## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### WE SALUTE YOU JOHN TREACY

He deserved all and more if indeed that were possible, of the superlatives that screamed across the tops of our morning newspapers on Monday which variously described him among other things as Superman and Ireland's Wonder Athlete. Yes indeed he proved what a superlative athlete he was on the quagmire, rain-swept, Limerick on Sunday when he literally ran away from the greatest cross-country runners in the whole world to once more win the crown which marks him as the greatest of them all.

The frail, 21 years old Villierstown boy — he looked little more among so many of the other competitors of mighty physique — made it all look so easy as he went off on his own to run his own race and to ultimately cross the finishing line some 70 metres ahead of his nearest rival the mighty Polish runner and European champion, Bronislaw Malinowski.

What a day it was for the Irish at Limerick race course on Sunday as they watched John drive his light, fragile body through the mud covered track and how we all wondered at the courage, determination and great heart he possessed as he moved up through the field in the very early stages and pick off one runner after another until he came to the front. How we agonised as we watched him open up the gap in case he had gone ahead too soon and how we gasped as we saw him slip and stumble in the mud on the second last lap but with what relief we sighed as we saw him recover at once without hardly breaking the rhythm of the momentum that drove him on. His final lap in the gruelling 12,000 metre race as he left the elite of the 25 competing countries behind was no more than a lap of honour.

It was then as he admitted

afterwards, that he experienced his only real worry during the race as thousands converged on the track to cheer him home. Fortunately he got through unscathed and unhampered as the crowd chanted from the stand "Ireland Ireland, Ireland".

And what an unassuming young man John Treacy is. Despite the great honours he has won for himself so early on in his career, he accepts all the accolades with a quiet, humble charm that marks him as a truly great champion and a very fine person. On Sunday night when he could well have been at the centre of the exuberant celebrations that followed his magnificent victory John shied away from the limelight saying "What I would like to do is to get my father and mother and anybody else close to me to-night and let everybody else do the celebrating." How typical of this wonderful young man.

And so once again for the second year in succession we salute you John Treacy for the great honour which you have brought to yourself your family your native Villierstown, to County Waterford and to Ireland and we thank you for that great thrill and the wonderful feeling of pride which as Irishmen, we all experienced last Sunday as you crossed the line and proclaimed yourself once more undisputed cross country champion of the world.

### FATHER TWOOEMEY'S WELL

As I briefly stated last week our reference to Fr Twoomey's Well outside Dungarvan in the previous issue prompted Mr. Bertie O'Neill, Strandside South Abbeyside to drop me a note concerning an interesting if rather macabre story about Fr Twoomey who was a member of the Augustinian Community in Dungarvan in the mid 1800s around the period of the Great Famine.

Mr. O'Neill states that there was an Augustinian House in front of the main entrance to the hospital at Springmount in those times to which Fr Twoomey was attached. Each day during the famine years of 1847-48 a creel-load of fever corpses used to emerge from the rear entrance to the hospital opposite the Holy Well, and proceed for burial to Reilig a' tSleibhe, the mountain graveyard at the top of the hill at the Sweep near Pulla, the carter getting so much per corpse.

At times a person only half dead might be included in the load. Fr Twoomey made it a point of reading his daily Office around the Well while keeping an eye out for the funeral crier. Any body which showed signs of life he had returned to the morgue for medical examination, thus making sure, as Mr. O'Neill points out, that each life in the end, was treated with the dignity due to a being made in the image and likeness of the Creator. Mr. O'Neill asserts that even after death the good priest's ghost still hovered about the Well reviewing each funeral pile en route for the graveyard on the mountain.

The location of the Augustinian house at the Spring set me seeking further information about it and I came across a reference to it in "Journey of An Abbey" a history of the Augustinians in Dungarvan compiled by Rev. T. C. Butler, O.S.A. and published in 1973.

Fr Butler who was formerly Rector of the Augustinian College as well as Prior in Dungarvan in the 1960s records that between 1750 and 1754 Fr Nicholas Fitzpatrick, Prior "built his own convent, a solidly-built stone and mortar two-storey cottage with thatched roof" and later a Mass-house at the Spring about a mile outside the town.

