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ELECTING NEW POPE

The one hundred and eleven cardinals who will elect the successor to the late Pope Paul VI enter the Conclave this week and from which the fateful decision will emerge. For the first time the Vatican on Friday of last week practised the smoke signals which will be sent out from the Sistine Chapel where the Conclave will be held and which will eventually give news to the waiting world of the results of the balloting for the new Pope. The object of these practices is to make sure that the chemicals to be used will provide recognisably black smoke in the event of an inconclusive ballot and white smoke for a Papal election.

The stove used at the election of Pope Paul, fifteen years ago was missing but was found after a long search in the Vatican lumber rooms. At that time it functioned well enough but at the election of Pope John in 1958 it occasionally produced some confusing grey smoke signals.

It is expected that balloting for the new Pope will commence on Saturday next and the chimney pipe from the old iron stove in the Sistine Chapel will be eagerly watched by the crowds who will gather in St Peter's Square, and from where it is visible until the eventual white smoke signal will tell the news "habemus Papam" — we have a Pope.

The trouble taken to make the signals clear is in no way matched by any certainty as to who will emerge Pope from the one hundred and eleven Cardinals at the Conclave. The Italian press has shown some measure of agreement, though with no particularly striking evidence, that the chances of another Italian are almost assured, and this assessment is borne out by the preference shown by the English-speaking journalists who have gathered in Rome to cover the Conclave.

The Cardinals have been meeting daily during the past

fortnight to exchange views with each other privately and to consider prospects but it is only when they enter the Conclave that their decisions will be guided by the Holy Spirit in making their eventual choice as to who will succeed to the Chair of Peter as head of the Church and leader of the 700 million Catholics throughout the world.

ABSOLUTELY NO RESPONSE

As I walked along the Main Street in Dungarvan last Monday evening I got the message loud and clear that there has been absolutely no response from the people to the many appeals which have been made to them to keep the streets of the town free from litter. From end to end the whole street was strewn with discarded paper wrappers and bags and even large plastic sheets. There was a filthy shambles but no one seemed to be bothered. Other streets of the town were in a similar condition.

It is no consolation to be able to admit that Dungarvan is not peculiar where this is concerned and that to a greater or lesser degree most of our other towns throughout the country are in similar condition. In a report of a discussion at Longford Urban Council published in last week's Longford Leader, Longford was described as the dirtiest town in the Midlands.

Urban Councilors there laid the blame fully on the local people, the Chairman remarking "they just don't put any effort into keeping their town tidy and some of them should be put into classrooms and educated about how to keep the place clean." He added that the town was a disgrace as the towers are the streets swept each morning than they are covered with rubbish again within an hour. Another Longford Councilor declared "the shopkeepers don't care, they just sweep their rubbish out on to the streets."

How typically like Dungarvan and for that matter most

other towns throughout the country. There seems to be no way that we can even shame people into realising what an awful prospect litter strewn streets and roads must present to the tourists who visit Ireland from Europe and England during the summer. But the same people can be rather quick to rise to arms when anyone throws an accusation at "the dirty Irish," even when they are surrounded by all this litter in denying the charge!

The ratepayers of Dungarvan have in recent years contributed tens of thousands of pounds towards the purchase of a large refuse truck and a mechanical street sweeper, the latter is really a white elephant for the results it achieves, but despite this they are not prepared to mount any effort themselves to keep the environment in which they live free from litter pollution.

A little story which a young Dungarvan man who is at present completing his hotel training in Switzerland told me while he was home on holidays recently crystallises the entire situation. He was struck at once when he came home by the huge amounts of rubbish which litter the streets here and told me that when in Switzerland if he has the butt end of a cigarette while walking on a street he will hold it in his hand until he finds a litter bin in which to discard it—just because everybody else is motivated the same way. We will have to be educated in this fashion also. Perhaps it can happen!

P.S.—Has the local Urban Council any power to shift or have shifted the wrecked car body which has been cannibalised while lying derelict near Western Terrace all through the summer. It is an eyesore and a danger and an absolute insult to the residents of the street.

PPS—The Dungarvan town dump at Ballinamuck has been recently praised as one of the best kept dumps in Ireland. In some respects this may be so but one night last week I had occasion to walk past the dump to get to the river Colligan and was almost suffocated by the heavy pall of evil-smelling smoke that covered the entire surrounding area which came from a number of fires which blazed fiercely in the dump. Further on I was accosted by big numbers of huge rats which seem to have infested the entire area. Perhaps we must accordingly to the local Authority, accept these as hazards which go hand in hand with dump areas. It cannot however, be denied that they are also health hazards and sources of pollution.

