A MATTER OF SURVIVAL

A recent report on the Irish provincial newspaper industry up to 1975 and projections into the 1980s in which growth and methods to be adopted for survival are referred to has been commented on by the Provincial Newspapers Association of Ireland. The report known as the 'Colin' McIver report has been prepared following a survey of the position in which the provincial newspapers of the country at present find themselves because of rising costs, increased taxation and the changing technology in printing.

One of the comments on the report by the PNAI states: "As an Association we are concerned with the future of every provincial newspaper and few could cope with an expressed special concern for the weaker among us, because they will require a very high order of consideration to survive. For that reason we can direct the attention of the Government to the high taxation which has denuded provincial newspapers of adequate capital reserves to modernise and keep abreast of printing trends and competitiveness, compelling them to enter into large borrowing commitments at a time when profitability has been declining to alarming levels. We can compare our situation with that of newspapers in Europe where there are special tax concessions and in Northern Ireland where there is no Value Added Tax on either cover charges or advertisements."

The PNAI comment goes on to state: "The heavy investment programme which many companies will have to undertake in order to remain competitive should be acknowledged and adequate and appropriate Government support provided in order to minimise job losses in what is still a very labour intensive industry."

The PNAI has been campaigning for a long time to have the VAT on sales reduced to a level which would be in line with EEC standards, at present the rate charged here is more than double that in the rest of the Community. Germany and Luxembourg Promises have been made to do something to introduce a more equitable system but so far these promises have failed to materialise.

The time has now come for the Government to introduce some tangible scheme to bring relief and the provincial newspapers will be gravely disappointed and disillusioned having regard to the promises already made and to the unfair position of the Irish Provincial Press when compared with their European counterparts if it cannot be offered before, or at Budget time.

THE DUNGARVAN TOWN DUMP

The ongoing agitation mounted by the recently reformed Dungarvan Freshwater Anglers Club against the proposals of the local Urban Council to extend the town dump located on the banks of the river Colligan at Ballinamuck was taken a step further during the week of meetings of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council.

At the meeting of the County Council on Monday afternoon the Chairman referred to a request which he had sent from the Club to allow a delegation to address the Council about their claims that the dump was polluting the river and so that he had made no decision as yet. The Council should first discuss the matter. Following a brief discussion the Council agreed that the club should first put their case in writing so that the members could consider the points raised and a decision could then be made

about receiving a deputation

The Co. Manager stated that when the dump was originally located at Ballinamuck, the County Council had to give planning permission to the Urban Council for the use of the land for that purpose. Deputy Austin Deasy then suggested that a copy of that planning permission showing the conditions set out in it might be made available to the Angling Club. The Manager added that the Urban Council had now purchased the additional land adjoining the existing dump in anticipation of future needs but they had so far made no application for planning permission for this.

At a meeting of the Urban Council on Monday night the matter was again raised by Deputy Deasy and during the discussion here the Co. Manager said that as far as he was concerned there was no urgency about the matter as it would be ten years before the land now purchased would be needed as an extension of the existing dump.

Members who expressed doubts about the pollution of the river from the conditions that prevail there at present had their concern somewhat allayed when the Town Clerk told them that on the previous Thursday he had visited the dump accompanied by the Fishery Inspector of the Waterford Board of Conservators and an Anti-Pollution Officer of the Department. It was then arranged, he said, that readings of the river water would be taken by the Officer above and below the dump on a number of different occasions throughout the coming year and the result of these readings would then be made available to the Council.

The Council agreed to await this report which they felt would decide one way or the other if the dump was in fact polluting the river and it would appear that from the official angle matters must be left to lie there until this report comes to hand.

However, the Anglers Club appear anxious to pursue their agitation and the Club's PRO James Kiley has told me that they regard the dump as the biggest danger not only to the river but to the town as well. As part of their ongoing movement he urges that not only the members of the club but all who wish to live in healthy surroundings to attend a meeting of the Dungarvan Environment Protection Association which concerns itself with all aspects of pollution to be held at the Ormonde Hotel on next Saturday night, January 28 at 8.30 p.m.

THE QUESTION OF CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Before the Dail recessed for Christmas holidays (they end only next week) the Minister for Justice, Mr Gerry Collins, T.D. stated that he had no proposals to put before the Government to change the present law covering capital punishment (hanging) in the Republic. This extreme form of punishment is covered by the Criminal Justice Act, 1964, and it restricts the death penalty to treason, to certain military offences and to the offence of capital murder, namely murder of a member of the Garda Síochána or of a prison officer acting in the course of duty, murder done in the course of or furtherance of the activities of an unlawful organisation and murder done in the course of furtherance of the activities of certain offences under the Offences Against the State Act, 1939, or in the course of furtherance of the activities of an unlawful organisation and murder in the State for a political motive of a member of a foreign Government or of a foreign diplomat.

Dungarvan To Have Population Of Over 10,000 By 1991

The South Eastern Regional Development Organisation has made population projections for the Region and for the various urban areas in the Region. For Dungarvan they estimate a 1981 population of approximately 7,500 and a 1991 figure of approximately 10,500.

This was one of the major forecasts contained in the 1977 Draft Longrange Development Plan which has been prepared by Town Planning Consultants Shesgreen Keane and Partners. The Dungarvan Urban Council and which was presented to the Council at their monthly meeting last Monday night.

The plan which has projections up to 1991 was presented by Mr John Reid with an extra 250 acres or a total of 505 acres for development. Of this total some 140 acres would be for industrial purposes.

The plan states that within the overall framework of the growth principles for the period leading up to 1991, the Council would seek to promote the growth of the town in an orderly fashion and in order to encourage sporadic or piecemeal development. It estimates that in the first five years up to 1982, 145 acres would be required for new urban uses but the plan provides for an extra 250 acres or a total of 505 acres for development. Of this total some 140 acres would be for industrial purposes.

POPULATION
Dealing with the population projection the plan states that in 1901 the population of Dungarvan Urban District was 4,850, in 1961 it was 5,188, but by 1966 it had risen to 5,380 (+ 3.7%) and by 1971 it had gone to 5,583 (+ 3.8%). The current population is estimated

to be approximately 6,850. The report then goes on to state: "The rate of increase in the town can be attributed not only to the natural increase of the resident population but also to a considerable degree of immigration generated by the increasing prosperity of Dungarvan in terms of employment and other services. For the purposes of this plan the Council is accepting these estimates and the figures for the future projected population would represent an average annual growth rate of approximately 8.1% which seems quite reasonable in the light of recent events."

HOUSING
To meet this projected rise in population over the next 15 years the report states that a total of 1,294 new houses will be required and the main areas allocated in the plan for house-

ing development are (1) an area to the north of the town in Shannon (near Cable Mart); (2) an area stretching outward from Gallowshill along both sides of the Cappoquin road; (3) a wide area at Abbeyside stretching from Monagh around the coast to Skehaarne.

ROAD DEVELOPMENT
The plan provides for main and secondary road development including the route for the proposed relief route on the arterial road and for parking and traffic control and the various other aspects of development within the urban area while it also suggests the erection of a weir at the old railway bridge at Abbeyside to turn the Colligan estuary into a freshwater lake.

Having listened to the resume of the Plan given by Mr Reid the Council unanimously agreed to adjourn further consideration to next meeting.

GO MANAGER'S PLAN TO SOLVE COMPLAINTS PROBLEM

Complaints made by several members about the failure to provide written replies in regard to their queries at the previous meeting of Waterford County Council were referred to at the Council's meeting in Dungarvan last Monday. Replying to the queries in the name of the Chairman, Mr C. Curran calling for the appointment of a PRO and Complaints Officer, the County Manager, Mr C. O'Connell said that he had considered the matter since the last meeting and he now proposed a plan as a result of which he hoped that complaints made would, as far as possible, be dealt with in a more expeditious manner. In the future all correspondence from members be addressed to the Secretary as this would mean a central channel for all letters. In addition, a number of senior officials of the Council would be present at each meeting to whom details of correspondence could be given by members. The Council agreed to the suggestion that the solution put forward by the Co. Manager be given a trial for 6 months.

EAST WATERFORD WATER SUPPLY

On the proposal of Cllr. Tom Healy seconded by Cllr. Mick Heineby, Waterford County Council at a meeting in Dungarvan last Monday unanimously passed a resolution consenting to the abstraction of water from the rivers, Clodagh and Mahon to serve the East Waterford Water Supply Scheme. Mr J. Hally, Co. Engineer, told the Council that it was proposed to take the water from the Clodagh upstream from the tannery at Portlaw. It was legally necessary to have the consent passed before the work could be commenced. He said that agreement had been reached with the tannery and Lord Waterford. Mr Hally added that in a dry year the minimum measured flow of water in the river was 5.3 million gallons and they proposed to abstract 4.5 million gallons of this. He said that it was also proposed to place treatment works for the scheme at Adams'own, Kilmadden. At a later stage they would proceed to abstract water from the Mahon near Kilmachomas when it was found necessary to do so. Cllr. P. Cahill complained that there had been no water in Kilmachomas since the previous Friday and he warned that the Council should take steps to conserve supplies as water would be very scarce this year adding that all the streams which he had examined in the last few weeks were well below their usual level for this time of year.