He then states "It is an historical certainty that the friars did live at the Spring at this time, as, not only the traditional accounts of the people assert so, but documents in the Augustinian Archives in Dublin verify this tradition.

"Of the location of the house at the Spring we have no doubt whatever. It was in the field opposite Moloney's Garage in what were, up to 1972, the Friary playing fields. Fr James Williams who came to Dungarvan in 1869 refers in his "Chronicles" to a letter he received from an old resident of the district, Miss Susan Kiely in which she describes the Convent of the Friars. "The friars and our family met daily as their homes were almost adjoining. I do not know when the Friars left the Spring. They lived there when my father was a boy (around 1800) and I don't know who succeeded them in the field and house which was always known as the "Friary". The little thatched house still standing (1800) is part of the Priory or out-offices. I heard my father speak of marble chimney-pieces as having

## Councillor Moves Three Motions

Councillor T. Wade had three motions on the agenda for the monthly meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council last Monday night. A fact which caused one member to remark that without them there would not be much on the agenda while another observed that Cllr. Wade had already started his election campaign.

The first motion seconded by the Chairman Cllr. P. Whelan requested that the Council endeavour to provide suitable permanent accommodation for the local Youth Club. This was adjourned to allow negotiations with officials of the Club concerning a suitable site which might be provided by the Council.

The Co-Manager said that the Council would be empowered to negotiate such an offer on a repayment basis similar to that in the case of the local Soccer Club.

It was agreed in the case of the second motion seconded by Cllr. D. Goode recommending the provision of warning flashing lights outside the homes of the St. Martin's Terrace Scheme and in the 13 similar new houses to be built at Childers Estate to enable the occupants to summons help in times of emergency to defer consideration of it to the next meeting for a report and estimate of the cost from the Town Engineer.

The third motion seconded by Cllr. Whelan calling on the Government to take action to amend the present Malicious Injuries Act to ensure that Insurance Companies bear a reasonable proportion of the cost of the claims was passed.

