On a similar line is the position regarding onions. Producers claimed during the week that here again there is a glut and that while they were being paid only 3p and 4p per lb, the price charged in shops ranged from a low of 10p per lb to 17p and 20p per lb.

If all these claims are true it would seem that there is a great gap between what producers get and what consumers have to pay and the

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PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

WHO MAKES THE MONEY?

During a discussion at the monthly meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture held in Dungarvan last Monday (as reported elsewhere in this issue), complaints were made by the farmer members of the Committee concerning the high prices being charged for lamb in the shops and the humble bag of chips bought from chippers.

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plan suggests that the road should take off at Cobhagh on the Waterford road on the outskirts of Abbeyseids from a point on the town side of Mr Sean Quigley's and pass down at the back of Sexton Street on to a point at Strandside North and then via a new bridge across the mouth of the Colligan to a point directly opposite on the Shandon Road at the entrance to the County Council Yard (the old Railway Station). Twomey's road and join the main Dungarvan-Cork road again just beyond the Western Boy housing estate.

The development plan does not envisage the new road as an immediate priority but it does suggest that the route suggested should satisfy the required criteria and could act as an internal distributor road giving access to existing and future development areas, as well as acting as a relief road for through traffic.

However the planners do make the point that pending the final decision the route suggested in the plan should be preserved from development but they add that as such preservation cannot be continued indefinitely in the absence of a firm decision on the route the County Council

should carry out its origin and destination and locational surveys in the course of the next four years.

This and other aspects of the plan are matters to which the members of the local Urban Council will refer to give a great deal of consideration in the coming months before reaching a final decision on it. As the matter of the future development of the town is a serious one for all the inhabitants, the general public should also become actively involved in helping to shape the final form which the plan will take.

In due course it is possible that a public meeting will be called at which the plan will be explained and if such a meeting is called then it is up to every adult person in the Urban area to show interest in it by attending and expressing an opinion. Only in this way can we plan for a satisfactory future development of the town and its environs.

AN IDEA TO BEAT THE BANK ROBBERS

Reading through the current issue of "Scalo," a periodical published in English by the Federal Republic of Germany, I was reminded that armed bank and payroll robberies are a problem not only in this country but in many other European countries at present.

An item headed "Hard times for robbers" stated that if an idea of a Swedish inventor named Stig Cedergren reached production maturity times would become hard for the criminal world. Together with the electrical combine of Siemens and two Swedish firms, he has designed a container with an electronic ignition device for carrying money. If the container is opened by an unauthorised person, a pyrotechnical capsule explodes drenching the bank notes with a red chemical that marks them and thus makes them unusable.

70,000 UNINSURED

VEHICLES

Consequently vehicle owners who run the risk are well aware of the penalties that may be imposed and for that reason the number of uninsured vehicles on our roads is minimal.

Land war predicted in West Waterford

He was not speaking emotionally when he predicted that there would be a "land war" in West Waterford in the very near future, said Mr P. Kennedy at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday.

Present at the meeting were Mr J. Cronin, Head Inspector of Land Commission in Cork and Mr. O'Brien, who seemed intent on explaining the method of division in the county following complaints by the members of the Committee.

Mr J. Cullinan said he fully agreed with Mr Kennedy. The small farmers in the West were in angry mood and bitter feeling against those who were seemingly bent on obtaining acres

Mr Cronin explained that as the law stood at present there was no limit to the amount of land which any individual could hold. He went on to say that at present the Land Commission had ten estates in the county with a total of 600 acres. They had one of these estates since 1974, two since 1976 and the remainder were acquired last year. The record of allocating land in the county "wasn't too bad," he added.

Mr J. Quirk complained about the manner in which the purchase of the Sandes estate near Ballyduff was handled and said that the Land Commission knew 12 months before they bought it that it was for sale but had delayed and the price had gone up in the meantime.

Mr Cronin said that they had got possession of this land on September 2nd last year and pointed out that the Land Commission were bound to pay the market value prevailing.

The delay was caused by the negotiations which had to take place.



The Dungarvan defence were first to score through Pat and Jim McGrath in goal saved easily from Cummins after 5 minutes. Then the Dungarvan midfield showing improved form on recent displays won a fair share of possession for the Dungarvan strikers who twice went close to getting the lead.

After 15 minutes a right wing cross into the Dungarvan area was headed to the net by Cummins to put Portlaoise one up. Dungarvan continued to press and had strong claims for a penalty turned down after twenty minutes. But once again it was Cummins who showed what goalscoring is all about again a right wing centre and the lurking striker forced a diving header to score an opportunity goal. Monnie Lennon went into midfield for Dungarvan and once again it was Dungarvan in control but despite the efforts of Pat Tuffy Kevin Curran and Monnie Lennon in mid field, Dungarvan failed to get a goal back before the break.

It was Portlaoise who went nearest to scoring when Jim McGrath made a great reflex save from Cummins just on half time.

Dungarvan started the second half with John Hughes, Pat Tuffy and Lee Delahunt having shots blocked by the Portlaoise keeper but Portlaoise got their third goal when slack marking allowed the Portlaoise right winger to score from close range.

Between the 60th and 80th minute Dungarvan were on top and when John Hughes was fouled in the area Pat Tuffy made no mistake from the spot. For all their possession however the home strikers could not get the vital second goal again it was Nicky Cummins who having twice been thwarted by great J McGrath saves got his third and Portlaoise 4th with five minutes left.


