PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

BAND OF HOPE FOR NIGHT PEDESTRIANS. If you are a pedestrian on the roads these nights or on any night from now on, and you assume you can be easily seen by drivers, then you are making what could be a fatal mistake.

The National Road Safety Association has issued the usual warning to night walkers and an appeal to get into the arm band habit. To be safe a pedestrian must be seen and on wet nights especially car headlights are not always particularly effective while the vision of the drivers in some cases may not also be 100 per cent.

An article of bright clothing is a help but the easiest and most effective way to be seen is to wear a reflective arm band. I have experienced this myself especially along stretches of unlighted country roads. You can find yourself almost on top of a pedestrian dressed in dark clothes before you see them in such situations but the gleam of an arm band will be picked up at more than 150 yards.

It was proven last winter, at proof were needed, that the "arm band habit" is a lifesaver. Get into the habit and be that much safer if you have to walk on the roads after dark.

HOSPITAL DEVELOPMENT PLANS

Preliminary steps towards the development of four major hospitals in Waterford, Wexford, Kilkenny and South Tipperary are planned for 1978 according to an extensive report of the South Eastern Health Board, some details of which were given in last week's "Irish Medical Times".

The Board's aim for development purposes is to develop each of the hospitals in these locations so as to be able to provide general medical, surgical, obstetrical, gynaecological, psychiatric, geriatric and radiological services for their catchment areas. The Waterford hospital will also provide general services in paediatrics, child psychiatry, ENT and ophthalmology pathology and, in due course, orthopaedics and alcoholism.

With regard to the planning of the hospitals to meet the needs of the future, the Board has given first priority to the planning of the new maternity and paediatric departments at Ardkeen hospital, Waterford.

The report states that in the course of the work commenced by a project team in April last on the preparation of a brief for this development, it has become increasingly obvious that it would be unrealistic to expect that the new maternity and paediatric departments will function alone as part of a new hospital.

The Board has now authorised the opening of discussions with the Department of Health to achieve the points set out which, in the case of Ardkeen include a first phase to enable the latter two departments to operate as part of the hospital there.

### INQUEST INTO RING MAN'S DEATH

The circumstances of the death of 81 years old Patrick Tobin, Ballinacorney Ring, a retired Thatcher were the subject of an inquest held by the Coroner for West Waterford Dr J. A. Gallagher Lismore at the Courthouse Dungarvan last week.

Mary Tobin, sister of the deceased, said that her brother was unmarried and they resided together up to the time of his death on Sunday June 19 last. For a few days before that she said that he had complained of being weak and had a nasty cold. On the evening of his death he got out of bed but returned to his bedroom and she then heard him calling her. She went down to him but could not understand what he was trying to say. She went out on to the road at about 8 p.m. and asked a passing motorist to call a doctor. Her brother had never been seriously ill before that and was never attended by a doctor.

Sergeant D. Lacey Ring said that at 8 p.m. on Sunday June 19 John Cuddihy of Ballinacorney called to the Garda Station and said that Mary Tobin had taken him to a doctor for her brother. Having contacted Dr Ann Casey she drove to Tobin's house where he found Patrick Tobin in bed and he appeared to be dead. The body was taken to Dungarvan Hospital by ambulance later the same evening.

Dr Casey gave evidence of examining the body at the hospital on the following day and from this she formed the opinion that death was due to cardiac failure.

### INQUEST STORY OF YOUNG BOY'S DEATH

The story of how 7 years old Tony Hayes, son of Mr and Mrs Anthony Hayes, The Pike Kilnery, Dungarvan, died as a result of a traffic accident outside his home on Thursday, September 15 was told at an inquest held by Dr J. A. Gallagher, Lismore Coroner for West Waterford, sitting with a jury at the Courthouse, Dungarvan last week.

Garda P. Galvin Dungarvan stated that at about 4.30 p.m. on September 15 he arrived at the scene of a traffic accident which had occurred outside Hayes's Public House at Kilnery East on the main Dun garvan Waterford road. He saw the body of a child whom he recognised as Tony Hayes lying on the centre of the road. The child appeared to be dead and was removed by ambulance.

