THE COUNTY COUNCIL CO-OPTION

Without doubt last Monday's County Council meeting was something special and an air of excitement and expectancy prevailed about the Courthouse in Dungarvan where the meeting was held even before the members assembled to commence business with the usual prayer recited in Irish by the County Secretary, Mr Brian McNally.

THE COUNTY COUNCIL CO-OPTION

It all centred about the co-option concerning which controversy has raged since Fianna Fail decided to contest the seat. Across the street from the Courthouse in Lawlor's Hotel, the Fine Gael Party met for a final briefing before the Council meeting began while upstairs in the same hotel the Fianna Fail members gathered to finalise their course of action. As 2.30 p.m., the time for the meeting, approached all moved across to the Courthouse. The Fine Gael nominee for the seat, Mrs Grace O'Connor, was accompanied by her brother, Mr James Aidan Walsh, and by Mr R. A. Walsh, U.D.C., Dungarvan, Chairman of the County Executive of Fine Gael and members of the Lismore District Executive of the Party. Mr Jack Cullinane, the chosen candidate of Fianna Fail, was also accompanied by a number of supporters.

Deputy Austin Deasy who now leads the Fine Gael members on the Council arrived on crutches having seriously injured an Achilles tendon the previous week while practising for a football game planned for London last week-end between members of the Oireachtas and MPs of the British House of Commons.

There were three items on the agenda to be dealt with before the "main dish" was reached and even though everything appeared calm on the surface while these "minor" items were being dealt with it was clear that the decks were merely being cleared for the real action.

Then item 4 was reached and the preliminary run-in was all very polite and gentlemanly. Fine Gael and Labour showed that they still coalesced and the single Independent member on the Council took up his position and notified his intention to support the Fine Gael nominee if the issue was "forced to a vote." He suggested that the matter be adjourned for a month to allow Fianna Fail to reconsider their position but there was a negative response and the Chairman made it clear that the vacancy would be filled at that meeting. Fine Gael then introduced a new play with the suggestion that the vote should be by secret ballot but again this was firmly rejected by the Chairman.

The proposal and counter-proposal were then made and the nitty gritty part was reached. However the situation never flared up and even though there were some rather cutting remarks they remained on an impersonal

level and were made in general terms. The vote was then taken and, as expected, the decision went in favour of Fianna Fail.

However the margin was smaller than the original counting of heads tended to indicate as two Fianna Fail Councillors abstained from the vote. Without doubt they were motivated in doing so by the deep feelings of respect and esteem which they had for the man whose regretted death had created the vacancy. On balance their action showed that this sense of loyalty to a colleague and friend of such long standing outweighed the demands of toeing the party line. They had the courage of their convictions.

Indeed I am personally aware that other members of the Fianna Fail party on the Council also entertained the same feelings but felt bound by party guide-lines to follow the line of action which they took. This point was also acknowledged by the Fine Gael chief spokesman at the meeting and I know it to be true.

In many ways it was well that not too much heat was generated by the issue and it would be a hope to be expressed that more bitterness, either, would not result from the decision. Fianna Fail, as a party, did not need the seat on the Council because of their existing majority and those politically wise within the party know full well that they will not be able to retain it beyond the next elections. Equally, the Fine Gael party know that they will win it back when that time comes.

I would recommend to all parties on the Co Council that once the dust on this latest incident has settled down that they would get together in an attempt to iron out an amicable agreement to cover such an otherwise contentious matter as a co-option. This suggestion was thrown out by the Fianna Fail spokesman at the meeting and it is one that could well be followed up if we are to avoid the type of embarrassing situation which all had to go through in the name of democracy last Monday.

THE WEEK BEFORE

At a meeting of the Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan last week there was a rather comical situation which might be an indication of the way things should really be between political parties. Clr Paddy Cahill was quietly selling books of tickets for a raffle being run by the Tralee Comhairle Ceanntair. Fianna Fail to his party colleagues before the meeting commenced when he was asked across the floor of the room by a Fine Gael member what the tickets were for. Quick as usual, Clr Cahill quipped "for the propagation of the faith".

Fianna Fail Take Council Seat On 11-9 Vote

While a major blow-up was expected to mark the co-option at the meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday the contention matter passed off comparatively quietly in the end after Fianna Fail, despite the peals stuck to their guns and took the seat on a 11-9 vote. The main surprise was the abstention of two Fianna Fail Councillors when the vote was taken.

