**FARMERS ADVISED TO KEEP DETAILED FARM MANAGEMENT ACCOUNTS**

In a statement issued during the past week Mr. Brian McGee, Director of the Department of Agriculture, advised farmers of some of the implications of the 1978 budget.

Some of the major effects of the 1978 budget for farmers is that time farmers with 600 PLY and over will be liable for income tax.

The multiplier for calculating the notional income has been increased from 0.65 to 0.90 per cent.

Farmers when opening for the notional or the accounts system of making tax returns will be tied to that system for the next three years.

The Irish Farm Accounts Co-operative was established by the Government in 1967 to help farmers to set up their own farm management accounts and backed by an Agricultural Advisory Services offering a comprehensive package to farmers which includes:

- \* Farm Management Accounts
- \* A tax service backed up by the relevant Farm Management Accounts data.
- \* Farmers who keep accounts just for making tax returns will lose out and would be wise to base their account keeping on the farm management account to supplement this with reliable tax advice and returns.

**BIG IMPROVEMENT IN GRANTS FOR PRIVATE FORESTRY**

The Minister for Fisheries Mr. Brian Lemhan has announced big improvements in grants for the planting of trees by private landowners as follows:

- The grant has been increased from £35 to £90 for each acre planted up to 40 acres and is payable in three instalments — £30 on formation of plantation; £20 after 5 years; £20 after 10 years.
- There will be an additional grant of £50 for a plantation comprised entirely of broadleaved trees making the total rate for such planting £140 on formation of plantation; £30 after 5 years; £30 after 10 years.
- The additional grant for scrub clearance is being increased to a maximum of £20 per acre (formerly £20 per acre).
- The grant for poplar planting is being increased to £50 per acre payable in two instalments — £25 on formation of plantation and £25 on or after 1st October 1977.

The second instalment of grants falling normally due under earlier schemes are to be doubled.

The grants will apply as hitherto to areas of not less than one acre except in the case of the Co. Wick where areas must be not less than one half acre. The grant on areas in excess of 40 acres will be £50 per acre payable in two instalments.

Free technical advice will be available as hitherto to planters.

The revised provisions represent a substantial improvement on the previous scheme and the Minister hopes that land owners will be encouraged to undertake planting on lands which might otherwise be unused.

Grants will continue to be paid at the discretion of the Minister and prospective planters are advised to seek full particulars from the Secretary, Forest and Wildlife Service, 22, Upper Merrion St. Dublin 2.

**PROVISIONAL ROAD DEATH FIGURES FOR 1977 TELL GRIM STORY**

A total of 576 people were killed on Irish roads during 1977. This is the provisional road death figures issued by the Garda Commissioner in Dublin on Thursday.

For the country as a whole, the figure is 51 up on one to a total of 107, an increase of almost 10%. A much sharper increase — almost 50% — is recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area which comprises Dublin City, most of Dublin County part of North Wicklow and a small part of County Kildare.

While the total of 576 is lower than that of the years 1972 to 1975 it is nevertheless a reversal of the downward trend in road deaths which had been evident since 1967. Even more disturbing is the fact that road deaths in the second half of 1977 at 344 were the highest on record for a half year period.

**AT GREAT LOSS TO OCCUPANTS**

A detailed analysis of all the road accidents reported to the Garda Síochána in 1977 was published by the Garda Síochána in their annual report "Road Accident Facts". Some preliminary points may, however be made at this stage.

On the greater number of cyclist fatalities continued to fall during 1977. Far outweighing this improvement however were substantial increases in the number of pedestrian and car occupants killed. It is particularly significant that a large part of this increase occurred during the latter half of the year.

The alarming extent of the problem is revealed by the results of a detailed examination made by the Garda Síochána of a sample of fatal road accidents which occurred in 1977. The survey covered three separate months selected at random and involved a total of 119 fatal accidents. The Garda Síochána stated that no less than 40% of these accidents involving the death of 52 people were the direct result of heavy drinking mainly by drivers but also by pedestrians. A similar examination of road deaths over one of the bank holiday weekends showed that two out of every three persons killed on the roads were killed as a result of heavy drinking.

