COUNTY CONVENTION

Nominations and motions for the County Convention are now in the hands of the Co Secretary and everything appears to be in readiness for the annual get-together of delegates on Sunday, January 28th at Dungarvan.

Four candidates are nominated for the post of County Chairman — Kieran O'Ryan (outgoing), Noel Dalton, John A. Murphy and Paddy Kenneally (Mr's Own).

John Fraher, Paddy Kenneally, John Walsh (Tramore), Sean De Burca and Noel Dalton are nominees for the post of Co Registrar and for the post of Oligeach Gaelic, Nicolas Mac Craith, Sean Dolrin Ni Murchu, Pat Curran, Seamus Fitzgerald and Liam Salpeal are the people from whom the officer will be chosen.

Three are nominated for the post of PRO Seamus O Braonain, Liam Gleeson and Tom Cunningham.

The three nominated for Munster Council are the outgoing members, Tom Cunningham and Seamus Power with Sean De Burca.

It is too soon to predict the number of contests that will be held, but perhaps next week the position will be clearer and we will all have some idea of who will stand and who will decide to withdraw.

A total of 41 motions are listed and these relate to by-law and general rule changes. I have not seen all the motions but most of the ones that I have seen are of an interesting and likely to arouse good discussion.

The motions dealing with rule changes concerning the new dates for the All-Ireland Championships, the new points system for the National Leagues and so on, have been tabled by Dungarvan. The same club will move a motion to have County championship trophies increased from twenty to twenty-one and they are seeking to have the by-law concerning the granting of postponements tightened up.

Portlaw, who have tabled a number of motions are seeking to have Munster senior final dates free of county senior championships, unless there is prior agreement by the teams concerned. This, in my opinion is asking for too much and I doubt if it will get the required support, especially as it shows no consideration for any other grade.

A motion from Affane shows how displeased they are about the accuracy of material used in match programmes and ask that they be checked before being put on sale to the public in future.

Abbeeside and Clashmore have motions seeking to wish the losers groups and the former are asking that an effort be made by the appropriate authority to have Association venues de-rated.

Erin's Own, who have quite a number of motions, ask that a committee be set up to publish a County Annual and that all evening games begin at 7 p.m. Next week after I have seen a complete list of motions I will deal further with the County Convention.

PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

A STATE OF CHASSIS!

There is no doubt about it but the country is in a sorry mess in terms of labour relations at the moment and strikes, official and unofficial, are causing widespread disruption.

The postmen's strike in the majority of the Dublin postal districts has affected business generally throughout the country as postal deliveries are cut off, the series of one day stoppages by telephonists in exchanges around the country are hitting hard also and now to top it all we have a national bus strike on our hands which is creating chaos in all areas.

The combined result of these three major stoppages is inflicting very serious damage on the social and business life of the country and points to the almost complete state of "chassis" in which we now find ourselves.

The strikes are hitting not only industry and business but also the ordinary people and particularly the poor and the old while the government's managements of industry and the unions wrangle the whole fabric of society seems to be falling asunder. Nobody appears to be happy any more and the harmony and vitality that are such prerequisites for a thriving economy are very much absent from the scene.

It now seems to be a question of what group will be next to go on strike rather than when the existing ones will be settled. It would appear that no one section is blameless for the whole sorry mess in which we now find ourselves and with all we have we have nothing but trouble, tension, discord and dissatisfaction. It is no consolation that England is also facing a near general strike situation and a national emergency. We are not very far from a similar situation now and it could take very little more to sink us entirely.

It is beyond time that the whole field of labour relations in the country was reviewed in a responsible manner and it is time that the government's managements and the unions as well as the workers got to grips with the situation before it gets completely out of hand.

A STAGGERING SUM

Of course the root of all the evil is money and in the manner in which inflation has devalued it. Take the field of health services alone as an example. In 1978 a staggering £400 million—£43 million more than anticipated was required to finance the coun-

try's health service. The estimates of the various Regional Health Boards for the coming year show a sharp increase in this figure but the Department of Health has warned that severe cut-backs will be required to keep costs within the limits which will be allowed by the national budget.

