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IT'S THE ELECTED GOVERNMENT MUST RUN THE COUNTRY

The basic reason for free elections is to afford people an opportunity to democratically elect a government but once having been given a majority mandate it is the elected government which must run the country. It is not an easy task but in the overall it must be done for the common good. Sectional interests must be seen for what they are when they create difficulties and hardships for the bulk of the community and should be dealt with in a firm manner by the Government of the country.

No one section, no matter how strong a lobby it can mount or how much muscle it can flex should feel that it has the right to throw the whole country out of gear. But that is exactly what is happening and over the past couple of years we have been staggering from one crisis to another as the sections with the power make grasping demands for bigger and bigger slices of the community cake.

In the public services of transport, power and communications there have been running battles which have caused almost utter chaos and where the Post Office is concerned these have been going on so long that it is difficult to remember when we had a telephone service that was not totally or partially disturbed. The postal service has now joined in the fray and for the past two weeks we have a situation which has almost crippled not only business and industry but has effected us all privately in one way or another.

The affluence and improved life styles which we now have, have been coupled with attitudes of discontent and dissatisfaction. It is a case of every man or at least every section for itself in the greedy race to secure more money. Parity is the name of the game and no one can see why they should be called on to stay put for if they lose their place in the order of

things, if they miss out one opportunity in any of the wage rounds or inter-rounds as we have in so many cases now, they may be passed out by others.

There does not appear to be much use any more in saying that these attitudes and actions must eventually bring down the country or that we are demanding more than the economy can afford or that we do not give an adequate work return for the demands we make and expect to get. There is no need paid to that sort of talk any more nor indeed to what one famous American President once said "It is not what my country should do for me but what I should do for my country."

THE OLD DUNGARVAN WEIGH HOUSE

The topic of the old weigh-house which was a dominant feature of Dungarvan Square for generations and when it finally disappeared from the scene was referred to me again last week-end. When the question as to when it was demolished was first posed to me I got in touch with the Town Hall where I was informed that according to the recorded minutes of meetings of the Urban Council the demolition occurred in the period between the months of October and November, 1955.

This was questioned by a reader who claimed that the weigh-house was still standing at the Square in 1957. Last week-end I was again contacted by another reader who informed me that he was resident in the Square in the late 1950's and he was quite positive in assuring me that the demolition occurred in August of either 1959 or 1960.

When I pointed to the Council's official records he surmised that perhaps the weigh-house ceased to function as a weigh-house in 1955 and that it was at that time that the weigh-bridge was removed. He assured me that he remembered quite well being awakened by the noise of the jack-hammers being used by the contractor en-

gaged to knock the building on an August Monday either in 1959 or 1960.

I'm afraid I cannot put the matter any further, that I have done but it is obvious that there is still quite a lot of controversy as to the year in which the demolition occurred.

PUTTING THE RECORD STRAIGHT

While the question of the Dungarvan Weigh-house may still remain unsettled, the matter of how long the West Waterford G.A.A. Board has been functioning and how many Annual Conventions the Board has held since its foundation has

I took this matter up when it was drawn to my attention that this year's Board Convention was officially named as the 53rd. From the information supplied to me the Convention was the Board's 50th and I referred to the matter in the first instance merely to have the record put straight.

Since then a letter from Mr. Michael Curran, Green Street Cappoquin, listing a number of Conventions over the past 30 years showed that there was a variation as to the numbers corresponding to the years in which they were held.

Now I understand that officials of the Board have carried out an examination of the position and are satisfied that the Board's most recent Convention was in fact the 50th and not the 53rd. However having celebrated (as it now happens prematurely) their Golden Jubilee three years ago, the Board cannot now have a second!

Be that as it may the record has now been put straight and when the 75th and centenary celebrations of the Board come around they will be celebrated correctly.

A MATTER OF CHOICE

Following a decision by Dungarvan Urban Council to name their new housing scheme at Gallowhill "Mike Byrne Place," objections have been raised and it was agreed at a recent meeting that the name might be changed to "Byrneville" if this found more favour with the selected tenants who will occupy the new houses.

However the truth of the matter is that the Council has no power to name a housing scheme in this way although their suggestions could be accepted as a recommendation. The ultimate decision will rest with the tenants and once they have taken possession of the new houses they can decide, by a majority vote, what the name of the scheme is to be.