The Garda witness went on to say that the accident occurred as a car was being driven from Waterford towards Cork and apparently as the car was passing the child ran out in front of it. The car involved was stationary at the scene of the accident. The body had been lying on the motorist's corner side of the road.

Dr J. R. Stacey Dungarvan, stated that he was called to the scene of the accident, and on examining the boy's body he found no signs of life. In his opinion the boy's death was due to multiple injuries, which were consistent with being knocked down by a car.

On the advice of the coroner the Garda witness, in accordance with the medical evidence.

The Coroner and Mr John Sheehan (foreman) on behalf of the jury expressed sympathy with the parents on the tragic death of their son and Supt M. English on his own behalf and on behalf of the Garda said that the case was indeed a very sad one and was all the more so as the bereaved parents were so well known to them. He hoped that they would have every consolation possible in the tragedy which they had suffered.

**TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES**

**General Meeting of Credit Union**—Mr Matthew Dineen, President, presented the report on behalf of the Board of Directors at the tenth annual meeting of Tallow area Credit Union held at St Catherine's Hall recently.  
The aim of the report Mr Dineen said was to fully inform the members of what the Board were doing and what they hoped to do in the future. He referred to the request at the ninth annual general meeting for extra opening hours and reported that Friday night opening had been agreed since January last as well as Saturday night, was now proving most successful and justified the extra effort made by the voluntary workers.  
The report went on to say that officers of the Credit Union had regularly attended Chapter meetings as well as Seminars and conventions of which dealt with proposed new legislation for Credit Union—a matter which the Board considered to be of the greatest importance and had spent a lot of time in research and study. It was Mr Dineen said, necessary to participate as fully as possible in such matters so that the workers could learn how to run Credit Union as efficiently as possible.  
In the Treasurer's report, Miss Hartigan revealed a very sound financial growth for year ending on September 30th 1977. Shares on that date were £47,535—an increase of almost £13,000 on previous year. During the year £47,322 was granted in loans and £32,428 repaid. Loans outstanding on September 30th amounted to £43,056. In spite of an increase in expenditure of £5586 (to a large degree due to the purchase of CUNA Insurance as a result of higher shares and loans) Credit Union is still in a position to maintain 6% dividend on shares and 10% on loans. A percentage which exceeds that paid by most financial institutions at present. This dividend was unanimously accepted by members.  
In his report on behalf of Credit Committee Mr Tom Murray stated that a total of £47,322 in loans was granted during the year. The number of such headings and gave amounts granted for each. Because of inflation and demand for larger loans, Mr Murray emphasised the need for greater savings particularly while repaying loans as only in this way could the member be better off financially. He asked that members give as much notice as possible when seeking loans in order that Credit Committee could budget for same.  
Mrs Nora O'Brien in presenting the report of the membership committee said that 51 new members had joined during the year. Total number of full members was now 426—as well as this number of full members (ie members with more than £1 in shares) Credit Union had 109 part members and Mrs O'Brien encouraged these people to reactivate their savings habit and become full members.  
In dealing with the adequacy Mrs O'Brien reported that unfortunately some members did not keep their promise after being granted a loan. Time and again on delinquency officials had to contact these members—sometimes by letter and if that did not work by personal visit—this was time consuming and expensive. She generally expressed her hope that officers were conscious of the fact that it was members' money which was involved and as such had to be safeguarded and protected.  
Fortunately Mrs O'Brien said the number involved was very small and she hoped that they would take note of the fact that the money was their own and that they were given it when they needed it.  
Insurance officer Mrs Sheila Ryan then dealt briefly with CUNA Insurance—gave examples of benefits to members and cost of same.  
Elected to fill 4 vacancies on the Board of Directors were Mrs P O'Brien Mrs H McCarthy Mr T Murray and Mr S Hancock.  
Supervisors elected were George Armstrongs, Alan O'Brien and Thomas Cunningham.
