### CAPPOQUIN CPO INQUIRY TO RE-OPEN

An official government notice published in last week's "Leader" indicates that the Minister for the Environment, Mr. Sylvester Barrett, TD, has ordered that the public local inquiry into the application of Waterford County Council for a Compulsory Purchase Order relating to certain lands portion of which are owned by Sir Richard Keane in Cappoquin be reopened on next Wednesday morning, January 25 at 11 o'clock to hear an objection which he has received against the confirmation of the Order.

The Inquiry was initially held on June 29 of last year when an objection against the Order was lodged by the land-owner. In a letter to Deputy Austin Deasy dated December 22, the Minister stated that after careful consideration of the evidence tendered and adduced at the inquiry, he now found it necessary to direct that it be re-opened for the purpose of obtaining further evidence on housing needs and the availability of any alternative housing sites in the Cappoquin area.

The Minister's Inspector appointed to hold the Inquiry, Mr. R. H. Dobbyn, F.R.I.A.I. will sit at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on next Wednesday to hear such further evidence and will subsequently report his findings and

### WE'RE STILL NOT THE WORST

It may feel as if a record sum on alcohol was spent again over the Christmas and New Year holidays and while, without doubt, the amount spent in pubs, lounge bars and hotels did far exceed that of previous years, and contrary to popular belief, the Irish do not seem to head the European drink statistics. At least that appears to be so according to the latest survey of alcohol consumption within the European Community based on 1976 figures.

The country with the highest alcohol drinking in the Community during 1976 was Luxembourg with 41 litres (a little more than 7 pints) of distilled alcohol per person. Ireland, at 1.98 litres (roughly 3½ pints), lies in sixth place, behind Germany (2.83 litres), France (2.5 litres), Netherlands (2.49 litres) and Italy (2.0 litres). The United Kingdom is placed last with 1.66 litres per head.

"But in the beer-drinking league, Ireland moves up to fourth place consuming 123 litres (almost 218 pints) of beer per person. Germany leads with a consumption rate of 150.9 litres (almost 265 pints), followed by Belgium (145 litres) and Luxembourg (130 litres). And the country where they drank least beer in 1976 was Italy with a

consumption rate of only 13.9 litres (24 pints) per person. However while these were the figures for 1976 it would seem that we are moving up fast in the "shorts" league whatever about the pints position and that the results for 1977 will bear this out when they come to hand.

## DRUNK DRIVING CHARGE DISMISSED

District Justice W. F. O'Connell stated at Dungarvan Court that if a motorist is found to be driving his car in a perfectly normal manner he is then entitled to an acquittal if charged with drunk driving.

That was his decision when Patrick Ahearne, Kereen, Aglish Cappoquin, pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunk driving at the Causeway, Dungarvan on April 2nd last.

Sergeant Hurley, Garda Traffic Corps, told the court that he and other members were conducting a routine traffic check at the Causeway, Dungarvan on the night in question. He saw the defendant's car approaching and it was being driven in a perfectly normal manner.

However, having stopped it and spoken to Ahearne, he asked the defendant to take a breath test.

Ahernae refused to do so, but Sergeant Hurley took the breath test. Witness informed the opinion Ahernae was drunk and unfit to drive.

Garda F. Hannigan and Sergeant M. Hayes also expressed the opinion that Ahernae was unfit to drive.

Mr. E. P. King, Solicitor, asked for a direction, however, on the grounds that the charge against the defendant was drunk driving and this being an offence of having a proper control over a mechanically propelled vehicle. The evidence of Sergeant Hurley however was in stark contrast because the

District Justice O'Connell however held that under the same interpretation of the Act he would have to dismiss the charge in this case.

The Act states that and I quote: "The District Justice went on, driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor to such an extent as to be incapable of exercising proper control over a vehicle." But very recently Sergeant Hurley said in evidence that there was nothing whatever wrong with the defendant's driving though he did arrangements for the collection.






## "National Games A Way Of Life"

### CHAIRMAN'S ADDRESS TO WESTERN CONVENTION

It is gratifying in the extime to look back on to a year when supporters turned out in greater numbers than ever before to see our games enjoy the thrill of championship battles and to show by the attendance at the games in record numbers that in West Waterford the National games are not alone alive and vibrant, but constitute almost a way of life as far as many people are concerned?

So said Mr John A Murphy Chairman, when he addressed the 52nd annual convention of the West Waterford GAA Board held at Cappoquin on Sunday last.

That in itself, Mr Murphy told the record attendance (162 delegates) should be one spur to ensure that in the years to come the good work now so firmly under way will not alone be maintained but intensified.

Referring to 1977 as "Gael Year" Mr Murphy said that Waterford had been honoured with the task of staging the remarkably successful national week end festival for the young and he was happy to say they had come through with flying colours.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Secretary in a very comprehensive report covering all aspects of the Board's activities reported on another successful year in which membership increased significantly. However, he was critical of players arriving late for games, the spectacle of officials pursuing the play up and down the sidelines while play was in progress, mentors running into the playing fields, and clubs who sought postponements for trivial reasons.

#### LUNATIC MADNESS

Having praised and thanked everyone for the work they put in to organise the Feile, the Chairman said that from what he had said so far it might be construed that everything in the garden was rosy and that pictures were conspicuous by their absence. This however was not the case.

We continue," the Chairman said, "to witness a growth too rapid in recent games and indeed for a two week spell of lunatic madness during last year referees sent off players in important championship games with a frequency that was disconcerting to say the least."
