THE PAY FOR THE JOB

Last week it was announced that the Government had asked the Review Body on Higher Remuneration in the Public Sector to review the pay levels of higher public servants members of the Oireachtas and the judiciary since the last hefty salary increases in these areas were announced when the basic salaries of TD's jumped to £6,775 to which must be added the amounts they receive in expenses, which in many cases bring the total to almost £10,000 a year. It has been reliably stated that this latest request by the Government for a further salary review has been made due mainly to the strong pressures by the Oireachtas members (TD's and Senators) for further increases.

As on a number of previous occasions the timing of this latest move is way off as it has coincided with the Government's Green Paper on Economic Development in which the general body of workers are asked to help by agreeing to work sharing in order to create more jobs and to smaller wage increases.

If an austerity policy is to be adopted for the benefit of the country surely everyone concerned and indeed more especially members of the Oireachtas and public servants, should set the example instead of pressing for a bigger cut of the cake for themselves while at the same time preaching to the rest of the community to tighten their belts to work harder and to produce more.

As we became members of the European Community, the TD's in this country have seen the field of public administration as a completely new ball game where salaries are concerned and have been casting envious eyes at the counterparts in Europe, especially the major countries of France and West Germany. They are now aiming at some kind of parity with these even though they must realise that we cannot afford anything like these rates nor do they work as hard or as long as the members of those parliaments.

On average the Dail works a 3-day week for seven months of the year and this can hardly be said to be a shining example of high productivity. COURT DECISION ON STREET TRADING

An important decision on the vexed problem of street traders was enunciated by District Justice W F O'Connell at Dungarvan Court last week in which he held that the Street Trading Act of 1926 was subject to the other Road Traffic Acts enacted since that time and that traders who claimed traditional rights to trade at Grattan Square, Dungarvan, were in breach of the Parking and Traffic Bye-Laws of Dungarvan Urban Council which restrict parking at the Square to one hour.

The decision will be welcomed by the established traders and business people of the town who have seen the town centre literally taken over on a number of occasions by these street traders in recent months. Their visitations have also created traffic chaos in the town.

However the Court decision does not mean that there is an end to the problem as the District Justice pointed out that the travelling traders were entitled to set up shop elsewhere in the town than at the Square but perhaps this would not be suitable for them.

There is a possibility also that the street traders will appeal the decision to a higher court.

THE DANGERS AHEAD

The following is a quote from the current issue of 'The Irish Banking Review,' the quarterly review on current topics published by the Irish Banks, in an article entitled 'The Economic Prospect - Central Bank Report 1978'. If the private sector does not achieve the ambitious output, employment and export targets now required from it, the unavoidable need to reduce the public deficit and borrowing burden will require either major cutbacks in public expenditure or, alternatively, major new tax impositions which could curtail any prospect of steady economic growth. That is the main danger in the 1978 budgetary policies.

Magpies are birds which are, at least, were, closely linked to superstitious beliefs and I knew a man one time who would refuse to travel another mile if he met one of them on his own, two together provided a different story as the old rhyme states in reference to them 'one for sorrow, two for joy, three for a wedding, four to die. Five for silver six for gold seven for a story which was never told.' However, like so many other of the told traditions and beliefs I think the superstition attached to magpies is now also a thing of the past. Perhaps it's just as well with so many of them making a come-back in the countryside.

CHARGE AGAINST HELWICK FISHERMAN DISMISSED

Tomas O Ceallaigh trawler owner and fisherman, Helwicks, was summoned at Dungarvan Court last week for having in his possession a net, the measurements of which contravened article 5 of the Fishery Bye-Laws.

The prosecution was brought by Inspector F J Ryan of the Waterford Fishery Board for whom Mr Fergus Power, Solicitor, appeared.

Mr A V Maher, Solicitor (Farrell & Morrissey) was for the defendant.

Waterkeeper John Doyle in reply to questions by Mr Power said that on May 1 he was at Helwicks Pier and observed a monofilament net on the quay. It was a drift net 282 yards long and 9 ft deep with a 5 inch mesh. He took possession of the net and reported the matter to the local Garda Sergeant.

Later Mr Ceallaigh called on him and said that the net was his property and that he had it rigged in a different way to a drift net and while it was a salmon net it was rigged as a ground net which he used to catch pollack in 20 fathoms of water.

In his defence Mr Maher said that while his client admitted ownership of the net he submitted that the relevant bye-law did not apply. He also pointed out that when the measurements of a net were taken the bye-laws laid down that the net must be wet and this was not so in this case.

When District Justice W F O'Connell intimated that he would have to hold in favour of Mr Maher Mr Power asked for permission to adduce further evidence for the prosecution. Having considered the position the District Justice refused the application and dismissed the charge.

At Mr Power's request he fixed recognisances in the event of an appeal.
