PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

RTE 2 RECEPTION STILL FREAKISH

It is now almost a month
since RTE 2 was officially
launched but in many areas
there is still a great deal of
dissatisfaction and confusion
about the quality of reception
from the station.

In most areas throughout
County Waterford and in par-
ticular the districts of West
Waterford a satisfactory, pro-
per reception seems to be the
exception rather than the
rule. Many viewers thought
when they had the new RTE 2
aerials erected that the signals
from the new station would
automatically flow in. Experi-
ence has taught them other-
wise and by and large recep-
tion is rather freakish. It has
happened that following the
erection of the new aerials
some have got fairly good
reception while others within
a stone's throw have received
little or nothing.

Dungarvan and the other
areas in the West of the
county seem to be rather badly
hit by this freak reception.
Parts of Dungarvan tuned in,
apparently, to the Mount
Leinster transmitter get
reasonably good signals, but
those areas of the town which
are beamed to the RTE 1
transposer at Kilmarnock
(Strike's Hill) outside the town
served by Mullaghinish have
no reception.

As far as RTE 1 is concerned
this transposer is necessary to
boost their signal for Dungar-
van and West Waterford. A
similar boost is needed for the
RTE 2 signal to ensure its
proper reception in the area.
RTE have admitted this and
have agreed that a transposer
for RTE 2 would be erected
at Kilmarnock. They have not,
however, stated when this
transposer will be placed in
position and this despite the
complaints of the thousands
of viewers affected in this
large area.

The frustration which TV
viewers in Dungarvan and the
West of the County have
suffered as a result is not good
enough and there is an
obligation on RTE to rectify
the position without further
delay.

A GREAT UNREST

Strikes, threatened strikes,
work to rule and go slow
activities are symptoms of the
great unrest which is rife all
over the country at the pre-
sent time. The various unions,
the government and em-
ployers' organisations appear
to be gearing themselves for
major confrontations which
will mark the winter and
spring of 1978-79 as a period
of great discontent. The
unions are seeking big wage
and salary increases, the
government is fighting infla-
tion and the employers are
fighting for survival in the
open competitive markets.
The situation is one not
peculiar to Ireland but because
of our weak economy we are
less able to weather these
storms than our colleague
countries in the EEC. We can-
not pay ourselves more than
we can afford as we seem to
want to do at all levels. If
there cannot be a proper
balance between production
costs and competitive market
prices then the whole economy
will collapse and the ship will
sink.

WE MUST CONSERVE OR ELSE!

The recently published
Fisheries Report of the ESB
for the year ended March 31,
1978 again voices grave con-
cern for the future of Irish
salmon. An increased fishing
effort in recent years has
reduced native salmon stocks
to a critical level. If these are
to be preserved urgent action
is now imperative.
The salmon life cycle is
such that the impact of ex-
cessive exploitation in one
year will not become evident
in a declining run until a
minimum period of four years.

has elapsed when progeny
return from the sea. Up to
very recent times there was
little talk of scarcity and that
probably accounts for the
serious deficiency in our
knowledge of the situation.
Expediency, rapacity and
ignorance are known to have
wiped out the once bountiful
salmon and sea-trout stocks of
countries like Portugal, Spain,
France, Germany, Switzerland,
Denmark and Holland is in-
ferable at this stage to gain
public acceptance here of
the concept of Ireland as a
non-salmon-producing coun-
try? Apparently not but unless
action to conserve the stocks
that now remain is taken as a
matter of urgency all the
evidence at present available
points to that reality in the
foreseeable future.

Anybody caring for Ireland's
natural resources cannot be
happy with the present condi-
tion of many of our rivers and
their stocks of fish. In the
ultimate it is the Minister for
Fisheries who must deal with
the problem and decide on
the necessary remedial
measures not in the interests
of the many contending lob-
bies which are putting him
under pressure but rather in
the overall national interest.

In this regard it is of in-
terest to note how salmon
develop. It takes about one
year for a fertilised salmon
ova to become what is called
a fingerling and about two
years to become a smolt or
parr. At this stage it migrates
to the sea where it usually
remains for from one to three
years. The specimens that
return soonest are called
grils. They have grown to the
adult state in coastal and off-
shore waters, seldom reaching
more than 7 lbs. Those that
stay longest in the sea have
probably covered thousands of
miles and travelled as far as
Greenland waters. They are
the 15 lbs plus specimens
which are now becoming in-
creasingly rare in Irish rivers.

To complete their life-cycle,
salmon must return to fresh
water where they spawn but
so many are now being cap-
tured by the drift-netters on
their way back to the rivers
that the spawning stocks have
 dwindled to the present alarm-
ing critical level. This is the
main problem which will have
to be handled and solved if
salmon are not to become
an extinct fish species in our
rivers.

A VISITOR'S GUIDE TO THE COMERAGH MOUNTAINS

Recently I received a review
copy of "A Visitor's Guide To
The Comeragh Mountains,"
just published by Blackstaff
Press Ltd., Belfast and I have
spent several hours of great
pleasure reading through its
enthralling pages. Its author
is Patrick Warner and the only
information the book gives
about him is that he "has
owned a small cottage in the
heart of the Comeraghs for
many years".

