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## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### POSSIBLE OUTCOME OF EXPENSES ISSUE

The decision of the Local Government Auditor to surcharge members of the County Committee of Agriculture in respect of the £144 paid out as expenses to members of a deputation from the Committee which travelled to Dublin in December 1976 to discuss fishery problems with the then Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture has now become a major issue between the members of the Committee and the Department.

Since the money was paid out to the members concerned and more especially since the Auditor made his decision known to the Committee earlier this year the matter has assumed more and more serious aspects. Despite representations made to the Minister to waive the Auditor's decision, the Minister in a letter read at the Committee's September meeting last week pointed out that he had no power to approve of the payment or to change the Auditor's decision. This in fact means that the surcharge must stand and must, apparently, be paid.

Irrespective of political affiliations, the members of the Committee are as one in their resolve not to pay the surcharge and some have dramatically declared that they will accept the consequences rather than repay the money involved. Their stand is based on the principle rather than the amount involved. They feel that they travelled bona fide to Dublin on public business, were received by the Parliamentary Secretary who discussed the problems at issue and as such they were legally entitled to the expenses incurred.

However at the time that the matter of the payment of the expenses first came up, the Department informed the Committee that the payment would not be in order. Nonetheless the Committee, by unanimous decision instructed the CAO to pay the expenses and this was done. It was as a result of this decision that the Committee now finds itself on a collision course with the Department.

In the Department letter read at last week's meeting of the Committee no mention would be taken if the members pursued their determination not to repay the money and it would now appear to be a case of sitting tight with each side waiting to see what the other will or will not do.

The Committee is comprised of 16 members with a political ratio of 12 Fianna Fail 3 Fine Gael and 1 Independent and the position is that if the Department stands firm in upholding the Auditor's decision and the Committee do not agree to budget from their decision in refusing to pay the surcharge, all the members are liable to suspension. However this is not the most serious aspect of the situation. For the members concerned the long-term consequence could be more serious because if the issue is not resolved, they could find themselves also disqualified from offering themselves for re-election when the local elections come around next year.

It is to be hoped that such a sequel will not occur and that in the circumstances some amicable settlement can be arranged to resolve the issue.

### VAT ON NEWSPAPERS

Members of the Provincial Newspapers Association in their ongoing campaign to seek a reduction in the VAT rate on the sale of newspapers held a general meeting in Waterford recently to consider the latest position.

A letter on behalf of the Tanaiste and Minister for Finance Mr. George Colley, T.D., was read to the meeting and members generally expressed disappointment that the proposal for a percentage rebate,

based on circulation, was not entirely acceptable to the Minister. However an invitation in the letter for further discussions with senior officials of the Department of Finance was welcomed.

Plans for future moves in the furtherance of the campaign were discussed. The VAT rate on the sales of newspapers in Ireland at 10 per cent is the highest operating in any of the nine states of the European Community, some of which, such as Britain, have a zero rating.

### AS YOU LIVE SO SHALL YOU DIE

There are many interesting facts in the Annual Report for 1977 of the Medico-Social Research Board not least the chapter which refers to mortality in urban and rural areas of Ireland.

Pointing out that there are many differences in the environment of those who live in cities compared with those who live in rural areas which may have a profound influence on mortality, the report states that men in Ireland whether married or single have a longer expectation of life than in England and Wales while, on the other hand, women had a better expectation of life in Ireland. On the overall, the married have a longer expectation of life than the single or widowed and women have a better expectation of life than men.

In the 1971 census there were approximately 3 million people living in the Republic of Ireland. Men outnumbered women by 13,000. However, the number of women alive over 65 years of age was greater than the number of men. Below 65 years of age men outnumbered women in every age group. Because more women than men migrate to Dublin and other large towns there are more women than men in the urban areas and more men than women in the rural areas.