An editorial in last week's Irish Medical Times refers to the position and states "If the drastic financial cut-backs in health spending which are being mooted at the present time are eventually decided upon then it is clear that the health services of this country will suffer a very serious deterioration unless there is a corresponding increase in the efficient and effective use of existing resources."

At the same time the editorial goes on to point out "The past few years have witnessed an exuberance, nay even a euphoria, within the health arena as hospital plan after hospital plan has been unveiled (and even one or two built and opened) as declaration after declaration concerning the need for back-up community resources have been solemnly proclaimed as endorsement after endorsement of the absolute importance of primary health care has been portentously declaimed by Minister, academic clinicians and administrators alike."

And then the editorial puts the sixty-four dollar question "But how does one carry out what would be a radical piece of health care planning without appropriate funds?" How indeed!

THE SECOND WORST

Carrying on with the litany of misery which seems to be so much the lot of our everyday lives at present a recent report of the European Commission revealed that Ireland was the second worst offender on the EEC's strike black-list for 1977 and the record for 1978 shows that the position has not improved.

A total of 605 working days were lost per 1,000 employees here in '77 and it took the Italians to beat this by totalling a round 1,000 days for the same number of workers.

But our strike figures are way above the average of 353 days for the nine states of the EEC. The British are the third worst offenders (447 days) but as might be expected the Germans have the best record with only one day lost per thousand workers.

Good Year For Credit Union
—Lismore and Cappoquin Credit Union Limited reviewed another successful year when the annual general meeting was held at Our Lady's Hall, Mercy Convent, Cappoquin. A dividend of 6% was approved. Shares grew from £5,076 to 77,003 and the amount of loans from £54,537 to £73,394. The income-expenditure account showed a surplus of £4,583.

The Chairman, Mr Paddy Pollard, who presided extended a welcome to the members and especially to the auditor Mr John A. Browne attending his first meeting in that capacity.

The reports of the Board of Directors and credit committee indicated a year of substantial progress and expansion. Emphasis was laid in both reports on the need for continued and increasing saving — especially when a loan is being repaid. It was also stressed that firm action against the tiny minority of members who have not honoured their contracts would be continued.

Both reports paid tributes to the memory of the late Sean Jeffries whose death had provided a great loss to the movement.

The report of the supervisory committee presented by Mr J. McE. Pollard showed the affairs of the credit union to be in a satisfactory situation.

The Treasurer's report presented by Mr R. Brennan was found most satisfactory and adopted and Mr Browne's explanatory remarks were most useful and informative.

The following were elected as Board members for a further three year term—Mrs R. Campion, Mrs M. Crotty, B. Davnes, Pollard, R. Geoghegan, J. Ryan and D. O'Leary.

The C.A.O. revealed that to pay for it over a period of four years the total cost would come to £2,287. They had the money to buy it on right and felt they should do so.

On the proposal of Mr Jack Oullinane seconded by Mr Declan Ahern it was unanimously agreed to install the new system and to pay "on the nail" for it.

Can Farmers Be Stopped From Driving Cattle On Public Roads?

Mr K O'Ryan raised a point at a meeting of Waterford Co Council in Dungarvan last Monday as to whether farmers could be prevented from driving cattle along a public road. Mr O'Ryan told the meeting that it had come to his attention that certain people had raised objections and Garda in his area had approached farmers in the locality to prevent them from driving cattle on the roadway because of the animal droppings they left behind. "I don't know of anyone," said Mr O'Ryan "that they can stop this". Mr C Curran, Chairman said that it was news to him that any motorists were complaining in this manner. "After all," he said "this is an agricultural country and people understand the position". Mr D Hally Co Engineer said that there had been cases where cattle driven on a road-way were allowed to stand around for a time and dirty it quite a lot. This he said, resulted in skidding conditions and in law a farmer could be liable. Mr O'Ryan said that he only raised the point to make it known to the Council that farmers are entitled to drive their

cattle along the roads. Mr M. Hartly said that Mr O'Ryan was quite right and added "farming is the biggest industry in this county. Mr T. Kyne—And still they only pay £8 million in taxes".