It is evident that Mr. War-
ner knows the Comeragh re-
gion like the palm of his hand
and that the compilation of
the book was for him a real
labour of love. He describes
the mountains with their
corries and precipices, loughs
and rivers, moorland and
streams as one of the loveliest
and most dramatic regions in
Ireland and he has packed his
book with factual advice on
walking, camping, fishing and
mountaineering while the
practical maps and breath-
taking photographs are com-
plemented by vivid descrip-
tions of the mountains their
people and history.

Down through the years I
have, myself wandered
through certain areas of the
Comeraghs and I have heard
many of the old stories and
legends associated with various
districts of the wild and
lonely range but it was only
when I read through Patrick
Warner's book that I learned
the story of the benign ghost
who is reputed to haunt the
Nire lakes. He says of these
"They are often fished some-

times by men who spend the
night there despite their
reputation of being haunted,
perhaps because one of their
legendary ghosts seems to be
a kindly and thoughtful
spectre. He is called the Dark
fisherman and he emerges in
silence from the gloom of the
night, silently takes the rod
from the luckless fisherman
who has caught nothing,
catches trout for him, and
goes again as silently as he
appeared."

"A Visitor's Guide To The
Comeragh Mountains" is
much more than an ordinary
guide book, it is one of the
most exciting, descriptive
pieces of writing which I have
come across in a long time.
It should appeal especially to
those of us who live in close
proximity to the mountains
but who know little about
them and who view them only
from a distance. My own
reaction after reading it was
to find a little more time to
explore the places it describes
so vividly.

EEC MOVES IN TANNING INDUSTRY CRISIS

Mr. Ray Burke, Minister of
the job crisis in the Irish
Commerce was in Brussels last Mon-
day where he urged EEC of-
ficials to take anti-dumping ac-
tion against South American
exporters of hides who are un-
dercutting Ireland on the Brit-
ish market.
Mr. Burke told the officials of
the Irish Leathers Group which
includes the loss of 140 jobs at
the Leather factory in Dungarvan
by the end of January.
Brazil, Uruguay and Argenti-
na have taken restrictive
measures to protect their own
tanning industry. Boosted by a
12 per cent government subsidy
their exports are able to under-
cut Irish Leathers on the Brit-
ish market by 30 per cent.
Apart from Ireland, France
and Germany have also tabled
complaints on behalf of their
leather industries.
Mr. Burke subsequently told
newsmen that he was pleased
about the positive response he
met at EEC headquarters.
Action on countervailing
duties against Brazil could be
decided upon on December 4
next. The Commission will also
discuss the problem with the
Argentinians in view of obtain-
ing an auto-limitation of ex-
ports.

Heavy Jail Sentences For Most Serious Crimes

These cases are probably the
most serious I have had the
duty to deal with since I be-
came a judge said Judge D P
Sheridan at Waterford Circuit
Court last week when he sen-
tenced three men to a total of
14 years in prison when they
pleaded guilty to charges aris-
ing from a midnight robbery at
Glen Lower Cappagh, Co. Wa-
terford on November 27 1977.
Before the court were Thom-
as Hodnett (43), 29 Parnell
Place Cork, William O'Keefe
(58), no fixed abode but stated
to be a native of Doneraile Co.
Kork and William Lenane (36),
c/o Donn Foley, North Main St,
Youghal.
Hodnett and O'Keefe were
charged with entering the
house of Mrs Mary Bannon,
Glen Lower on the night in
question and stealing £400 in
cash and cheques and with put-
ting Mrs Bannon and 80 years
old Mrs Joan Byrne in fear by
subjecting them to force. Len-
ane was charged with aiding
and abetting the crimes and
with being an accessory before
the burglary.

Mr D Budd, B.L. for the
State told the Court that Hod-
nett and O'Keefe broke into
Mrs Bannons shop around
midnight and stole £400 and in
the course of the robbery they
threatened the two women with
a knife and put them in ter-
rible fear. Lenane drove the
car on the occasion and drop-
ped the other two at the scene
and collected them later.
Judge Sheridan said that
these two ladies should be sub-
jected to a planned and care-
fully executed robbery at that
time of the night, shocked the
conscience of the Court. It was
a very bad thing that in a lon-
ey place that the two ladies
with a small shop should have
to face the conduct of being
frightened out of their wits.

"I have tried the best I can",
said Judge Sheridan to find
excuses for the conduct of
these three men but I find it
extremely difficult to do so.
No words that I can utter
can condone their conduct
one but particularly with
elderly people involved. These
elderly people should be
able to rest in their beds at
night without being subjected
to threats like this. The only
thing I can say about this case
is that those involved did not
use actual violence.

ADDITIONAL CHARGES
Additional charges against
Hodnett were breaking and en-
tering the house of John Ron-
ayne Knocknacoola Cappagh
on May 8 and stealing £130
and with breaking into the
house of John Slattery Bally-
gagin Dungarvan on June 12
and stealing goods to the value
of £225.
Judge Sheridan sentenced
Hodnett to 5 years for breaking
into Mrs Bannons and to 6
years on each count of sub-
jecting her and Mrs Byrne to fear
and force. He was sentenced in
addition to 3 years on each of
the two other charges.
O'Keefe was jailed for 4
years for robbing Mrs Bannon
and to 5 years on each of the
two counts of subjecting Mrs
Bannon and Mrs Byrne to fear
and force.
Lenane received a sentence of
2 years on the aiding and abet-
ting charge.