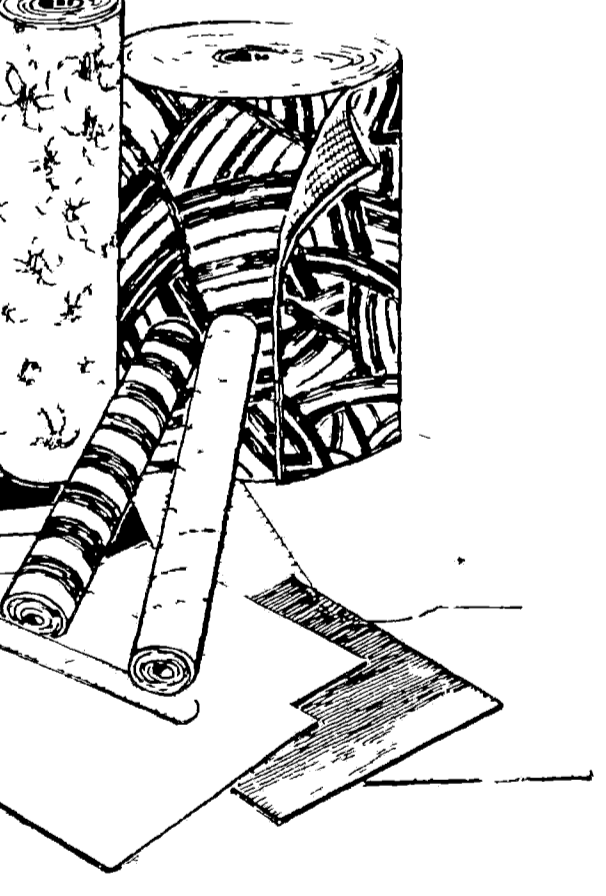

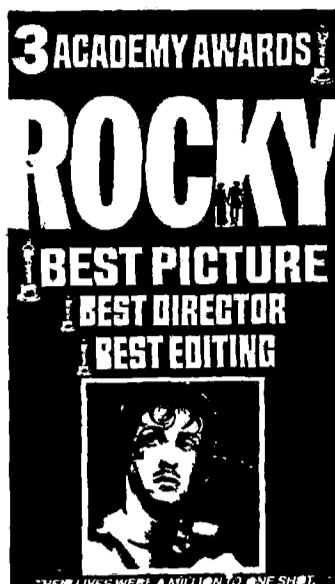

**STRIKE THREAT BY COUNCIL ENGINEERS**

If the threatened strike by Local Authority Engineers goes ahead as planned on Monday next it will have a serious effect on all public services in the county. This was stated by Waterford County Manager, Mr C A O'Connor at a meeting of the County Council in Dungarvan last Monday when he informed the members of the present position in the dispute between the Engineers and the Local Authorities.

Mr O'Connor pointed out that the dispute had its origin in claims lodged in 1974 by the Local Government and Public Services Union and the AUEW (Tass). A working party representative of Management and Unions was set up to deal with the claims and completed an agreement in May, 1978 on restructuring and productivity independent assessors were appointed to deal with some points at issue and they issued a report in January 1979.

The Co Manager then said that differences had now arisen about the implementation of the report and these had resulted in the present situation where the staff side had indicated that joint industrial action would be taken as from April 2 if the outstanding differences were not resolved by then. He added that in the interim further meetings were being held between the parties.

**UNION STATEMENT**  
In a statement from the AUEW (Tass) on the matter, issued prior to the meeting at which the original claim was lodged on behalf of the Engineers over five years ago was referred to the Employer/Labour Conference Steering Committee who on November 16, 1978 recommended the lifting of industrial action while an independent assessment was carried out for the purpose of evaluating the benefits which would accrue to the employees if the Engineers Working Party Report was implemented.

The statement then pointed out that on November 22 both sides accepted the recommendations of the Conference. The assessors report was issued in January 12 but it would be played at all owing to the atrocious conditions. However the referee decided to play the match. Sarsfields lined out under severe pressure from the start. With just ten minutes gone the visitors took the lead with a very controversial goal.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN DRIFT NET CASE

It was denied in the High Court in Dublin that the drift net fishermen in the Lismore fishery area were responsible for removing the majority of salmon before they reached rivers in Counties Waterford, Cork and Kerry as well as rivers along the east coast and some rivers in England.

The hearing continued for two days on Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. The action was brought by two Co. Waterford drift-net fishermen seeking to have set aside a by-law made by the Minister for Fisheries imposing restrictions on salmon fishing in the Lismore (Co. Waterford) fishery district.

James Moloney and Denis Lemhan both of Ardmore claimed that the by-law was inhumane and prejudicial to the livelihood and that of the 250 members of the Lismore Fishery Association.

They claimed that the measure changed the close season for commercial fishing for salmon and trout in the Lismore No 4 District from August 15 to July 20 that the opening date for drift-netting was deferred until March 15 and that the weekly close time period was extended by 24 hours.

They also complained that the maximum depth of net allowed to commercial drift-net fishermen was reduced from 45 to 30 meshes. In addition they pleaded that the by-law facilitated fishermen other than drift-net fishermen.

Mr Moloney in evidence said most salmon caught by drift net in the Lismore area were destined for the Blackwater. One salmon caught during the spawning season by a poacher was equivalent to 200 caught by a drift-net.

Mr Moloney who is Chairman of Lismore No 4 Fishery Association recalled it being reported that salmon caught by poachers in the Blackwater were being fed mixed with salt to pigs during winter.

EARNINGS CUT. Cross-examined by Mr Edward Conyn SC for the Minister he did not accept that they were being curtailed in the only reasonable manner possible. If the season was going to be reduced by one third their earnings would be reduced by the same margin.

Bernard O'Keefe a member of the Board of Fishery Conservators in the Lismore Fishery District said he thought the restriction imposed by the by-law would encourage poaching.

LESS THAN ONE. In a study of the River Borrisoleigh in Co Mayo the Salmon Research Trust had discovered that over the past two years the number of adult fish returning for each pair of salmon which had spawned was less than one just to maintain stocks it should have been two.

This was stated by Dr A T West chairman of the Trust when the hearing resumed on Wednesday.
