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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

ABOLITION OF DOMESTIC RATES

Rates on domestic dwellings have been abolished as from January 1 last and consequently private house owners will no longer have to pay rates as they have had to do up to this.

An aspect of the situation which now results has already been given some publicity and it was referred to again at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday it is something that I should be referred to in this column. This concerns tenants of houses or indeed of flats who have been paying a combined rent and rates charge for their dwellings. Where a charge for rates has been included as part of the rent these tenants are entitled to whatever relief results from the remission of the rates and landlords should be required to set that such reliefs are passed on to their tenants.

At last Monday's County Council meeting, Cllr George Armstrong who raised the point was informed by the Co Secretary that all the Council could do in the matter was to write to the major landlords in the County and point out to them that no domestic rates were payable since January 1. It was further agreed that if individuals concerned would write into the Council indicating the house which they occupied they could be informed what rates were chargeable on their premises.

On the suggestion of Cllr Con Casey it was also agreed that representations be made to the Minister for the Environment to ensure that the relief also be applied in the case of house occupiers who did a Bed and Breakfast trade during the summer tourist season. Cllr Casey said that many of these people were now afraid that they would not qualify for the relief because of this and he held that because of the short period of the tourist season they should not be classed as business premises.

POLLUTION CONTROL

Included in the annual estimates for 1978 adopted last week by Waterford County Council was a sum of £34,294 for pollution control in the county. This is an increase of £33,000 over the amount included in last year's estimate and the increase is accounted for by the enactment of the Local Government (Water Pollution) Act 1977 which now imposes on local authorities functions in relation to licensing of discharges to waters, the sampling and monitoring of waters and the preparation of Management Plans for waters and the collection of data on water extractions.

Some of the provisions of the Act will be brought into operation on April 1 next and it is anticipated that further provisions will be brought into force later in the year. To carry out the service a regional laboratory for testing samples will be set up.

From this it would appear that from now on the County Council will be the controlling body where all questions of pollution are concerned within the county. In view of the recent complaints made by the Freshwater Anglers Club in Dungarvan against the local Urban Council in regard to pollution of the river Colligan from the Council's town dump, it will be interesting to see what action the County Council will take through this new agency.

WAS EARLY GAEILIC BROADCASTER

The death of Very Rev Henry Conway former Parish Priest of Powerstown-Lisronagh, Clonmel which occurred last week at the age of 93 years recalls the early years of broadcasting in this country.

Fr Harry who was a native of Old Parish was a well-

known Gaelic scholar and a fluent Irish speaker. Educated in St John's College Waterford, he was ordained in 1909 and served a term on the Missions in Liverpool. On his recall to the home diocese of Waterford and Lismore he served as a curate at the Cathedral, Waterford, Ring, Tournaneen, Ballylooby, Ard-finnan and Abbeyside.

In 1943 he was appointed Parish Priest of Kilgobinet where he remained until 1951 when he became Parish Priest to Powerstown-Lisronagh. He retired in 1971.

His associations with the Irish language went back to his childhood days in Old Parish and following his studies he became an accepted authority on the language. With Canon McGrath, Ard-finnan he was amongst the earliest broadcasters from the radio station in Cork in a programme entitled "Beirt Dheiseach".

Fr Harry was buried in Powerstown last Monday morning. His death at such an advanced age will also play a part in the final game in the League of the section Westerly Board Officers this week to prepare Convention and to consider resumption of the year after February.

COUNCIL CALL FOR APPOINTMENT OF PRO AND COMPLAINTS OFFICER

He had very strong views on this matter as a result of discussions which he had with other members and from his own personal experience said Mr C Curran Chairman Waterford County Council when he proposed a motion at the monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday calling on the Council to appoint a PRO and Complaints Officer. Mr Curran stated that he had written six letters to the Engineering Section of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday calling on the Council to appoint a PRO and Complaints Officer.

Mr T Kyne supporting the motion said that he found the same difficulty in getting replies. He thought that if there was one person available who could communicate with all sections of the Council and get an answer out to members one way or another it would be done.

MORE GERMANS, FRENCH AND DUTCH COME

A record number of tourists from Germany, France and the Netherlands visited Ireland during 1977, spending up to 42 per cent more than their fellow-countrymen in the previous year. This figure is way above the average increase in tourism revenue generally of 27 per cent.

