PUBLIC BELT UP IN A BIG WAY

Since seat belt wearing became law on February 1, the public response has been measured at a staggering 80 to 90 per cent. These figures were reported from 26 checkpoints around the country jointly operated by the National Road Safety Association and the Garda.

Mr Noel Kelly, the Association's Director said that they were a little surprised but highly pleased by the extent of the response. "The motorist public," said Mr Kelly, "has responded excellently and I would like to remind them that the prize of at least 80 lives saved by the end of the year is what can be gained if the wearing rate continues at the first day's high figure."

WHO WAS MADAM DE FAGES?

We have been browsing through the old souvenir book and programme of the Grand Bazaar in aid of funds for the Young Men's Society held in Dungarvan in August 1904 for the past couple of weeks. It has shown us who the principal traders and business people were in the town at the time and given us an insight into the foundation of the CYMS in the Old Boro' almost 80 years ago.

This week we deal with the personalities and the leaders of the town's social life at the time as listed in the various committees which were involved in the running of the bazaar which evidently was something very much out of the ordinary.

Among the patrons of the functions were Most Rev Dr Sheehan Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and the Parish Priest of the time in Dungarvan, Very Rev John Canon Power. Also Dr J. C. Hackett, William Dunlea, James Cummins, John R. Dower, Capt. M. Moloney, Dr John W. Williams, John V. Kelly, William O'Meara, E. P. Williams, Solr. John F. Boyle, Dennis Ryan and J. J. O'Shea M. P.

Chairman of the Management Committee was Thomas Power with whom were Michael Barry, Patrick Foley, Jeremiah McCarthy, James Lanigan and D. Ryan who was Secretary of the Committee.

The Musical Committee listed consisted of Dr Williams, James Dunne, M. J. Walsh, John R. Dower, John F. Boyle and John Murphy, Secretary while the Sports Committee had as members Thomas Connolly, Edward Dee, John Dee, James Hayes, John R. Dower, John F. Boyle, William Lawlor and J. V. O'Neill Secretary.

My interest was greatly whetted when I came to the Ladies Committee and saw that it had as President Madame de Fages of Luxembourg while amongst its other members was a Miss M. de Fages, presumably her daughter. The intriguing question at once posed itself to me who was Madame de Fages and how did she and her family come to be involved in such a manner in Dungarvan in 1904? Any inquiries along this line which I have made have yielded no information, but perhaps that is because I have not pursued my inquiries in the right quarters. Is there anyone who might know the answer?

and dance—in this year's "Classic 79" which will be staged in the Community Centre next month.

IRISH LEATHERS GROUP SET OUT THEIR PROBLEMS

In a statement issued on behalf of the Irish Leathers Group the factors causing the current problems which have led to decisions by the Company to close their factory in Gorey and reduce the workforce in Dungarvan by 130 and in Portlaoise by 30 are set out as follows...

Irish Leathers current problems are three-fold (1) It is being forced to pay enormously inflated prices for its raw materials (2) It is selling in a market which is influenced by cheap subsidised leather from South America and other markets and (3) because of various external factors it has been placed in an uncompetitive position vis a vis its main competitors in the British tanning industry...

Since 1975 the cost of a hide to Irish Leathers has risen from £8 to the current price of £24. This huge increase is the result of a curious anomaly in particular Brazil and Argentina have banned the export of raw material to the EEC...

Irish Leathers is prepared to consider any scheme of assistance which the Government may propose, even the issue of a new industrial investment tax to protect the maximum number of jobs in the Group including Gorey in the context of the cost per job currently being paid by the State for new industrial investment...

To compound the above situation Irish Leathers is encountering unfair competition for the reasons described above and this has effectively closed off a portion of the company's traditional market. Even so the company has managed to maintain its share of the medium to high quality market. However facing an unequal contest with South American imports it has lost a considerable share of the market for lower quality leather...

Irish Leathers is well aware of the hardship which its redundancies will cause particularly in Gorey. However there is no purpose to be served by endangering the jobs of the remaining 1,000 employees in the Group. At this stage the company needs the full support of all its employees to carry it through this difficult period without further job losses.

Irish Leathers disadvised position vis a vis its main competitors in Britain and France arises from a recognition by the Governments in those countries of the severe difficulties which their tanning industries were encountering in Britain in addition to Government participation through the National Enterprise Board in the tanning industry...

At a time when the company is in acute need of cash to pay for raw materials and meet other inflated costs it is suffering substantial financial losses. The company has been selling part of its output at uneconomic prices for some time in order to postpone redundancies. The only solution to this situation outside of substantial Government help is the reduction of production capacity to a level which the market can absorb...

Irish Leathers can no longer sustain four production units as a result it has been decided that the Gorey unit should be closed. This will cause the loss of 200 jobs in Gorey. In addition production at Dungarvan is to be reduced by the closing down of uneconomic shops and the leather production. This will lead to 130 further redundancies. The Portlaoise workforce of 400 will be reduced by 30. The Carrick-on-Suir plant will continue to operate at its current level of employment.

In all 360 workers will be made redundant leaving a total remaining workforce of approximately 1,000. Even at this level Irish Leathers is still one of the largest tanning groups in Europe. This decision has been taken only after the most careful consideration and is purely designed to safeguard the remaining jobs and attempt to guarantee a viable future for the Irish tanning industry. If this rationalisation does not take place or if substantial Government help is forthcoming it is the opinion of the Board of Irish Leathers that the total industry will be placed in serious jeopardy.

