PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE NEW COUNTY DEVELOPMENT PLAN

The 1978 draft revision of the County Development Plan which will operate for the next five years was submitted to the February monthly meeting of the County Council and is at present under consideration by the members of the Council with whom now rests the authority to decide what the actual plan will eventually be.

The County Manager emphasised this fact at the meeting when he told the members that while the draft revision represented the official view the plan to be enacted in the control of development in the county would be the one decided by the Council. He added that for that reason he was most anxious that the members should examine the draft fully before reaching a final decision no matter how long that took.

Further consideration will be given to the plan in the course of next and further meetings of the Council.

Council to prohibit development between adjoining roads or mountains which would obstruct or detract from the amenity afforded by the view."

The Manager said it was to point like these that he wished the Council to give serious consideration before a final approval is given.

Cllr. Kynne of course came back and said that he for one would be seeking to have the plan changed insofar as the restrictions as to where houses could be built were concerned.

When it came to discussing houses he said that the people for whom they were to be built should be given first consideration and the protection of the environment should be secondary to that.

Further consideration will be given to the plan in the course of next and further meetings of the Council.

WHAT ABOUT PRIORITY HOUSE

The recent purchase by the Waterford Co-op Society of the AIB Provincial Bank House in Dungarvan for £114,000 was the big local news of the week in which the auction took place. One of the close under-bidders at the auction was the South Eastern Health Board who were understand interested in purchasing the building to house their office staff in Dungarvan.

At present the Board has accommodation at Arus Brugha let to them by the County Council but as the Council staff is moving to the existing accommodation they have at the Courthouse and Arus Brugha they are anxious that the Health Board should find alternative space for themselves somewhere else.

This position at once begs the question as to what should or could be done with Priority House. This property located in the town centre at McNamee Street is owned by the Board.

In the event of the sale

appearance is taking on that of a delapidated building I understand that its interior is gone to wrack and ruin also. Perhaps the time has now come for the Board to take a good, hard look at this building with a view to converting it to offices. As it stands at present it is developing into a major eyesore.

FIANNA FAIL Ard Fheis

As I predicted last week the Fianna Fail Ard Fheis in the RDS Dublin last weekend attracted a record attendance of over 7,000 delegates and from the ovation which they accorded the Taoiseach when he arrived to give his Presidential address there can no longer be any doubts about Mr. Lynch's popularity as leader of the Party.

Whilst nothing of a controversial nature came up for discussion and nothing was said in regard to policy on the North that has not already been said, the occasion was unfortunately overshadowed by the harrowing horror that swept twelve people to their deaths when a crowded hotel was blasted by fire bombs in Co. Down on Friday night.

The condemnation of the terrible act voiced by Mr. Lynch of the Ard Fheis must surely be re-echoed by everyone.

One of the main interests for supporters of the Party in the constituency was the result of the election of the Committee of Fifteen which takes place annually at the Ard Fheis and as I forecast last week Cllr. Ruairí Ó'Brien

of Dungarvan was successful in his bid for re-election to the Committee. With the other fourteen members elected she joins the 84-strong National Executive of Fianna Fail for another year and I congratulate her on her success.

For the record the Executive of Fianna Fail is as follows: President, Jack Lynch, Vice-Presidents, Paddy Smith, Tomas Ó Maoláin, Eoin Ryan, Gus Healy and Frank V. McDonnell, Hon. Secretaries, Brian Lenihan, T.D., and Charles Haughey, T.D., Hon. Treasurers, Anthony Hederman S.C. and George Colley, T.D.

The Ard Fheis panel is as follows: Niall Andrews, T.D., Senator Joe Farrell, T.D., Senator Michael Crantch, Senator Des Honan and Senator Willie Ryan.

Snowstorm Again Causes Widespread Chaos

For the second successive weekend a major snowstorm covered most of the southern part of the country, particularly the west. Saturday and Sunday and one of the worst hit areas was once again Waterford County and City.

The snowfall of the previous week-end which had been maintained by the freezing temperatures that continued throughout the week had hardly cleared away when the second great fall struck on Saturday last. Lashings of snow fell throughout Saturday night and once more the countryside was caught in a grip of white steel.

Damage was widespread as electrical power cables and poles collapsed down with snow collapsed while trees in many areas caused further disruption when they fell in the path of the storm. Power failures occurred in several areas and people had to suffer the added discomfort as heating and cooling systems went dead. Water supplies in the Dungarvan area were also cut off for long periods as a result of the storm.

ROADS IMPASSABLE

All roads became dangerous at an early hour on Saturday and many even the main traffic routes especially in the high and exposed areas became impassable.

LONGEST WINTER

Last week-end's storm was one of the worst for almost twenty years and certainly qualifies the winter of 1977/78 as the

longest and most severe in living memory.

WELCOME THAW

On Monday afternoon a welcome thaw set in as temperatures rose and the snow continued to melt. While the snow brought a warm airflow in over the country and a sense of relief to the people who had been marooned and completely cut off.

Once again as in the previous week-end the roadworkers of Waterford County Council were the heroes as they battled against the elements throughout the day and all day on Monday to clear the roads and open up communications to the isolated areas.

On this occasion they were joined by the work crews of the ESB who worked round the clock to restore power and carry out emergency repairs in the appalling conditions that prevailed and it is only now after several days that power has been restored in some of the areas where the damage was so great was the extent of damage caused by the great storm.

But as train services were disrupted and people found themselves without newspapers and in some cases without milk or bread supplies as the conditions took their toll of the delivery vehicles.

Schools generally were closed on Monday and Tuesday and all outdoor sporting events had to be either cancelled or postponed.

FORECAST

The weather men were optimistic on Tuesday that the thaw would continue for another few days at any rate but they warned that if the wind changed to the east again more snow could be the result.

Driver disqualified for three years

Patrick O'Mahony, 59, Connaught, Villas, Dungarvan appeared before District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday charged with driving a motor van on October 31 last without being covered by insurance and without a driving licence. The owner of the van, James Franklin, 42, Congress Villas, was summoned to appear and the van to be driven by O'Mahony.

Evidence was given by Garda H. Leary who said that he saw O'Mahony driving the van on the occasion and questioned him about it the following day.

Mr. E. P. King, Sol. for the defendants, said that the charge was that O'Mahony was returning from a coursing meeting in Waterford and had O'Mahony as a passenger in the van. He had been up very early that morning on his milk round and

had O'Mahony driving the van. O'Mahony had been drinking and was driving under the influence of alcohol.

In the case of O'Mahony he said that this was his second offence within a period of three years and it was now mandatory on him to suspend O'Mahony for a period of three years.

He also fined him £70 and a further £5 for having no driving licence.