According to Bord Failte's review of 1977, the biggest increase, both in the number of tourists and in the amount of money they spent here, came from Germany, France and Holland. An estimated 83,000 Germans and 63,000 French visitors came here last year representing an increase of 24 per cent over 1976. Between them they spent £18 million, 43 per cent up on the previous year.

The number of visitors from the Netherlands—37,000 last year—increased by 28 per cent and revenue was up 41 per cent to £3.8 million. Like Germany, revenue from this market doubled over the last three years, while numbers of visitors are now twice what they were when Ireland first became a member of the European Community.

SEA HAS CLAIMED 100 ACRES IN ARDMORE AREA

The serious nature of coastal erosion along the coastline of County Waterford was once again discussed at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr A Deasy T.D. referred to the continuing roads being made by the sea in the Ardmore area at Whiting Bay, Glenorchy and Ballynoe and said that in order to deal with the problem they would need a huge embankment by the State.

Mr J D Hally County Engineer said that while the Ardmore area was badly hit they had a similar problem in the coastline from Duncannon where the cliffs were at present being undermined to Ferryport near Youghal. Ballynoe and Cloone were also badly affected and he said that he had been pressurising the Board of Works since 1964 to have this job done.

Mr C Curran Chairman said that in the Ardmore area the land on one particular farm was badding into the sea over time.

Mr Hally said that over the past 30 to 40 years the loss of land due to erosion in the Whiting Bay area was as much as 100 acres and the first Irish College in Ardmore stood at one time where the sea now was.

Deputy Deasy told the Council that he had discussed the matter informally with the Minister of State for Public Works Mr Patsy Wyse in Dublin last week and Mr Wyse had expressed his willingness to meet a delegation from the Council to discuss the matter.





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**CONDITIONS GOVERNING
GRAZING LETTINGS OF
LAND COMMISSION LANDS**

As part of the national campaign for the eradication of Brucellosis and Bovine Tuberculosis, grazing lettings in the Brucellosis Eradication Area will be made only to herd owners who can produce certificates from the District Veterinary Office showing that their herds are not restricted under the disease eradication schemes. Such certificates will be valid for one month only from date of issue.

In the case of lettings by public auction it will be essential for prospective lessees to produce valid certificates at the auction, as a letting division cannot be "knocked down" until the certificates have been checked.

In the case of "per head" lettings, bullocks only will be accepted, subject to herdowners producing certificates that their herds are not restricted in respect of tuberculosis.

Counties in the Brucellosis Eradication Area are Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Cavan, Monaghan, Mayo, Dublin, Clare, Galway, Longford, Louth, Meath, Roscommon, Westmeath and North Offaly.

Herdowners in the remaining counties will not be allowed to rent land in the Brucellosis Eradication Area. They may rent land outside that area, provided certificates are obtained from the District Veterinary Office to the effect that their herds are not restricted in respect of tuberculosis.

Lost in the fire also was all the band equipment of the Monkfish group. They had been rehearsing in Redbarn on Wednesday and had left the equipment there. They are well known on Dungarvan where they have played regularly at Minnie's and the Deva. A member of the group, Ben Brittan told a "Leader" reporter that because of the loss they had sustained they would be unable to fulfil any engagements for the next three or four weeks.

YOUTH CHARGED

A 16-year-old youth appeared in custody before District Justice W. O'Connell at Youghal Court last Friday on charges relating to the fire at the Ballroom.

The youth was charged with unlawfully and wilfully setting fire to Redbarn Dance Hall the property of Jeremiah Ducey on January 4 last and with wilfully and maliciously committing damage to the dance hall and restaurant to the amount of £125,000 of the property of Jeremiah Ducey.

The accused was further charged with entering Redbarn Dance Hall on the same occasion as a trespasser and stealing £2 in cash.

District Justice O'Connell granted the remand in custody but consented to bail in the accused own bond of £200 or two of £100 each on a cash lodgment in court of £200.

Supt. M. P. Byrne appeared for the Director of Public Prosecutions while Mr. J. Lavan, Sol. (P. J. Lavan and Co.) was assigned by the court to represent the accused under a free legal aid certificate.