- 1 Previous notice: Preliminary information was given in the notice issued in July 1978, to all employers registered for PAYE purposes. 2 New forms: A new tax deduction card (P9/P11), a new four-part P45 and a new emergency card/temporary tax deduction form (P13/P14) have been designed for the expanded pay-related social insurance system. Samples of the new forms will be issued to employers shortly. 3 PRSI contributions: The new percentage rates of contribution and the earnings ceiling will be announced by the Department of Social Welfare after the Budget. 4.1 Newly designed Tax Deduction Card: An employer will be concerned mainly with the part of the card bordered by the red lines and with column 19 for the operation of PAYE and PRSI. Additional columns (2 to 5 and 15 to 18) are provided for the convenience of the employer and may be used to record other information relating to wages or salaries. The employer will not be required to return the new tax deduction cards to the Collector-General but must retain it for six years or such shorter period as may be authorised. The tax deduction cards for the year 1978/79 must, however, be returned with form P35 to the Collector-General after 5 April, 1979. The following points should be noted in relation to the new cards - (i) procedures relating to the deduction of tax are unchanged, (ii) the figure to be entered in column 14 is the total PRSI contribution, i.e. the employer's share plus the employee's share already entered in column 13, (iii) each week of insurable employment must be recorded by the entry of a tick on the appropriate line in column 19, (iv) provision is made in the coded boxes at the foot of the form for additional information required for Social Welfare purposes, viz - (a) date of commencement of employment (F4) and date of cessation (F5), (b) social insurance contribution class (C2), (c) total number of weeks of insurable employment (F2), (d) if there is a change in social insurance contribution class during the year, the new class (C3), the date of change (B4) and the number of weeks at that class (F3).

- 5 Form P45: The newly designed form has four parts. The use of Parts 1, 2 and 3 which are required by the Revenue Commissioners, remains unchanged. PART 4 SHOULD NOT BE DETACHED BY THE EMPLOYER FROM PART 3. PART 4 WILL BE REQUIRED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE AS EVIDENCE FOR ENTITLEMENT TO BENEFIT AND IT IS THEREFORE IMPERATIVE THAT THE STATUTORY REQUIREMENT THAT FORM P45 BE GIVEN TO AN EMPLOYEE FORTHWITH ON LEAVING EMPLOYMENT SHOULD BE STRICTLY ADHERED TO. The additional information required on the new form is - (a) Social Welfare contribution class at the date of cessation, (b) number of weeks of insurable employment, (c) occupation and industry codes (if shown on the certificate of tax free allowances or tax deduction card), (d) date of commencement of employment if after 6 April. The new four-part form must be used for all cessations of employment which occur on or after 6 April 1979. The old three-part form must not under any circumstances, be used for cessations which occur after 5 April 1979. If part 1 of the old three-part form is received by the Inspector of Taxes in respect of a cessation of employment which occurs on or after 6 April, 1979, it will be returned to the employer with a request to complete the new four-part form. Stocks of the old form on hands at 5 April, 1979, should be destroyed. Supplies of the new form will be issued before 6 April, 1979. 6 Form P60 (certificate of earnings, tax and PRSI contributions): The statutory requirement that every employee in employment on 5 April be given a form P60 should be strictly adhered to for the year ended 5 April, 1979, and subsequent years. In addition to being a certificate of earnings and tax deducted the form may be required as evidence for entitlement to Social Welfare or Health benefits. The form P60 is being redesigned for the year ending 5 April 1980, to include the additional information provided for in the new Tax Deduction Card (paragraph 4.1 above). 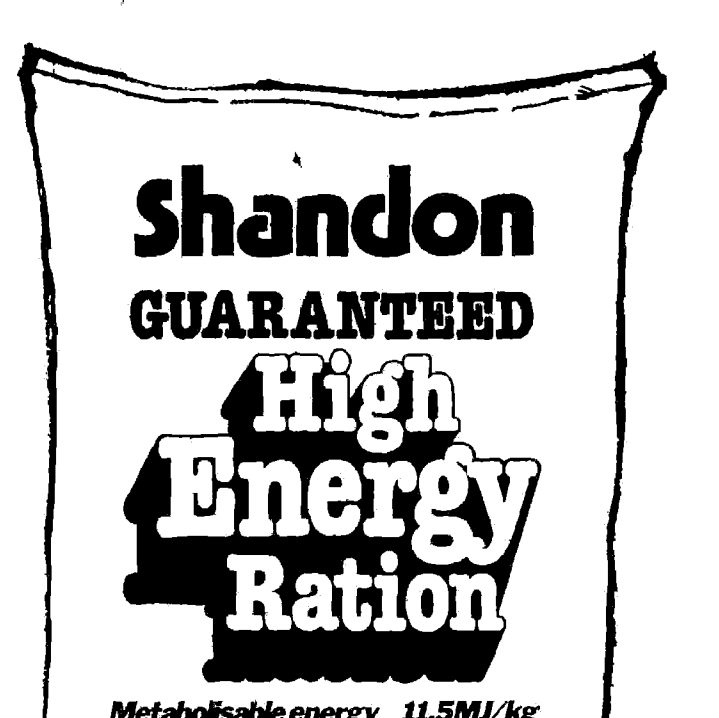