In one out of every four of the accidents examined, excessive speed sometimes allied to heavy drinking was a major cause of the accident.

Current social attitudes to drinking and driving are merely a reflection of the wider problem of social attitudes in Ireland to drinking generally. Legislation which can be effectively enforced represents an important step towards solving this major road safety problem. It is, however, accompanied by a radical change in social attitudes to drinking generally and to drinking and driving in particular.

**WITH SAFETY BELT**

Safety belts save lives. The evidence to support this statement is overwhelming. The increase in deaths among occupants wearing their seat belts is a dramatic increase in safety belt usage in Ireland. Substantial reductions in fatalities would result if all car drivers and front seat passengers habitually wore safety belts.

The increase in pedestrian deaths half of which occurred at night shows clearly that too many pedestrians are unaware of the need to make themselves as visible to motorists as possible. The campaign to encourage pedestrians to wear reflective armbands to light coloured outer clothing at night, should be continued and intensified.

WHO'S MAKING THE FORTUNE OUT OF LAMB PRICES AND CHIPS

The huge increase in the consumer price for lamb which followed the recent agreement with the French Government to allow Irish lamb into the French market was referred to at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan last Monday.

Mr P. Crotty who referred to the matter said that a fortune was being made on lamb prices but he pointed out the price of lamb was cheaper now than this time last year. Despite this he said that the price charged in the shops showed a jump of from 30 to 40 per cent and there was no justification for this.

Mr Crotty said that in the past farmers had taken enough stock where food prices were concerned and he said that in the case of these new lamb price increases they should get it across that it was not the farmers who were now responsible.

Mr B. Cahill—I think it's the butchers who are cashing in on this situation and not the farmers.

Mr J. Cullinane said that the position applied in regard to the price of chips sold by the chipp shops. There was a surplus of potatoes at present which were now being bought for 25p and 50p per stone but children were being charged 75p for 20p for small bags of chips. Country children went to school in the towns were being particularly caught when buying chips for their lunch as they had to pay these high prices.

Mr P. Kenneally agreed and said that it was an absolute disgrace. The price of potatoes now was less than it was last year but the price charged in chipp shops was increased in line with the drop in potato prices.

When the Chairman Mr K. O'Ryan asked what the Committee could do about these matters Mr Crotty said that they could do what he thought the public would know and would be able to realise who were responsible for these increased prices.

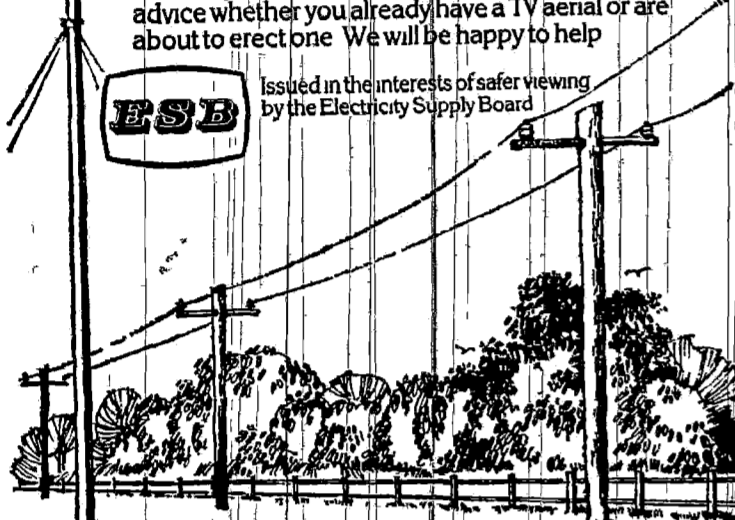
