PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

THE IDA REGIONAL JOBS PLAN

A couple of weeks ago I referred to the IDA plan for industrial expansion and jobs creation target on a national level during the next couple of years. This week we come closer to home through a news release from the South-East Region of the IDA in which Regional Manager, Frank Burke, refers to what he described as an "ambitious target" of providing 4,200 manufacturing jobs in the region between now and 1980. There can be no doubt but that the provision of suitable employment is the most vital problem which the government has to grapple with at present. The huge numbers which remain on the unemployed list which is being swelled annually by thousands of school leavers is a situation which is causing headaches not only for the legislators in this country but also in every country in the EEC. The problem has now become chronic and the provision of adequate cash benefits for the unemployed is no proper solution. People want work and especially our young men and women if they are to remain satisfied and contented and happy.

During the past week warnings have been issued in Britain that unless work is provided for them the young people there will take matters into their own hands by either going to the left or right and creating a major political upheaval. The same thing could well happen in this country and indeed in the other countries of the EEC unless the problem is taken in hand as a top priority.

The target of providing 4,200 jobs in this region over the next three years may look well on paper but the region embraces Counties Waterford, Wexford, South Tipperary, Kilkenny and Carlow so the end result, even if the target is reached, would only mean a few hundred jobs in each county, each year over the three year period. Something, but no way adequate to cope with the situation.

This custom is apparently still very prevalent in the Western areas although it has disappeared in many other places in latter years.

Without doubt the seasons seem to have changed and for the last few years we appear to have only a short summer with a very long winter while spring and autumn have totally disappeared. Winter's coat is still around us and only last week I saw the ground white with heavy frost—a frost which caused immense damage to the early potato crops in many areas, particularly Ballinacourt and Ardmore.

An although it is Maytime the cold wind from the east tells us that summer is nowhere near—yet.

THOSE BIG TRUCKS

The matter of the ever-increasing size of the trucks and tankers passing through Dungarvan was raised at the last meeting of the Urban Council when Cllr Whelan stated that he had been asked by many residents of O'Connell Street to complain that their premises, especially those in the narrow portion of the street, were being literally shook as the huge vehicles passed along.

The residents in Mary Street are also being subjected to the same shaking as the huge articulated container trucks pound their way through the town between Cork and Waterford.

The position of course is that our towns were never built to cope with this type of traffic and the streets cannot be widened to make sufficient room to allow them through in comfort.

It would appear that the problem as far as Mary Street and indeed Bridge Street continue to remain until such time as the famous "Ring Road," so much discussed in the past, becomes a reality, if ever. However there is a possibility that the position in regard to O'Connell Street may be relieved in the not too distant future.

Much of the heavy traffic at present using O'Connell Street centres about the huge milk tankers coming in from the western areas to the local creamery and the location of the main entrance and exit of the creamery at the Square has created this situation. It has been so for many years but while the size of the vehicles involved in the early stages was not great the problem was not of any great consequence. However with the rapid growth in the size of the tankers and the huge increase in the milk intake at Dungarvan, the problem has grown to its present dimensions. I understand that the Creamery Management is very much aware of this and that plans are at present afoot which will enable the bulk of this heavy traffic to be diverted at Ballymacogue via Ballyneety to a new main entrance to the Creamery at Shandon.

Should these plans materialise it will greatly ease the traffic situation in O'Connell Street which would be also further alleviated if CIE could be persuaded to find a more suitable location for their buses which create chaos when two or three park simultaneously in the street, a situation that occurs quite frequently.

CLAIM THAT SOME CIVIL SERVANT SLIPPED UP IN DISADVANTAGED AREAS DISPUTE

An 8-man deputation from the Killorossanty area representing mountain sheep farmers in the area was received a short notice at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last Monday to air their grievances about the payment of headage grants for sheep under the EEC Disadvantaged Areas Scheme.

Mr K O'Ryan Chairman, said that he had only been approached about the matter on the previous Friday night but as he felt that the matter was important he decided to allow the deputation to be heard. He said that he felt that some of the farmers concerned were being treated very unfairly and unjustly under the scheme.

Members of the deputation then addressed the meeting and told the members of the Committee that while they were all grazing sheep on the same mountain some had got the headage grants while others had not.

Mr O'Ryan Chairman, seconded and said that the most important aspect of the problem was who decided the demarcation line in matters like this.

Mr O'Ryan Chairman, said that two officials from the Department of Agriculture would visit the county for two days next week to examine the position generally in the county.

Mr Whelan's proposal was passed unanimously.

SHEEP LOSSES
The CAO told the committee that sheep losses suffered by sheep farmers on the Comeraghs in this year's snowstorms had now been assessed and the total came to 2,900. This information had been forwarded to the Department who were at present considering the matter of compensation.

DEFENDANT ORDERED TO PAY £1,000 COMPENSATION

After taking possession of a car parked outside the Ormonde Hotel Dungarvan on the night of February 14th last a Dungarvan man crashed almost head on into an approaching car and caused damage totalling £1,000 to the vehicles.

Justice W F O'Connell was told at Dungarvan Court. Before the court was Liam Duggan, 1 Keating Street Dungarvan, and he was convicted on charges of unlawfully taking possession of the car, dangerous driving, drunk driving and driving without a licence.

Supt M English who prosecuted said Duggan had a number of previous convictions. When District Justice O'Connell intimated that he was going to sentence Duggan to a year of imprisonment, Supt English said he should be made to pay compensation of £500 to each of the two injured parties.

Adjourning the question of a prison sentence on the charge of unlawfully taking the car to July 28th the District Justice ordered Duggan to start paying compensation to each motorist at the rate of £10 a week. He also ordered him to pay £39 expenses and disqualify him from driving for six months.

Duggan was also fined £5 each on the drunk and dangerous driving charges and was given twelve and six concurrent disqualifications respectively.

The District Justice dismissed the insurance charge and marked the driving licence offence "proved".

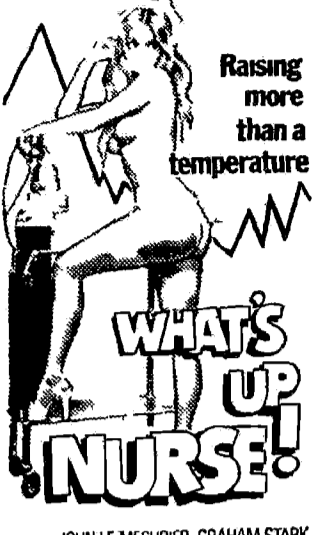

As a girl her ambition was to enter a contemplative convent but she was prevented from doing so by ill-health. At the age of 20 she joined the Legion of Mary in Dublin and gave herself entirely to the Legion apostolate. In 1936 Ediel was appointed Legion of Mary Envoy with the commission to establish the Organisation in the vast territories of East and Central Africa. Although working alone and in a state of perpetual ill-health and exhaustion Ediel established the Legion on a firm enduring basis even as far as Mauritius in the Indian Ocean. Hundreds of Legion branches and multiple Councils were solidly established and she mobilised thousands of Africans in the service of the Church. After eight years of heroic labour Ediel died in Malindi on May 12th 1944, where she is buried in the Missionaries' Cemetery.