Council Call to Fisheries Minister On New Drift Net Law

Waterford County Council at a meeting in Dungarvan last week unanimously passed a resolution calling on the Minister for Fisheries not to enforce the new salmon conservation measures on drift net fishermen in the Lismore Fishery District of West Waterford and East Cork. Proposing the resolution, the Chairman, Mr C. Curran said that he had been asked by the fishermen concerned to bring a deputation to the meeting but he saw no point in doing so. The fishermen had informed him that in introducing the new regulations to the area the Minister had either been wrongly advised or had taken leave of his senses as they felt that this form of conservation was not required in Waterford at all. Mr Curran said that the fishermen in the area who were traditional fishermen had always been their own best water-keepers and had always conformed to the law where the size and depth of nets were concerned. "They feel," he said, "that the new measures are too drastic and that they will reduce their incomes by as much as 50%". BEING VICTIMISED Mr A. Deasy T.D. supported the points made by the Chairman and said that the fishermen in the area and licensed fishermen generally were now being victimised because of the over-fishing by poachers which was going on along the west coast. "What good is it for the Minister to be bringing in these restrictions," said Deputy Deasy "when they apply only to licensed fishermen and which won't affect the poachers of the west coast. This poaching should be first tackled as otherwise the threat to the salmon industry will continue". The resolution was seconded by Mr Hartly and passed unanimously.