SPEND NOW PAY LATER

The modern accepted policy of spend now, pay later, where public financial matters are concerned is well typified in an answer given by Finance Minister, Mr George Colley, during one of the last Question Time sessions in the Dail before it went into recess for the long summer vacation. The Minister was replying to a seven-part question concerning the total amount and annual cost of servicing the national debt. He stated that at the end of 1977, which is the latest period for which figures are available, the total national debt amounted to £4,219 million and the cost of servicing it in the current year was £453 million which represents 27% of the tax revenue for the year.

The main sources of the loans negotiated in 1977 were European Investment Banks with US dollars and German marks the currencies involved. However under the heading of "other loans" the Minister listed a loan of 15,000 million yen from Japan at an interest rate of 7.2% per annum to be repaid in installments between 1980 and 1986.

As I said the policy of raising loans is now accepted as the proper thing to do to enable the developments necessary to maintain the rate of progress which is required in the country to be carried out. However the amount involved even where our own small country is concerned is, to say the least, rather staggering.

Loans For Snow-hit Sheepmen

The Minister for Agriculture Mr Jim Gibbons TD has arranged that loans at a reduced rate of interest will be available from the Agricultural Credit Corporation to help certain farmers to replace sheep lost as a result of the snow-fall last February.

The loans will be made available to farmers in the hill and mountain areas of Waterford, South Tipperary, East Limerick and North-East Cork who suffered losses (excluding lambs) in excess of 10% of their flock but only for losses in excess of that 10%.

Forms of application and other details can be obtained from the Agricultural Credit Corporation.

CEO Refutes Downgrading Criticisms

It was not true that there was any deliberate policy on the part of the South Eastern Health Board to downgrade the X-Ray service in Dungarvan. He said that it took special arrangements to provide X-Ray services in Dungarvan in the first place.

Mr Ward was refuting criticism of the Board's action in having to close down the Dungarvan X-Ray service for the month of August owing to the fact that no locum radiographer could be recruited for holiday relief work.

The matter was raised by Col C Curran who in presenting a public statement on the controversy, said that Dungarvan seemed to be the black-spot as far as health services were concerned. Nothing seemed to go right there and he seemed to have one problem after the other cropping up.

Mr Curran said that a story in a Cork paper quoting the Chairman of Dungarvan Urban District Council, had been very critical of the Board for the alleged closure of the X-Ray service and he had forwarded on this article to the CEO.

Mr Curran added that there had also been adverse criticism in a Dungarvan local paper. He said that he understood that the problem was that it was not possible to find a locum radiographer but the criticism was left so late to go seeking one.

Mr Curran said that it was a fact that the quality of service had been lowered in Dungarvan in certain cases. Regarding the temporary closure of the X-Ray service he understood why as did his colleague Mr Quirk but the public did not. He wanted a statement from the Board regarding the allegations if they were untrue or over exaggerated.

In reply Mr Ward said it was not intended to downgrade the X-Ray service in Dungarvan. They had always had difficulty in maintaining this service in the single-handed situation they were in with it when the question about holiday relief arose they contacted every known radiographer to see would they take on this service for the month of August and were unsuccessful. This was not an isolated case where they had difficulty in getting a locum.

Locums were notoriously difficult to get. In Mallow a surgical unit had to close temporarily recently because a locum anaesthetist could not be got. Board member Dr Ormonde who was their radiographer in Ardkeen had difficulty in recruiting a locum radiographer in even such a large centre as Waterford.

He said that it took special arrangements to provide X-Ray services in Dungarvan in the first place. Col M Ferris said that it should be pointed out that alternative arrangements had been made by the Board for X-Rays during the time the Dungarvan facility was closed. Dr J D Ormonde said that it was not true to say that it has been left to the last minute to seek a locum radiographer to take over when it first became known that locums would be needed. He placed an advertisement in the Sunday papers in three columns two for Waterford and one for Dungarvan. They had been only able to get one.

Mrs K Brady-O'Neil said that Dungarvan was not any worse than Carlow and she asked had the fares taken the X-Ray unit that had been there. Col Curran said that he accepted without a qualification that the position was as stated by Mr Ward but he had wanted this officially clarified. He personally had not made any allegations but had been concerned because the story had appeared in bold-type in a daily paper and the Board had also come under criticism in the 'News & Star'.

The Chairman Col James Murphy said that there was no shortage of press reporters to write these stories but there was a shortage of radiographers. Mr John McNally, who reacted sharply to the Chairman's remark said that it was true to say that they were not providing the services. "There is no use joking about it" it was no joke when a person was sick and could not get a service. Col Curran said that he regretted Mr McNally's remark while the system was not perfect under each Minister for Health considerable improvements had been made. The Board was certainly concerned about the inadequacies of the service. However wonderful promises had been made although he accepted the service was not perfect and never would be.
