## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### ABOLITION OF DOMESTIC RATES

Rates on domestic dwellings have been abolished as from January 1 last and consequently private house owners will no longer have to pay rates as they have had to do up to this point.

An aspect of the situation which now results has already been given some publicity and as it was referred to again at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council last Monday it is something that I feel should be referred to in this column. This concerns tenants of houses or indeed of flats who have been paying a combined rent and rates charge for their dwellings. Where a charge for rates has been included as part of the rent these tenants are entitled to whatever relief results from the remission of the rates and landlords should be required to set that such reliefs are passed on to their tenants.

At last Monday's County Council meeting, Cllr George Armstrong who raised the point was informed by the County Secretary that all the Council could do in the matter was to write to the major landlords in the County and point out to them that no domestic rates were payable since January 1. It was further agreed that if individuals concerned would write into the Council indicating the house which they occupied they could be informed what rates were chargeable on their premises.

On the suggestion of Cllr Con Casey it was also agreed that representations be made to the Minister for the Environment to ensure that the rate relief also be applied in the case of house occupiers who did a Bed and Breakfast trade during the summer tourist season. Cllr Casey said that many of these people were now afraid that they would not qualify for the relief because of this and he held that because of the short period of the tourist season they should not be classed as business premises.

### POLLUTION CONTROL

Included in the annual estimates for 1978 adopted last week by Waterford County Council was a sum of £24,294 for pollution control in the county. This is an increase of £33,000 over the amount included in last year's estimate and the increase is accounted for by the enactment of the Local Government (Water Pollution) Act 1977 which now imposes on local authorities functions in relation to licensing of discharges to waters, the sampling and monitoring of waters and the preparation of Management Plans for waters and the collection of data on water extensions.

Some of the provisions of the Act will be brought into operation on April 1 next and it is anticipated that further provisions will be brought into force later in the year. To carry out the service a regional laboratory for testing samples will be set up.

From this it would appear that from now on the County Council will be the controlling body where all questions of pollution are concerned within the county. In view of the recent complaints made by the Freshwater Anglers Club in Dungarvan against the local Urban Council in regard to pollution at the river Colligan from the Council's town dump, it will be interesting to see what action the County Council will take through this new agency.

### MORE GERMANS, FRENCH AND DUTCH GAME

A record number of tourists from Germany, France and the Netherlands visited Ireland during 1977, spending up to 43 per cent more than their fellow-countrymen in the previous year. This figure is way above the average increase in tourism revenue generally of 17 per cent.

According to Bord Fáilte's review of 1977, the biggest increase, both in the number of tourists and in the amount of money they spent here, came from Germany, France and Holland. An estimated 83,000 Germans and 63,000 French visitors came here last year representing an increase of 24 per cent over 1976. Between them they spent £18 million, 43 per cent up on the previous year.

The number of visitors from the Netherlands—37,000 last year—increased by 28 per cent and revenue was up 41 per cent to £3.8 million. Like Germany, revenue from this market doubled over the last three years, while numbers of visitors are now twice what they were when Ireland first became a member of the European Community.

## COUNCIL CALL FOR APPOINTMENT OF PRO AND COMPLAINTS OFFICER

He had very strong views on the matter as a result of discussions which he had with other members and from his own personal experience said Mr. C. Curran Chairman Waterford County Council when he proposed a motion at the monthly meeting of the Council in Dungarvan last Monday calling on the Council to appoint a PRO and Complaints Officer.

Mr. Curran stated that he had written six letters to the Engineering Section of the Council and had got no reply to any of them.

Mr. J. J. Hally County Engineer said that he found the same difficulty in getting replies. He thought that if there was one person available who could communicate with all sections of the Council and get an answer to its members one way or another it would be much more satisfactory. "I don't want to knock any official about but when he is asked for an answer to its members one way or another it would be much more satisfactory."

Mr. J. J. Hally County Engineer said complaints of a similar nature were voiced some years ago but when he asked for specific details he got none. He assured the members that if any detailed complaints were brought to his notice he would deal with them either personally or no were sent to the members concerned.

