PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

GOOD NEWS FOR DUNGARVAN

It was the best possible news to set the happy mood for the St Patrick's week-end in Dungarvan when it became known last Friday evening that redundancy notices for a big number of employees at the local Leather Factory due to take effect on April 2 had been withdrawn.

When the bad news that a large part of the factory's work-force was to be let go first hit the town just before Christmas it created an air of doleful foreboding. Negotiations between the officers of the men's Union in Dungarvan the AT & GWU, the Management of the Irish Leathers Group and the Departments of Industry and Commerce and of Labour were commenced and the first results of these were that the threatened redundancies which were to take effect on January 31 were postponed for a month. The Union-Management negotiations continued, and resulted in a further extension of the redundancy deadline to April 2.

While these negotiations were proceeding a number of workers at the factory which I understand to have been something in excess of 30, left to take up jobs which they had obtained in other places. The position which has now resulted in the latest decision is that the notices served have been withdrawn by the Company in relation to all employees still working at the factory. This is indeed a most welcome decision and one that has brought with it a general sigh of relief in the town not only where the workers and their families are concerned but for the town in general towards the economic prosperity of which the factory has contributed so much down through the years.

As I understand the position now, taking into account the number who have left the factory and secured employment elsewhere plus those on long term disability and those due for retirement, there will be an overall reduction of approximately 50 jobs at the factory.

It is to be hoped now that the management the Union and employees will co-operate fully with each other in the future running of the factory and in those items still outstanding and which have to be resolved and that they will succeed in their further discussions to bring about an agreed solution which will be in the best interests of all concerned.

OLD LANDMARKS IN DUNGARVAN

The Journal compiled by Michael Uasal O'Donnahill, Colaisle na Rinne which I have been referring to in recent weeks contains a wealth of historical and archaeological information about many parts of the county.

Looking through it I came across an entry about Dungarvan Castle compiled from notes from such historians as Ryland, Hansard and Egan and this is what it records.
'King John (1295) built the castle and probably it was the same prince who fortified the town enclosing it with a wall, having towers and bastions. This wall enclosed the town as it was then from the Look Out up the Dea Walk to the top of Friary Street down Friary Street by Keohan's corner (now Mandies) on down to the quay and back to the Castle corner (in the present Garda Station).

The castle and fortifications, having fallen into decay, were repaired in 1463 by Thomas, Earl of Desmond, to whom the customs of the town were delivered to be appropriated for that purpose. The walls and tower are now (1834) for the most part removed except where they have been joined to modern buildings. The ruins of the castle and fortifications are still to be seen.

'This place of defence situated within the harbour of Dungarvan consisted of a castle, placed in the interior of an oblong fort which was regularly fortified and mounted with cannon, and was protected by circular towers at the angles. The external defence is approached by a narrow passage between two battlemented walls at the extremity of which is the entrance or keep, a narrow tower-like building flanked on each side by circular castles. The gateway which is very narrow, opens into a small quadrangular space from which there are recesses opening into the massive walls, probably intended to protect those who were stationed at the entrance and who were thus enabled to annoy the assailants. The interior of the building or castle was elevated some few feet above the external fortifications, and was, in itself, capable of resisting an attack even after the loss of the outworks.

'The site of the castle is the property of the Duke of Devonshire is now (also 1834) rented by government who have erected a miserable barrack for the garrison of the town. The barrack a modern building, planted as it is in the centre of an ancient and venerable fortification looks singularly mean and inappropriate. The soldiers, too, with their modern dresses and modern implements of war do not harmonize with the appearances around them and give the idea of being intruders on the property of the heroes of distant times.

We will return again to the Journal for further extracts in the coming weeks.

PAYE Protest

Dungarvan's Big Parade

Thousands of workers marched through the streets of Dungarvan on Tuesday, last adding their voices of protest to those of the workers all over the country in the massive PAYE protest in Dublin and Cork. The marching crowds were so great that nothing was seen of the streets since the Eucharistic Congress in 1932. All other major centres had their local protests too and the message that went out to the government from the huge marching majority was that the entire taxation system would have to be changed to make it a fairer and more equitable system to take in all the tax dodgers and to ease the burden at present being borne by the PAYE groups.

In Dungarvan, the parade organised by the local Council of Trade Unions and headed by the Dungarvan Pipers Band moved off from O'Connell Street at 2.30 p.m. and having marched around the town they came back to the Square where a brief public meeting was held. Throughout the parade the business life of the town was virtually at a standstill as workers of all grades and categories left factories shops and offices to take part and show their solidarity with the demands for tax reliefs for the PAYE group. Even the pubs were closed for the duration of the march. Groups from many outside areas throughout the county including Cappoquin, Lismore, Kilmadigan, Cappoquin, Lismore, Kilmadigan and other centres travelled to Dungarvan to take part in the parade which led on to the streets of Dungarvan. The chairman of the subsequent meeting, local Trade Union District Officer, Tony Mansfield to

remark that the gathering on the Square was the largest he had ever seen at a public meeting in the town during his lifetime.
All the speakers advised the marchers to use their votes in the forthcoming elections to show their power and to vote only for candidates who would favour a reform of the present unfair taxation system.
There was a power cut in several areas from 5 p.m. and many had to be content with cold teas as it remained off until 7.45 p.m. when normal current was again resumed.

GOREY STRIKE ENDS

The six-weeks-old strike at the Gorey Leather factory ended on Tuesday when the workers voted by more than four-to-one to accept new proposals for an agreed closure of the plant.
The proposals which included severance pay of £160 per year of service were worked out at talks between Irish Leathers Ltd and the IFGWU under the chairmanship of Rights Commissioner Con Murphy. They were accepted by the workers on a vote of 113 to 25.
The settlement means that the Gorey Leather factory will now close down officially after 43 years with the loss of 200 jobs. This closure is part of the rationalisation plan at Irish Leathers Ltd.
Under the terms of settlement Irish Leathers has agreed to sell the factory without any strings attached at the end of three months if it cannot find an alternative operation for the factory.

Two international companies are believed to be interested in taking over the Gorey Leather factory and are having discussions with Irish Leathers and the IDA.

Mums and dads sport and showbiz personalities grannies granddads and even toddlers will all take to their feet on Sunday April 1st next for the sake of their health and Ireland's needy children. 