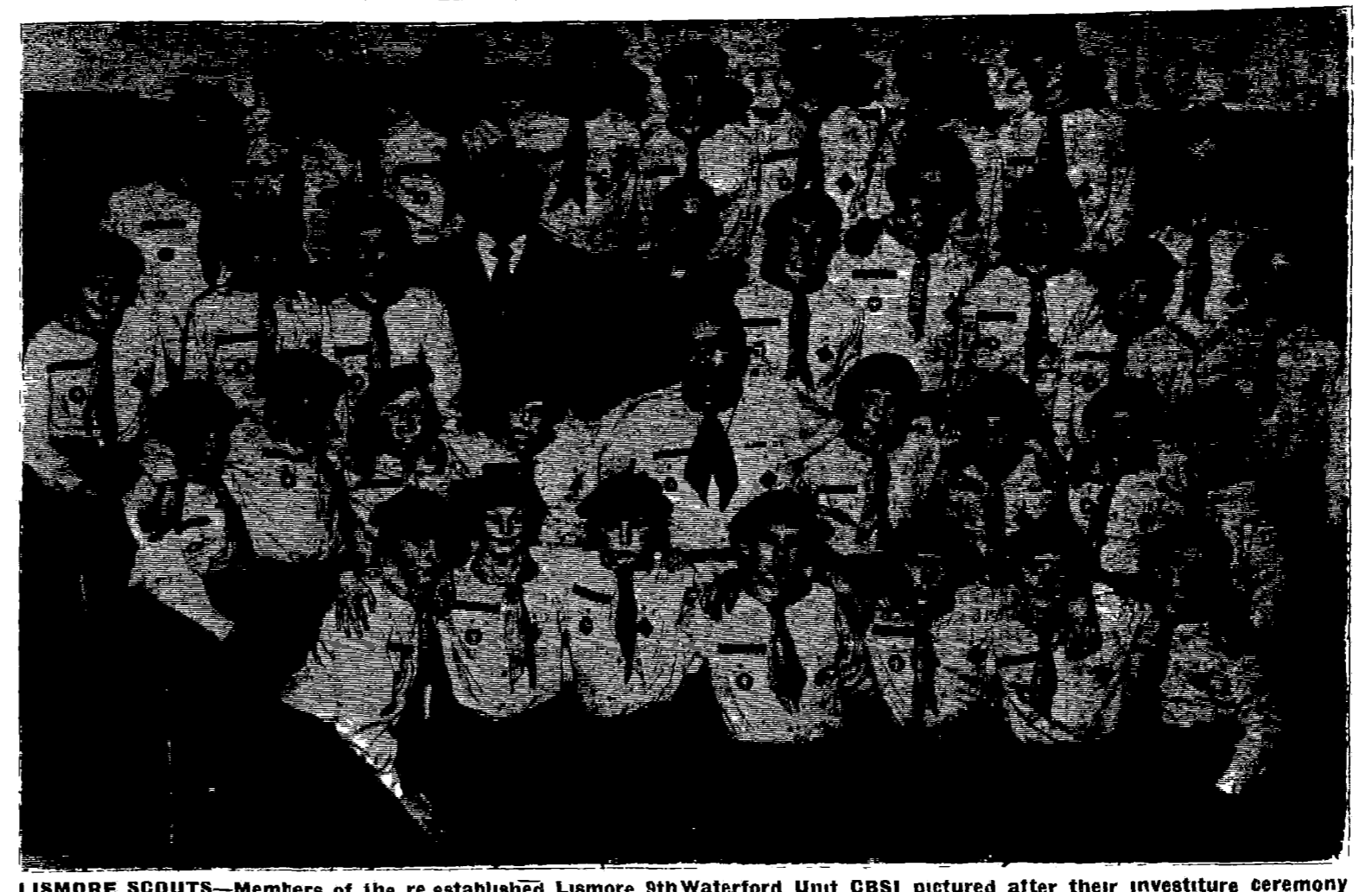

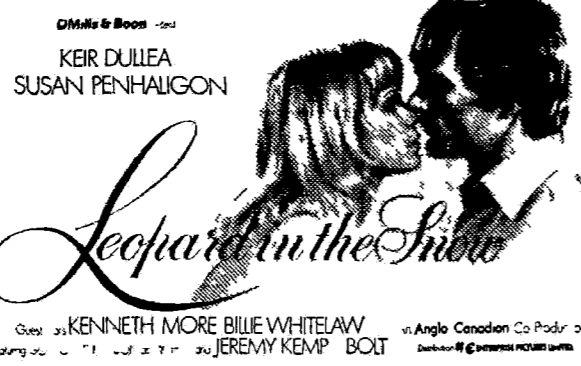

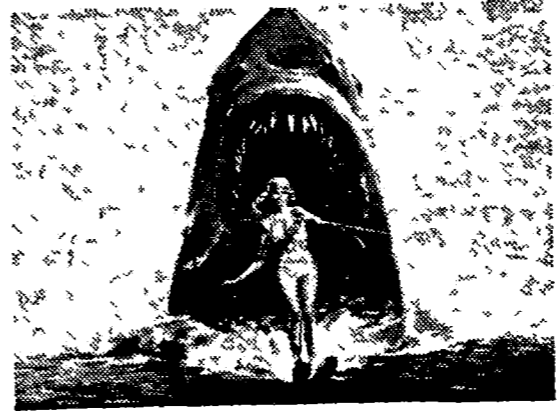

The evening's entertainment was crowned by a screening of the film 'Los Mor' 67' which brought back memories of the National Jamboree held in Lis more that year.

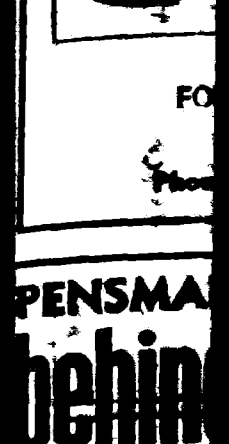
