 The young man for whom it was a tragedy was no longer living following the death of his teenage girl friend Philomena Maguire in a tragedy just five days before he died. The tragedy was a fatal gunshot wound in his heart in an up-room in his house early in the morning of Feb. 21st. Philomena lost her life in a tragedy which she had completely gutted her home at Barrana-Old Parish.
 The tragedy which was on Patrick at the District level on Saturday revealed that he had been in the house at the time of the tragedy. An inquest will also be held in the morning following the discovery of the tragedy but later a spokesman said that it was an unfortunate and dried case.

The reference by Pensions in the Spotlight Column of this paper last week concerning the condition of Priory House, Dungarvan, sparked off a discussion on the building at the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night.
 Cllr R. O'Brien who raised the matter said that the Council should send a strong protest to the South East Health Board about the condition of the building. She said that she had reason to visit the premises last week and the interior condition of the building was appalling with paint and plaster peeling off the walls. The place was also filthy dirty and there was no excuse for this. She added that mothers who were being asked to keep their own homes clean had to go into the dispensary to get their own toilet paper. It was the Press who could only highlight these problems. He said that the Health Board should be ashamed of the condition of the building and as it stood now it was a disgrace.
 Mr D. Goode Chairman said that he was a member of the Local County Health Committee and he had raised this matter several times. He said that Priory House was one of the finest houses in Dungarvan one time but it was in a terrible state and the smell was terrible there were doves' nests and pigeons refuse and the whole place was ugly and disgusting.