A study carried out by the Board showed that men had an increased risk of death from all causes taken together in Dublin County Borough than in the remaining urban districts and a higher risk in the remaining urban districts than in rural areas. The differences in female mortality from all causes between the three areas are not significant so the urban/rural gradient in death risk in Ireland is a male phenomenon. During the study no reason came to light as to why women lived slightly longer in England and Wales than in Ireland except that it may be related to the larger families and greater poverty in Ireland, with the additional stress this places on women.

The life expectancy of males at birth in Ireland as a whole in 1971 was 68.8 years and for all urban areas combined it was 67.4 years. On the other hand the female expectation in Ireland was 73.5 compared with 73.4 in all urban areas combined.

Reasons given for the higher mortality for men in urban areas were, in the main, stated to be diseases caused by our way of life, for instance heart attacks and some of the more common cancers. Lung cancer, the commonest cancer in men and chronic bronchitis are strongly associated with cigarette smoking and more cigarettes are smoked per head of population in Dublin County Borough than rural areas. Urban air pollution also contributes to mortality, particularly from chronic bronchitis. Cigarette smoking is also an important associated factor in heart attacks, particularly in middle-aged men and for cerebral thrombosis or stroke.

Certain causes of death, according to the report, are associated with a high consumption of alcohol, particularly of spirits, such as cancer of the oesophagus, cirrhosis of the liver, pneumonia and tuberculosis. Alcohol expenditure in the Republic of Ireland

is 48% greater in urban than in rural households. Lack of daily exercise may also be a factor contributing to the higher death rates for men in Dublin City, particularly from heart disease.

The chapter concludes: "There appears to be no doubt that one's way of death reflects one's way of life and the study shows that for men the way of life in rural Ireland results in a lower death rate and better expectation of life than the way of life in Dublin".

## REPAIRING NON-TARRED ROADS WASTE OF MONEY

When a 2-man deputation from the Knock area was introduced by Cllr. D. Ahearne at a meeting of Waterford County Council in Dungarvan last Monday, it requested that a road at Harrowhill be tarred. Mr. Ahearne said that this road had been taken over by the Council in 1969 and despite the fact that a great deal of money had been spent in repairs on it since it was still almost impassable in winter time. The deputation had come he said to ask the Council to tar the surface now.

The members of the deputation Messrs. Neville and Moloney then told the Council that they had written to the Council so badly potholed that it was impossible to drive a car over it. Mr. J. D. Hally Co. Engineer said that he would have a report prepared for the Council's next meeting.

Arising from this Deputy A. Deasy said he would like to

have the figures on what roads such as this had cost Mr. P. Ryan. He understood from some of the Council staff that it was costing a stack but he would like to get figures to prove or disprove this.

Deputy Deasy then maintained there's a big waste of good public money on non-tarred roads. They are costing too much to repair as the surfaces are washed away every year.

The Co. Engineer said that he did not accept this. He pointed out that if the mileage of tarred roads was to be increased it could only be done at the expense of something else.

Cllr. O'Ryan said that he would like to see more emphasis on repairing County roads and they should look for more money to do this.

It was stated that the figures requested by Deputy Deasy would be available at the estimates meeting.

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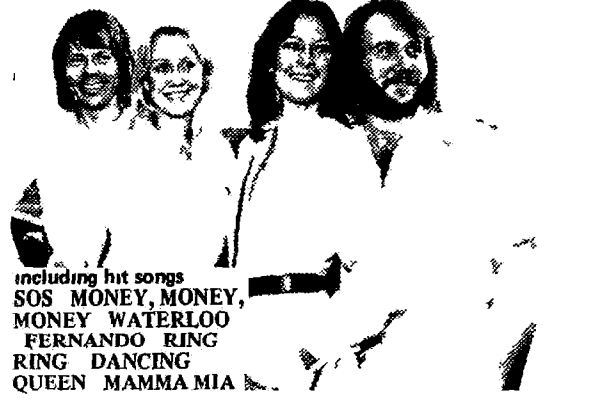