Waterford Co-op
Invest In £3.5m.
Milling Complex
Waterford Co-op Society is to
invest £3.5 million on a new
milling complex at Oonnamneer,
Co Waterford. The announcement
was made by Mr Stephen
O'Connor, chief executive of the
Co-op at a reception held to
mark the occasion in Waterford
last Friday week.
Mr O'Connor said that the
capacity of the new mill would
be 40 tonnes per hour and that
it would be one of the most up-
to-date and efficient in the
country. He added that the site
for the new mill complex had
been acquired and an order had
been placed for the construction
of the plant.
Mr O'Connor went on to say
that this very significant invest-
ment was necessary to cater for
the anticipated increased de-
mands for government feed in
the Waterford region. The new
centres from Castlelyons in
East Cork to Bray in Co Wick
low The Society at the moment
was one of the largest millers
in the country with 110 drive
centres producing 100,000 tonnes
of animal feed per annum. By
1982 they would produce 200,000
tonnes at four centres, namely,
Castlelyons, Dungarvan, Rath-
drom and at the new complex
at Oonnamneer.
UNIQUE PACKAGE
Mr O'Connor also announced
details of a unique package
aimed at increasing milk yields
and profitability from dairy
farming. Waterford Co-op are
introducing a number of new
services to farmers including
reformulation of all concentrate
feeds a new and unique high
energy ration, and a scheme to
facilitate farmers wishing to
change to bulk handling of
feed.
The official introduction took
place on Friday at the farm of
Mr David Kent Foxmoor,
Halfway House, Waterford. The
farm was chosen because it has
already progressed to a herd
of over 900 gallons per
cow. In addition David Kent's
future ambitions in dairying
point to the immediate rele-
vance of the new service an-
nounced by the Co-op.
The Shandon range now ex-
tends to nine cattle feeds and
all rations have been refor-
mulated to take into account
the latest research on animal
feeding and performance.

Waterford Regional Game Council ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Chairman of Waterford Regional Game Council, Mr James Ryan made a scathing attack on Game Licence holders who expect the Gun Clubs to supply them with game year in year out. Farmers, he stated should be made aware of the present position of game stocks throughout the countryside. Who he asked was going to replace game stocks at the end of the season? For years he said the non-gun club member has been out setting game stocks to the detriment of the registered gun clubs. He emphasised that all gun club members were covered by a mandatory insurance scheme. The delegates attending conveyed the message that at the moment there was a complete lack of observation of the new game laws in certain areas. Ryan felt that nothing concrete would be done until the Game Wardens appear on the scene. Waterford County Gun Clubs have spent many thousands of pounds, with the backing of the Forest & Wildlife Service on the propagation of game species. It has been learned from the Forestry & Wildlife Dept that the Woodcock Investigation Programme is to continue during 1978-79. The object of this programme is to obtain factual information on the mysterious Woodcock for little is known of the yearly movements and breeding habits of this bird. The annual dinner dance is to be held at the Andree Hotel Waterford on February 10, 1979. As this function has been held in West Waterford since the Game Council began we look forward to visiting East Waterford. Mr Bob Otthy, Head Game Keeper for Curraghmore Estate gave a very valuable talk on vermin control. The delegates learned much from Mr Otthy in the all-too-short time that he spoke. Indeed, Mr Otthy was so interesting a speaker that the Game Council invited him back to give a lecture on the different aspects of his most fulfilling job. This new club has been accepted as an affiliated angling club by the Munster Council of the IFSA. DUNMORE EAST The Conger King visited Dunmore East on Sunday and noticed that over thirty trawlers were in the harbour. The trawler owners are having a tough time this season as for example last week none of the skippers could get out to the fishing waters owing to the adverse weather conditions. The landing of fish at Dunmore East have deteriorated at least by 50% compared to 10 years ago. The anglers have noticed a remarkable reduction in their catches for the past 3 years or so. A few hundred pounds of fish compared to thousands of pounds in catches. The fisheries of our coast are being dozed out of existence by the foreign trawlers. It is time that there should be rigid inspection of all catches to prevent the decimation of the fish stocks. THE ANGLERS AND CONSERVATION This Majesty suggested that all catches be weighed at sea. This could easily be done by arriving at the weight of say dog fish spur dogs, congers, etc by a system of measurement, and that is that a conger say of 4 feet with a girth of 8 inches would be weighed as weighing so many pounds and a bigger conger of say 5 or 6 feet with so many inches in girth would count as so many pounds. These agreed weights would be listed and be available to each boat captain. When the net is caught had been measured the boat would be removed and the fish put back in the sea. This would save a huge number of fish as in each competition tons of fish are uselessly slaughtered and brought ashore to just weigh them in and what a sad sight to see so many fish being dumped after every competition through the length and breadth of Ireland.