At the outset Mr C. Curran, Chairman, made what he called a special appeal to the members to avoid personal remarks as to whatever the outcome we will have to continue to live together in the interests of the people of the county.

The first proposal came from Fine Gael when Mr Austin Deasy TD proposed that Mrs Grace O'Connor, Cappingin, sister of the late Norman Walsh whose death had caused the vacancy, be co-opted to fill it. He pointed out that it had long been the position in the Council that when a member died and a family wished to take the seat he was automatically co-opted. He said that the same procedure should now be followed where Mrs O'Connor was concerned.

The proposal was seconded by Mr Michael Hartly who said that Mrs O'Connor had proved herself a highly competent business woman who had the interest of Cappingin very much at heart.

At this stage Mr Tom Kynne speaking on behalf of his Labour colleague Frankie King said that they would support the proposal to leave the seat with the party which had lost it. He expressed the hope that if this was agreed it would restore the good normal relations which had previously existed between the parties on the Council.

Mr Sean Whelan then made the counter-proposal. He said that while he agreed with the sentiments about agreement between the parties which existed for a long number of years it was only right to point out that this had been broken. "In fact," said Mr Whelan "the agreement was broken by the Fine Gael Party when Deputy Fahy had to resign his seat on the Council and in view of that we have no option now but to propose a member of our own party for the seat. He then formally proposed the co-option of Mrs O'Connor.

Mr Jack Cullinane, Glenbrien Lismore, who he said was well-known in the area as a very successful business man and farmer.

Seconding the proposal, Mr D. Goode said that he always had a wonderful respect for the late Norman Walsh and they differed only in one respect - "their political aspirations and he seconded the proposal as he had a duty to perform to his own party."

GRAB THE SEAT

Further Remand On Murder Charge

On the application of Supt. M. English District Justice W. F. O'Connell at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday granted a further remand in custody in the case of Geoffrey Fowler (28), no fixed abode, who is charged that between June 2 and 7 he did at Ballymacmaigue, Dungarvan, murder Marie Hanigan (44), of 41 Castello Place, Waterford.

On the application of the accused the District Justice granted a certificate for free legal aid and assigned Mr P. J. Gordon, Solr, Dungarvan, to the defence. He remanded the accused in custody to Dungarvan Court on June 28.

The Chairman then declared Mr Cullinane elected.

At this stage Mr Deasy intervened to say that he was perfectly aware that a majority of the Fianna Fail Councillors if allowed would have voted the other way and he could not blame them unduly for what they had done as they had been coerced into it.

DEATH OF VERY REV. JAMES LAWN, P.P., KILGOBINET, KILBRIEN AND COLLIGAN

It is with most profound and deep regret that we record the death of Very Rev. Fr James Lawn P.P. Kilgobinet, Kilbrien and Colligan which occurred after a brief illness at the Bon Secours Hospital, Cork in the early hours of last Friday morning, June 9. He was aged 69 years.

First son of the late Charles and Mrs. Lawn, Grattan Square, Dungarvan, he received his early education at the Christian Brothers School, Dungarvan, and later pursued his theological studies in St. John's College, Waterford. He was ordained at St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan in 1931 and first served as a curate in Liverpool before being recalled home when he was appointed Curate at Stradbally. He subsequently served as Curate at Lismore and St. Mary's, Clonmel and was appointed Parish Priest of Grattan, Dungarvan, in 1970. He was appointed Parish Priest of Kilgobinet, Colligan and Kilbrien in 1971 where he remained up to the time of his untimely death.

Fr. Lawn was member of a family who made a unique contribution to the religious life being fostered in the Free-school by two other brothers, Very Rev. Nicholas Lawn, now Parish Priest in Liverpool and Fr. Charles Lawn, Parish Priest, P.P. Colligan, who died in 1968 while his sister, Mother Francis Mary joined the Order of the Sisters of Charity with whom she is now serving in Cork.

Fr. Lawn was Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Russell rightly said when he spoke about him at the Concelebrated Requiem Mass in Colligan Church on Monday was that of a man of great gentleness and respect of all in the many parishes in which he served during through the years. Dr. Russell. Local school children lined the entrance of the Church. The Concelebrated Mass followed the chief celebrant being Very Rev. Nicholas Lawn, P.P. assisted by Very Rev. Charles Lawn, P.P.
