We must be the only county in the country that hasn't got a full time development officer and as a result we suffer and as a result we suffer. Mr J. Fahey, T.D. at the monthly meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan when the creation of posts for a clerk/typist and a senior staff officer for development were being considered.

Mr Fahey said that the lack of a county development team was very evident in the county and no part-time official could carry out the work entailed and do other Council duties as well. There was much unemployment in the county and industrial development was needed, especially in West Waterford to combat this.

Mr Fahey went on to say that he was not satisfied by the manner in which this matter was being treated. The Council wishes to have a full-time development officer, appointed had not been carried out and the proposal had been watered down. "We have unemployment here," he said "yet we are the ones who are not doing anything about it."

Mr O. Curran, Chairman, said he had to agree with what Mr Fahey said and he could not understand the resistance of the Co. Manager and the officials to the Council's original proposal.

The Co. Manager denied that there had been any manoeuvring by himself or the other officials in the carrying out of the Council's proposal. He said that as the best solution to the problem the Council by resolution had approved the creation of a grade post and that had been knocked out by him, but by the Minister and if the Council

wanted to go back to the Minister on the matter they could do so.

Mr Fahey—If we looked for a full time County Development Officer not a deputy, I think we would be no difficulty in getting approval and there is no point in the Manager making play out of the position as he is.

The Co. Manager said that he could not understand the line being followed by Mr Fahey. Finally when the Manager assured the Council that the man to be appointed to the post would act full-time in it, the creation of both positions was approved unanimously on the proposal of Mr P. Cahill seconded by Mr. F. King.






