## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### THEY'RE ONLY WORDS

I have just returned from a round of petrol stations in the Dungarvan area ascertaining whether there could possibly be any truth in the claim of Energy Minister Mr O'Malley that there is no petrol crisis. I found one station closed completely and was informed that it had been so closed since the previous Friday, another was open but had no supplies although they did say that a supply for them was in transit, another was open and had supplies but was operating a rationing system and this seemed to be the general position where the others were concerned. All the stations had been closed tight over the week end.

So, if there is no shortage or at least a shortfall of only 5 per cent as the government has persisted in claiming, why is the overall picture at the supply points as I have stated?

Mr O'Malley was out of the country as I write this, perhaps he has now returned. On Monday night the Taoiseach Mr Lynch, rejecting an Opposition call for the recall of the Dail from the Easter recess, to debate the general situation, said that the Government was concerned about the situation and was determined to rectify the position. "There is an international shortfall of five per cent overall," the Taoiseach said, and the government wants to ensure that this country will get its entitlement as agreed internationally."

If there is only a shortfall of 5 per cent as the government claims, where or who has the petrol and oil. The public are understandably confused but are beginning to recognise that they are being subjected to a big 'con' game involving the government on one side and the oil companies on the other.

It is of little use for the Taoiseach to say that the government are determined to rectify the position. The question is when will this determination be translated into action. There is no point in fobbing the public off with statements about 5 per cent shortfalls and no shortages as this is not the reality of the situation. These statements are merely words and are of no use at a time when it is action that is required.

Government means the act of governing and the exercise of authority by the ruling power in the country. It should not be something done in a passive way. Our economy is being crucified by major strikes at the moment and the best that some of our government Ministers can come up with is that they have no magic formulae to solve the problems. I believe that all the people would be happier if the government took a more positive line instead of allowing us to stagger deeper and deeper into the economic morass which seems to be surrounding us.

**DUNGARVAN JUNIOR WARDEN SERVICE**  
I was present at a very simple but nonetheless important ceremony in the Assembly Hall of the Presentation Convent in Dungarvan last Monday morning when the Chairman of the local Urban Council presented certificates to a big number of senior primary girls who had successfully completed their course of quality for the Junior Warden Service which is operated at the school.

The Presentation Convent was the first school in Ireland to operate the School Junior Warden service although claims to this had been forwarded on behalf of some other school in the midlands. I point this out merely to put the record straight.

The main exits from the Presentation Convent in Dungarvan face on to one of the busiest streets in the urban area which carries heavy traffic especially at the lunch time periods so the accident free record of the Warden Service referred to by the Supt is noteworthy. That it may continue to remain so.

In order to preserve this record, local residents in Mitchell Street and those who park cars in the vicinity of the exit where the white lines running across the road indicate the crossing point for the children of the school, can do much to help by ensuring that their cars are parked well back from the lines at either side to allow the young school warden a sufficient field of vision to see what traffic is approaching from either direction. This surely is not much to ask but it would be a very great help if it were done.

### NOTES ON OLD DUNGARVAN

I came across a rather interesting account of what Dungarvan was like at the beginning of the last century in the Journal compiled by Michael O'Donnell, Coliste na Rinne to which we have been referring regularly in recent weeks.

The account is one written by the historian, Ryland, in the year 1834 and shows that even as comparatively recently as that, conditions in Dungarvan were bad.

Ryland states "According to a map of the town, as it appeared about the middle of the last century, the streets and buildings were of the most wretched description, and they continued in the same state until a very few years since. Crowded with miserable houses, irregular in appearance, without any, or at all events an inefficient police, Dungarvan deserved the reproachful epithets which travellers universally bestowed upon it.

"There were no regular market places no public water-works the courthouse, where the sessions were occasionally held, was considered unsafe for the purposes for which it was originally intended there was no bridge, and consequently no way of passing from the town to the Waterford side of the river (Colligan), except by ferry-boat, or, as was generally the case with the lower classes, by fording the stream at low water. This custom, particularly as practised by females gave rise to ridiculous and indelicate jests which served to impress upon travellers an unfavourable opinion of the inhabitants of the town. In addition to all this, the population were without employment, the fishery neglected and the prisons were a disgrace to a civilised country.

cost of erection of bridge and causeway to have reached £5,000. A neat square and a handsome street connect the town with the bridge. Reservoirs of water conveniently situated, and (what were hitherto unknown in Dungarvan) market-places for the sale of fish and meat, are among the improvements already effected. Here, as in all places where his property extends, the Duke of Devonshire has largely contributed to the establishment of Fever Hospitals, Dispensaries, Poor Schools and other public charities."

The account then goes on to refer to the fishing industry which appears to have been the mainstay of the town in those times and states "The fisheries of the southern coast of Ireland were considered as a national source of wealth as affording employment to a superabundant population, and at the same time yielding an ample supply of nutritious food. The Nymph bank as far as has been ascertained, stretches along the whole of the southern coast at a distance of about seven leagues, from its eastern part at Dungarvan to a distance of from fourteen to twenty leagues from its Western part at Cape Clear and Mizzen Head. This bank is supposed to afford an inexhaustible supply of cod, ling, etc, and might be made to add a great accession of wealth to the country, were a few of the harbours improved by piers, and capital afforded to the fishermen to enable them to equip their vessels. From the poverty of the owners the boats are not in general, in a sea-worthy condition. The heavy expenses even of repairs frequently compel the fishermen to risk their lives with cordage and sails which are almost unfit for use."


**ST. OLIVERS VISIT TALLOW**




