SURPRISE WIN FOR ARDMORE

Ardmore 2-9, Clashmore 1-9. Ardmore caused something of a mild surprise at Fraher Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday last when they beat favourites Clashmore in a very exciting Western junior hurling semi-final...

Ardmore who meet St Mary's in the final clinched victory in the dying seconds with a goal and a point from James O'Donnell.

It was their dogged resistance which brought them victory in a game in which the issue remained in doubt throughout a close second half. Clashmore ruled the play in the first half after which they led 1-5 to 0-4. But despite their dominance they seemed to take victory for granted and treated the outsiders with a certain amount of contempt.

They brought Liam Bourke from attack to defence in the second half and while his inclusion here strengthened the sector his absence from attack literally paralyse this area. On the other hand, Ardmore white not being spectacular, kept plugging away and a great goal from Denis Conway in the 39th minute brought the sides level at 1-5 each. The sides were level again at 1-7 and 1-8 each before a point from a John Fitzgerald free inched Clashmore ahead.

Slabh gCua, in one of their infrequent sorties found a chink in the Ballinameela defence and Mike Hickey winning a great ball let fly a perfect shot only to see the ball blocked by a flying leap from the Ballinameela keeper John Walsh.

It was one of the best saves seen at the venue for many a long day and one which proved what for Ballinameela when they were at their most vulnerable. It spurred Slabh gCua to one of their brief periods of dominance and two Albert Burke points brought the sides level at 0-3 each by the 20th minute.

Slabh gCua literally died at the touch however and Ballinameela took a complete control notching three points to leave them unflatteringly ahead 0-6 to 0-3 at the break, although they were unlucky when a great goal from John Walsh in the 28th minute struck the inside of the upright and bounced clear across the goal line.

Declan White cut Slabh gCua's deficit when he pointed a minute into the second half but again Ballinameela took control and John Walsh made no mistake when he had what proved to be a vital goal in the 58th minute.

The winners were totally on top for the next ten minutes almost embarrassingly so. During this period the winners made Slabh gCua look like a very mediocre side as their flowing football tore the Touraneena men to shreds.

But the all important scores did not come due in the main to overplaying the ball in a crowded goalmouth as Ballinameela tried almost suicidally for goals.

Three minutes into the third quarter Declan White pointed for Slabh gCua leaving just four points (1-6 to 0-5) between the sides. The score precipitated a remarkable recovery by the losers and in the ensuing ten minutes they were transformed from a beaten side into a side capable of taking the wind.

Ned Power who moved from full back to full forward caused havoc around the Ballinameela goal area and only Trojan work by the winner's defence averted disaster for them on several occasions.

John Dalton and Declan Fitzpatrick had points to leave just two between the sides. It was a case now of survival for Ballinameela as Slabh gCua piled on the pressure. But luck was with the winners as sub Pat Ahearn missed a certain score when he failed to convert a cose in free for the losers.

Play was at fever pitch as Ballinameela with a last ditch effort lifted the siege and Donal O'Conors got the clinching point just on the call of time.

As stated Ballinameela were the team of all the talents yet they could be considered lucky to have survived in the end in a game they should have had well wrapped up before the end of the third quarter.

A repeat of their failure to convert chances to scores could prove vital in the final and this is one aspect of their play that their mentors will want to work on before the penultimate hurdle.

However full credit to them for their very attractive brand of football and to their defence for such a heroic effort when under such considerable pressure late in the game.