Mr. K. O'Riordan said he was totally opposed to the motion as he believed that there was a good service from the officials.

Deputy J. Fahy agreed with the motion as he believed that the appointment of such a person within the Council would be a benefit for the public as well as for the members. He said that when the public wanted to make an enquiry to the Council they found it impossible to trace to whom it should be directed.

Mr. C. O'Connell, County Manager said that in view of the limitations on this year's estimates no additional posts could be created. He thought the solution to the problem was to look into the particular sections involved. He said he would do his best to see that it was resolved in this way.

The Chairman said that when he had raised this matter previously he had got similar assurances but he was not satisfied.

Mr. O'Connell said that no one person could know now to deal with all the complaints. The only people who understood the problems raised were the people who worked in the various departments. He added that the volume of correspondence to the public was fairly high and the volume of attention given to their queries was also fairly high.

Mr. T. Healy said that on any occasion on which he had found it necessary to write a letter to the Council he had always received a reply.

Mr. M. Henery said that it would be much better if the members laid down their pens and made personal contact with the officials concerned.

Mr. P. Crotty said that it appeared that some members must wanted letters to show that they were doing certain things that he be given an opportunity to look into the matter. It was agreed to adjourn the motion until the next meeting.

## COUNCIL CALL TO LOCATE AIRSTRIP IN CO WATERFORD

On the proposal of Cllr M. Henery Portlaoise, seconded by Cllr P. Coffey, Waterford County Council at its monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Monday unanimously passed a resolution calling on the Department of Transport and Power to ensure that the proposed airstrip for the region be located in County Waterford.

Cllr Henery recalled that some years ago they had pointed out the need to have an airstrip to service the region established in the county and a great deal of research had been carried out on a site at Coolin Portlaoise which was found to be most suitable and central. He said that the proposal was treated as a joke then but was now a very live prospect but wanted to have it located in Co. Kilkenny. "I said Cllr Henery 'as a Waterford man protest against that. We have a suitable site at Portlaoise and the Council should move to see that it is located there."

Deputy J. Fahy fully supported the proposal and Cllr Coffey said that when he and Cllr Henery initially suggested that the airstrip be located at Coolin they felt at the time that the necessity for it was there. Now he added everyone feels that such a necessity is there.

## SEA HAS CLAIMED 100 ACRES IN ARDMORE AREA

The serious nature of coastal erosion along the coastline of County Waterford was once again discussed at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr. A. Deasy T.D. referred to the containing roads being made by the sea in the Ardmore area. Whiting Bay, Glenorrin and Ballymore and said that in order to deal with the problem they would need a huge subvention by the State.

Mr. J. J. Hally County Engineer said that what he had in mind was a badly laid out area which had a similar problem all along the coastline from Dunmore where the cliffs were at present being undermined to Farrington near Umayah, Ballymore and Clonra where he had been present pursuing the Board of Works since 1964 to have this job done.

Mr. C. Curran Chairman said that in the Ardmore area the land on one particular farm was collapsing into the sea overnight.

Mr. Hally said that over the past 30 to 40 years the loss of land due to erosion in the Ardmore area was as much as 100 acres and the first Irish College in Ardmore stood at one time where the sea now was.

Deputy Deasy told the Council that he had discussed the matter informally with the Minister of State for Public Works, Mr. Pearse Wyse T.D., in Dublin last week and Mr. Wyse had expressed his willingness to meet a deputation from the Council to discuss the matter. Mr. Deasy thought that instead of sending a deputation to Dublin it might be better if they invited the Minister and his officials to meet them in Ardmore where they could see at first hand for themselves the destruction being caused by the sea.

Mr. P. Crotty said that it was passes that in Holland they spent vast sums of money to

reclaim land from the sea but here they could get none to stop the erosion of their land by the sea.

Finally it was agreed to ask the Minister to receive a deputation from the Council to discuss the problem and if possible that he and his officials should visit Ardmore to see the position for themselves.

In the event of the Minister agreeing to the request it was agreed that the members of the Council from the Dungarvan electoral area together with the T.D.s should form the deputation.
