for the school and with the aid of the cost likely to be in the region of £170,000 to £200,000 the Brothers would have to find around £40,000 by way of local contribution.

The next step was the appointment of Building Fund Officers and committee and these resulted as follows: President—

At the subsequent meeting of the newly elected officers and committee the mammoth task of fund raising was discussed at length and a number of tentative proposals were formulated. Sub-committees were set up and these will meet on Tuesday night next in the CBS at 8 o'clock.

The most pressing task of the committee is to raise a substantial sum of money quickly and so avoid having to face high bank interest payments. You, the general public will in the final analysis determine how successfully that can be done.

This proposed new school is after all more than a Christian Brothers School. It will be your school and your children's school. The obligation on us all is a heavy one. We are confident that that obligation will be met by all.—P.R.O.

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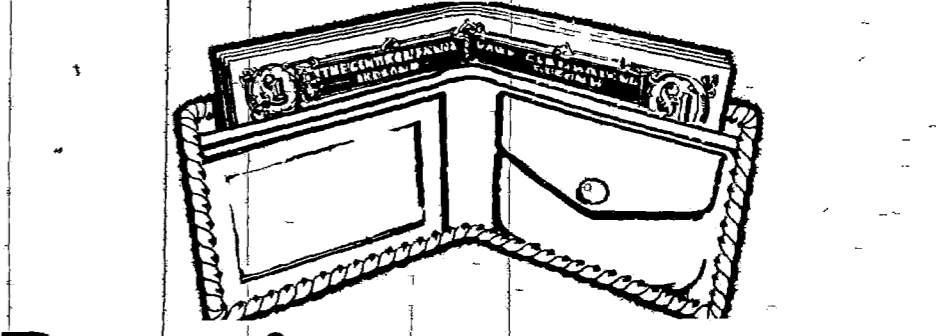
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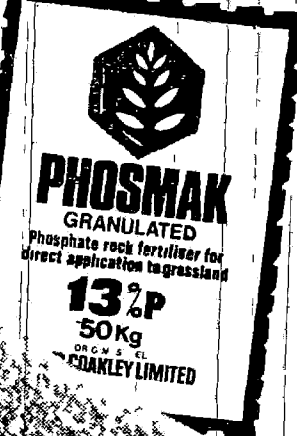
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### TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES
