## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### NATIONAL CAMPAIGN WILL EMPHASISE IMPORTANCE OF HYGIENE

The Minister for Health and Social Welfare, Mr. Charles J. Haughey gave details in Dublin last Monday of the national campaign he is about to launch to make this country a cleaner and healthier place in which to live, not just for tourists but for all citizens.

The campaign will be operated through the media, the health inspectors of the various Health Boards, the schools and more importantly through the co-operation of the general public who are being asked to demand higher standards of hygiene.

The Minister specifically included dirty pubs and unhygienic restaurants in his strictures and said that all premises dealing with the provision of food and drink for public consumption would come under close supervision.

Mr. Haughey who is now a non-drinker and non-smoker himself has been stressing the importance of health measures which should be adopted by the public for their own benefit for some time past.

It is to be hoped that the new campaign which he has now launched will receive the fullest co-operation of everybody in all age groups.

## HIGH PRICE FOR FORMER DUNGARVAN BANK PREMISES

Much interest centred last week in the sale by public auction of the former Provincial Bank premises at Bridge Street, Dungarvan and after keen bidding the premises was eventually knocked down to the Waterford Co-op Society for the high price of £114,000.

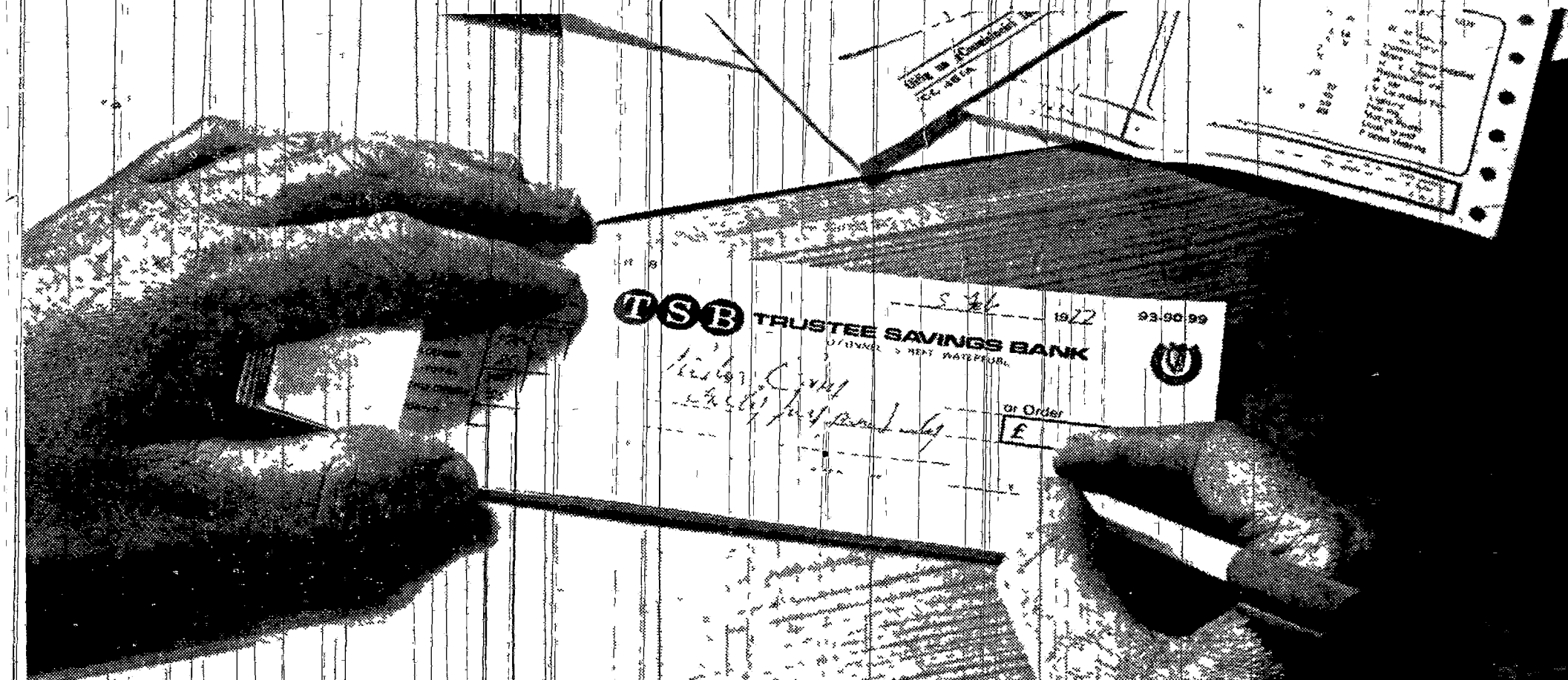