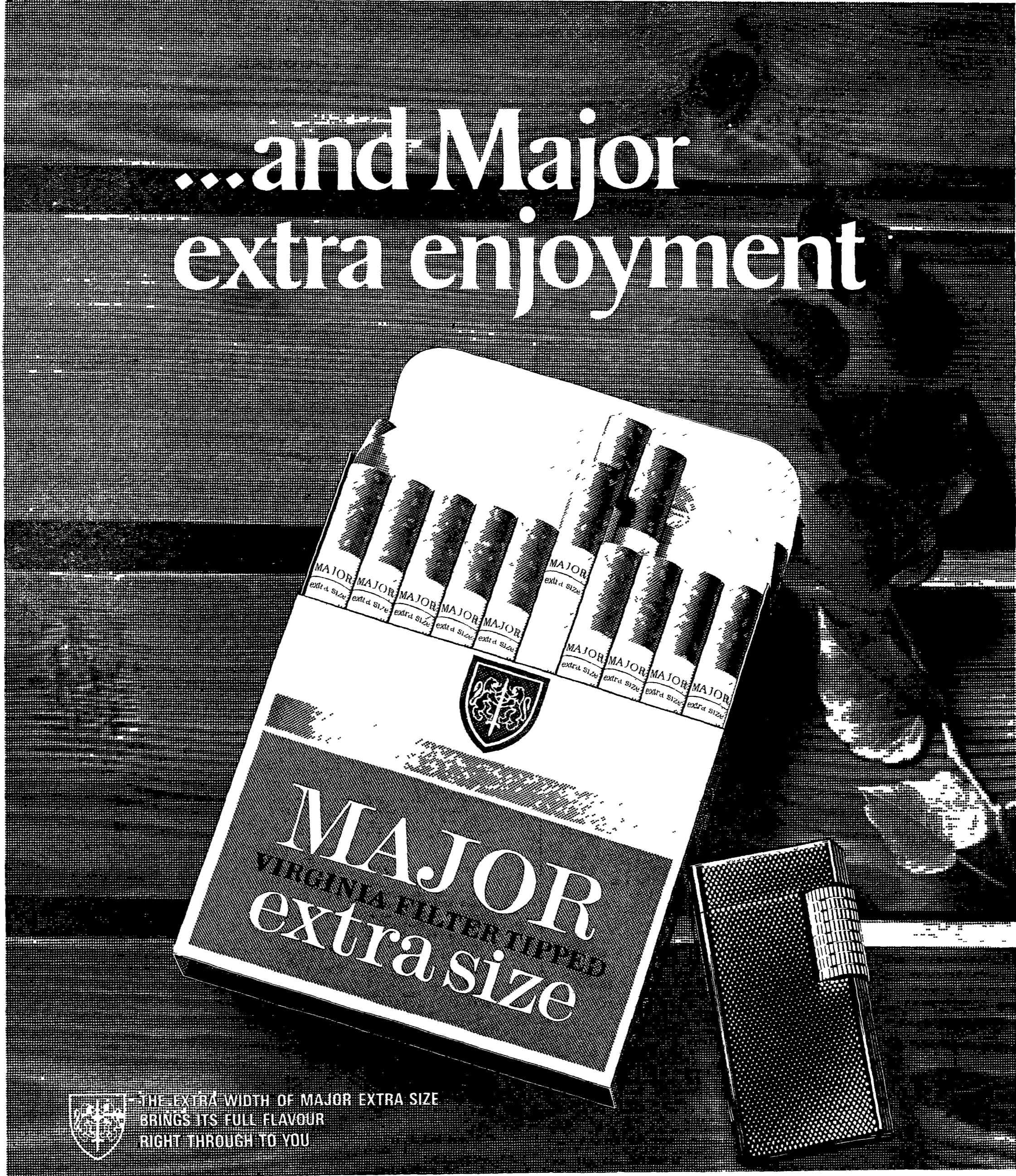

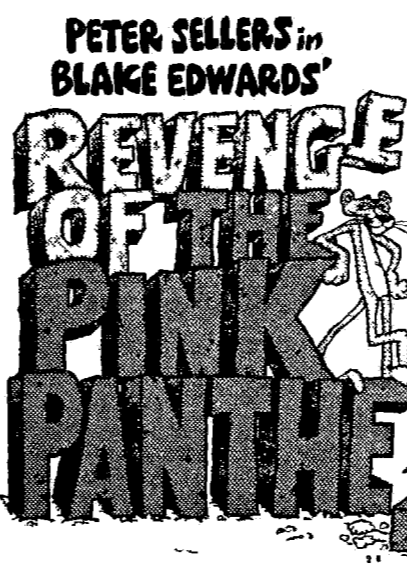

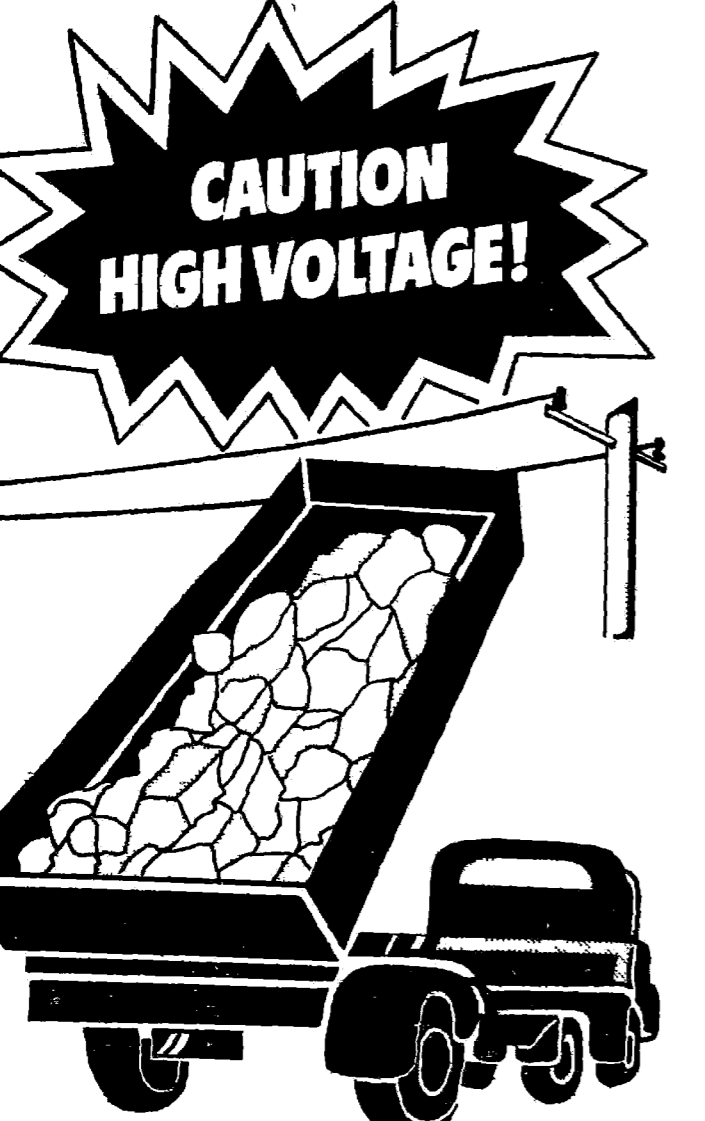