VALUE-ADDED TAX - CHANGES FROM 1 MARCH, 1979

The Value-Added Tax (Amendment) Act, 1978, is to come into force on 1 March 1979. The following are the principal changes. Registration Limits The existing limits of £300, £1,000 and £2,000 per taxable period of two months will be increased to £500, £1,500 and £3,000 respectively. Registered persons whose turnover is below the new limits and who wish to cancel their registration should contact their VAT inspector. Auctioneers, Estate Agents and Chartered Surveyors Auctioneers, estate agents and chartered surveyors will be obliged to register and account for VAT at the rate of 10 p.c. on their commission on such of their transactions as are liable to VAT if their turnover in a taxable period of two months is likely to exceed £500. A leaflet explaining how auctioneers, estate agents and chartered surveyors will be affected is available from any VAT office. Livestock Marts and Livestock Dealers Livestock marts and livestock dealers whose turnover in a taxable period of two months exceeds or is likely to exceed £1,500 will be obliged to register and account for VAT at the effective rate of 1 p.c. on and from 1 March 1979. A leaflet explaining how marts and dealers will be affected is available from any VAT office. Agricultural Services The Act introduces a more restricted definition of agricultural services for the purposes of allowing persons supplying such services to remain outside the tax. Under the new proposals a person supplying agricultural services must register for and account for VAT unless (a) he is a farmer as defined and (b) the agricultural services which he provides are supplied by him using the labour force and equipment normally engaged in his farming activities. Services consisting of the natural or artificial insemination of livestock (that is cattle, sheep and pigs) will no longer be exempt from VAT but persons supplying such services in the course of a farming business may, if they wish, remain outside the VAT system. Restoration of 1 p.c. VAT credit in respect of purchases from unregistered farmers VAT registered persons will be entitled to claim in their VAT returns a credit or deduction equal to 1 p.c. of the amount excluding VAT which they have paid to unregistered farmers in respect of purchases of agricultural produce or agricultural services. The system will apply to purchases made on and after 1 March 1979. A purchase document specifying the net purchase price, the 1 p.c. addition and the total must be prepared by the purchaser and a copy supplied to the farmer. If there is a subsequent adjustment in the price the appropriate VAT adjustment must also be made. The 1 p.c. flat-rate addition will not be allowable in respect of purchases of fish (except from fish farms), horses or greyhounds. Schools School or university education, and vocational training or re-training will continue to be exempt. Driving schools, golf schools, dancing schools and the like will be liable to register and pay VAT at the rate of 10 p.c. if their turnover in a taxable period of two months is likely to exceed £500. Agents The existing exemption from liability will be curtailed so as to limit the exemption to travel agents and to persons supplying agency services relating to finance, banking and insurance services. All other agents will be obliged to register for and pay VAT at the rate of 10 p.c. if their turnover in a taxable period of two months is likely to exceed £500. Clubs and other associations Membership subscriptions to clubs and associations will continue to be exempt where they are non-profit making organisations engaged in providing sporting or physical education facilities to their members or are of trade union, trade advancement, political, religious, philosophical, philanthropic or civic nature. Any clubs or associations providing services to their members and not qualifying under these headings will become liable to tax in respect of their membership subscriptions. Motor cars, motor cycles, television sets, radios, record players and records The first tiers of the 2-tier VAT rates at present applied to these goods will be abolished. They are to be replaced by appropriate excise duties, changes designed to maintain the present overall position. Place where international services are supplied Certain changes will occur in regard to the place where international services are supplied. These changes will affect services connected with property, hiring services (other than the hiring of cars and other forms of transport), the provision of staff, advertising services, data processing and certain other services. Some of these services, even though supplied by Irish traders, will be in certain circumstances (mainly where supplied to foreign traders not established here) regarded as being supplied outside Ireland and, therefore, not taxable in this country. Conversely, persons importing such services from foreign sources for business purposes will become liable to Irish VAT on the transactions. Some taxable services supplied abroad for example the provision of accommodation by tour operators, will become liable to Irish tax where the service is supplied from an establishment in this country and not from an establishment in the country in which the service is provided. A leaflet on this subject is available from VAT offices. Foreign Firms In general, foreign firms which do not trade here and which are at present entitled to repayment of tax on certain services supplied to them in Ireland will, in addition, be entitled to repayment of tax on most goods. The main exceptions will be passenger motor vehicles and petrol. Ships and Aircraft The supply, modification, repair, maintenance and hiring of certain kinds of commercial ships and aircraft will qualify for the zero rate of tax. The importation of ships and aircraft of the same kind will not be chargeable to tax. The ships affected will be vessels of 15 tons gross or more used for specific designated purposes. The aircraft affected will be those used by international air transport companies. Sea-fishermen Sea-fishermen will continue to have the option to remain unregistered for the purpose of VAT. They will also benefit from (a) the zero rating of all fishing boats of 15 tons gross or more, (b) the continuation of the present repayment provision in the case of boats (assisted by Bord Iascaigh Mhara) not qualifying for the zero rate and (c) the introduction of a repayment provision for certain items of heavy equipment. (Purchases of sea-fishermen's catches will not qualify for the agricultural 1 p.c. flat-rate relief referred to above). Shannon Airport Goods supplied by a registered person within the area of the Shannon customs-free airport to another registered person whether inside or outside the airport will become liable at the zero rate. VAT Return A new form of return will be introduced. This will not be significantly different from the existing return and it will have an improved and simpler format. It will however require traders to declare full details of their imports in each tax rate category including the zero rate. Instructions on how to complete the new return will be issued in advance of the date by which the first return will be due. Imports Registered persons are at present entitled to import most goods for business purposes free of VAT but not of duty. All imports will now become taxable but in general registered persons who undertake to enter their imports in their next following VAT return will continue to be entitled to import their business supplies without payment of tax at the time of importation. Only registered persons who satisfy the Revenue Commissioners that their trading transactions in this country are conducted mainly at a fixed place of business here will be eligible for this facility, where a person has been granted relief at importation on condition that he enters his imports on his next return and he fails to meet this condition the facility may be withdrawn from him and tax required to be paid at the time of importation on subsequent transactions. How to apply for VAT registration Applications for VAT registration should be made on form VAT 1 available from any VAT office. Other Changes Other changes will affect such items as business gifts and samples, trading stamp companies, the State and local authorities promotion of, and admissions to, certain fairs, shows and exhibitions (annual agricultural shows will not be affected), and VAT terminology.
