PENSMAN TAKES YOU
behind the SPOTLIGHT

BELTING THE COUNTRY
DOWN

The ESB power cuts which reduced the entire country to a chaotic state from early last Monday morning when 400 shiftworkers operating the Board's eight generating stations decided on a work-to-rule policy is but another instance of how a small powerful group can hold the nation to ransom.

At a time when the country is staggering under the weight of a major unemployment problem actions such as this latest one can be described only as delivering the kiss of death to our whole economy. While the decision of the 400 £112 per week (basic) ESB shiftworkers may be aimed at focussing attention on their dispute it also, more forcibly, points to the need for legislation to put an end to these drop of the hat strikes which throw the whole country out of gear.

It is no mere coincidence that in the past twelve months there have been major setbacks created by strikes in the most vital public services of communications, transport and power and the Government will have to come to grips with the problems in these areas if the country is not to be really belted down. The failure of the Irish Congress of Trade Unions to influence member unions in the matter of negotiations is another field which needs to be looked at urgently. The impotence of Congress is highlighted in the present case when, despite a plea to the union concerned to suspend action pending further negotiations the workers concerned decided on a 'go-it-alone' policy.

Such an action might be justified where workers are suffering a major grievance but the issue between the ESB and the shiftworkers concerned in the present dispute is certainly not the sort of issue which should be allowed to practically shut down the entire industrial and business life of the country as it has

of 349 (20.3%) on the previous year, there were 25 cases of murder as against 19, there were 6 cases of attempted murder and 60 reported cases of rape as against 32 in 1976. Offences against property with violence showed one of the biggest increases jumping by 2,251 from 1976 to a total of 23,154. The bulk of these crimes were committed in the Dublin Metropolitan area. There were 236 cases of armed robbery as compared with 186 in 1976.

Offences against property without violence (simple larcenies, etc.) amounted to 37,465 an increase of 5,929 or 18.8% on the figure for the previous year and the detection rate in this group was 34.5%. Larcenies of motor cars numbered 344 as compared with 360 but larcenies from unattended cars at 14,500 showed an increase of 2,940 or 25.43% on the figure for the previous year.

The total value of property stolen in the State in 1977 amounted to £8,068,617 and of this only £1,014,254 or 12.6% was recovered.

The report then comments "The continued upward trend in cases of burglary and larceny from unattended vehicles again demonstrated the necessity for the public to take greater precautions to safeguard their property" while the Commissioner also states as follows in regard to the Press "I gratefully acknowledge the help and co-operation received from the Press and compliment them on the responsible and fair manner in which they reported events."

In an analysis of armed robbery offences the report shows that during the year there was a total of 7 in the Waterford/Kilkenny Divisional Area, 1 each from a house, a garage and a petrol station, 2 from banks and 2 from other unidentified sources. The number of persons charged in the Division under the Dangerous Drugs Act was 7 while there were 2,506 on the spot summonses issued for parking violations and 1,356 for the non-display of licence discs.

There were 36 offences against the person recorded in the Division of which 35 were detected, there were 534 offences against property with violence of which 191 were detected, there were 739 larcenies of which 383 were detected and the overall detection rate in this area was 47.7% as compared with the national average of 38.8%.

Under the heading "Road Traffic" the report states Divisional units of the Traffic Corps were in operation during 1977 and were primarily involved in accident prevention and traffic control duties. The downward trend in traffic accidents of all classes first noticed in 1973, continued until mid 1977. During the latter part of the year there was an alarming increase in all traffic accidents including fatal accidents. Many of these accidents resulted in multiple deaths and this is reflected in the total fatality figures for the year which showed an increase of 51 deaths over 1976. A total of 576 persons died as a result of road traffic accidents in 1977 as compared with 525 in 1976.

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CRIME RATE UP

In the course of his report on crime for the year ended December 31, 1977, to the Minister for Justice, the Garda Commissioner, Mr P. McLaughlin states that in 1977 a total of 62,946 indictable offences were recorded which showed an increase of 8,564 or 15.7% over the figure for the previous year. The overall detection rate at 38.8% revealed a decrease of 2.5% on that recorded in 1976.

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MAJOR HONOUR FOR YOUNG CAPPOQUIN POET

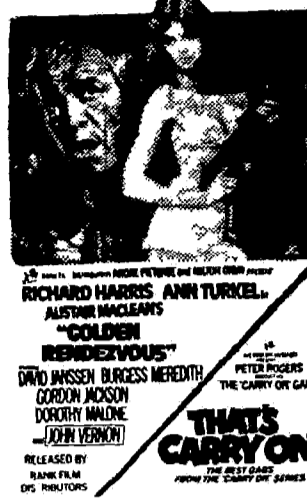
