TWO WAYS OF LOOKING AT IT

The farm prices deal negotiated by the Agricultural Ministers of the EEC in Brussels last week has been received in a variety of ways. Indeed for some the spectacle of nine Ministers "sparring" with each other at the outset and eventually coming to grips culminating in a night-long session which literally left them at the point of exhaustion was not one calculated to engender a great degree of confidence in the negotiation of such highly complex and important economic and political issues.

While our Minister for Agriculture, Mr Jim Gibbons was highly pleased with the eventual outcome expressing the view that it was the best deal yet won for Irish farmers, the farming organisations have not shown the same reaction and in fact both the IFA and ICMSA have expressed disappointment that the end result did not measure up to the 13 per cent increase that they were seeking.

On the overall the new prices will mean an extra £105 million for the Irish agricultural industry but the farmers complain that just a little more than half of this will actually reach them the rest will go to the middleman for marketing and processing.

Strongest reaction to the new price deal has come from the consumer organisations who claim that it will put up all food prices by about 4p in the £. The price of butter will go up by 7p per lb, cheese by 5p per lb, milk by 3p per pint and beef by about 9p per lb.

The Vice-Chairman of the Irish Housewives Association warned during the week that if prices kept rising there would have to be a compulsory boycott of some foodstuffs. She said that butter and beef would be outside the ordinary household budget and consumers would have to look for alternatives. Garda Search Discovers Cannabis Growing In Dungarvan

Up to 50 cannabis plants growing in various types of containers were discovered during a Garda search of a number of houses in Dungarvan last Monday. The search was carried out following a break-in at the residence of Dr J Stacey Strand side North Abbeyside last Sunday afternoon when among other things a quantity of dangerous drugs were stolen.

The break-in took place around 4 pm while Dr Stacey and his family were away and entry was gained by breaking a window at the back of the house.

The drugs taken were in tablet and ampoule form and included a cheque book and about £35 in cash were also stolen.

On discovering the break-in when he returned home, Dr Stacey reported the matter to the Garda who investigated the matter in the course of the Garda search most of the drugs, believed to be those stolen from the Doctor's house were recovered while the cannabis plants were also discovered.

The Garda investigations are still continuing but it is understood that a number of young men will be charged later.

OVER 3,000 ON KNOCK DIOCESAN PILGRIMAGE

Very Rev Dr Michael Olden D.D. President Maynooth College stated on Sunday last that it is not right to put God to a test because he has already proved his love for us.

Six hundred went on the Cabra West Parish Pilgrimage led by Rev T Tonge CC and invalids included 100 mentally handicapped children from St Vincent's Navan Road, Cabra were under the care of Sisters of Charity.

Rev C Collins CC Castlemary led 600 on a pilgrimage organised by Youghal Legion of Mary.

Dr Olden was Chief Celebrant of the Mass and the Cappoquin Church Choir was conducted by Sr Mary Sisters of Mercy Convent. The ceremonies ended with the anointing of the sick and benediction.

DROVE CAR THROUGH PUB WINDOW IN LISMORE

After being refused drink in a Lismore licensed premises on the night of January 5 a woman went outside and drove her sedan wagon car at speed through the window of the pub. She then reversed the vehicle and drove it through the smashed window a second time.

That was the story told to District Justice F O Connors at Tallow Court last Friday when Miss Christine Hogan, Barrack Street Tallow was charged with drunk driving, dangerous driving and causing malicious damage to the licensed premises at East Main Street, Lismore.

The defendant was not present in court nor was she professionally represented.

Michael Walsh manager Tanelly's licensed premises, Lismore told the court that he was on duty in the bar on the night of January 5 when the defendant and her parents and others, came in around 8 o'clock. Witness refused to serve them and asked them all to leave.

Continuing witness said that a row started subsequently outside the licensed premises and he decided to ring for the gardai. However as he was making the telephone call the defendant drove her station wagon through the plate glass window of the pub. The vehicle was then reversed and again defendant drove it at speed through the window which was at that stage smashed. She seemed to be very drunk. Full compensation had been paid for the damage.

Witness said he spoke to Miss Hogan who admitted having driven the vehicle. She was shouting and roaring was staggering badly and was frothing from the mouth.

She was in a very bad state of intoxication and I had no doubt but that she was unfit to drive witness added.

In a report submitted to the court Dr James A Gallagher stated that the defendant refused to be examined by him at the gardai station but from his observations she appeared to him to be drunk.

Recognisances were fixed in the event of an appeal. Supt M English prosecuted.

CENSUS OF PSYCHIATRIC PATIENTS IN SOUTH EAST

A census of all patients in the South-Eastern Health Board's psychiatric hospitals started last week.

It is proposed that the findings will be computerised initially and that they will then be updated on a monthly basis.

The Health Board members decided on the census so that future planning of the psychiatric service can be more effectively carried out.

JCBS FOR YOUTH

The prospect of the thousands of our young people who will shortly be sitting their Leaving Cert exams and then turning to the problem of finding a suitable job is indeed a gloomy one.

According to recent figures issued by the EEC two million young people were registered as unemployed last year and the assessment for the future is that the problem will become more aggravated as each year passes for a considerable time to come.

Our own situation reflects the overall position in the other countries of EEC and is indeed a daunting one. At a recent conference of the Irish Management Institute Professor Brendan Walsh expressed the pessimistic view that

AN UNFAIR ADVANTAGE

In a recent decision the Minister for Finance, Mr George Colley doubled to 100 the number of letters that a Dail Deputy can send free through the post each week from his constituency or elsewhere. This is in addition to the weekly 300 which must go through Leinster House where a check is kept on them.

Once a deputy has drawn the new allowance of 100 franked envelopes per week he can post them free anywhere. But if some want to build up a supply for election time there will be nothing to stop them doing that and, perhaps, gathering hundreds or even thousands for free postage at the opportune time.

While this may be alright in its own way, the system does give a big advantage to deputies who are members of local authorities in their own constituencies compared to their colleagues Councillors of County and Urban Councils and members of other subsidiary local authorities have to pay their own postage and in some cases this can run into a considerable sum each week in carrying out their duties as public representatives. To catch up or even break even with the man who has 100 free envelopes, the ordinary Councillor would have to purchase £10 worth of stamps every week.

In the past, representations by local Councils for a free postage service for members have been rejected but perhaps the time is right now to again seek such a concession even if on a more limited basis than that allowed to the Dail Deputies.
