### Unique Attractions At Knock Missionary Congress

Sixty students from missionary societies will present a unique missionary drama as part of the opening ceremony each day at the National Missionary Congress at Knock April 22nd to 28th. In a thirty minute action drama the students who are taking part in a missionary formation course at Kinnage will show that while material assistance to other countries may be necessary in emergencies their right to respect and justice as well as help in their religious quest provide greater challenges to our generosity.

Another twenty students from missionary seminaries will act as stewards in a missionary exhibition showing the new situations in which missionaries work.

**MAIN FEATURE**

The main feature of the exhibition will be five houses built by the students to represent different countries in which their members work. In each house a four-minute audio-visual presentation will show the new initiatives missionaries have been led to take because of political cultural and religious changes in the past ten years.

These two attractions are part of the programme put on each day between 12.45 and 4.30 for the tens of thousands who are expected to attend. The Congress is being held to enable people at home to discover what is happening on the missions to day and how they can be more personally involved.

### AIB TO LAUNCH OWN CREDIT CARD IN REPUBLIC

Allied Irish Banks is to launch its own credit card in the Republic to replace the Barclaycard service for which the Bank has been the agent in this country since 1972. The new AIB credit card will operate under the world-wide VISA card scheme.

This scheme is co-ordinated by VISA INTERNATIONAL a corporation which was set up in 1973 to provide a common international system under which licenses of the Blue White and Gold Bank Americard Barclaycard Carte Bleu etc would operate. There are now 70 million VISA cards in circulation in the world and the Blue White and Gold VISA symbol is displayed in about 21 million outlets in 120 countries.

**FIRST IRISH BANK**

Allied Irish Banks will be the first Irish Bank to provide its own wholly-internationally accepted credit card and it is expected that Barclays and other holders and merchants in the Republic will be transferred to the new AIB VISA card system by the end of 1979. This system will involve the establishment of a major new department within the Bank using a sophisticated computer software facility for processing credit card accounts. The AIB VISA card will provide similar terms and conditions of service as is now provided under the Barclaycard service in the Republic with the exception that cardholders and merchants statements will be expressed in Irish currency instead of sterling.

Under the Agency operated by Allied Irish Banks Barclaycard has since 1972 become the most popular credit card used in the Republic. Of an estimated 70,000 users of credit cards in the country, 60 per cent are Barclaycard users.

Considerable growth is foreseen in both the numbers of credit card users in the country and in the scope and frequency with which credit cards are used to make purchases.

### ARDMORE FARMER FINED FOR "ONE OF WORST CASES OF CRUELTY TO ANIMALS"

A County Waterford farmer was guilty of 'appalling cruelty' to 65 cattle who were found starving and in a very poor condition on two occasions last month, Youghal Court was told when Michael McGrath of Ardmore visited McGrath's farm he found a number of cattle in a hay shed all in very poor condition. He discovered more in a field which had no grass and these were in an even worse condition. In an outbuilding the Sergeant saw a heifer lying on the ground and unable to get up.

The defendant who was represented by Mr Ray Finnucane, Solr, pleaded guilty.

Supt M P Byrne prosecuting said the case highlighted one of the worst cases of cruelty to animals he had ever encountered. On March 23rd when Sergeant Fahy of Ardmore visited McGrath's farm he found a number of cattle in a hay shed all in very poor condition. He discovered more in a field which had no grass and these were in an even worse condition. In an outbuilding the Sergeant saw a heifer lying on the ground and unable to get up.

Even worse

Supt Byrne said Sgt Fahy accompanied by a veterinary surgeon again visited the defendant's farm on March 25th and the animals, sixty-five in all were in an even worse condition than on the previous visit. The vet issued certificates stating that all the animals were starving.

### JUST OUT FOR A GOOD TIME AT EUROPEAN CONFERENCES

A suggestion that Local Authority delegates were just out for a good time when they went abroad to attend International Conferences, brought a sharp denial at the last meeting of the South Eastern Regional Development Organisation in Waterford.

Mr Andy Minihan, the outspoken New Ross Harbour Board member, also alleged that Britain Germany and France etc only had two representatives present at these conferences whereas Ireland was sending thirty.

"Do we learn anything from them or is it just a jaunt?" Mr Minihan asked.

The matter arose after the Organisation decided that its chairman, Ald. Hubert Burke and the Director, Liam Murphy, should travel with the Local Authority group from the South East going to the International Housing and Planning Congress in Gothenburg Sweden from May 13th to 19th.

The Vice-Chairman Ald Tom Carlin in reply to the criticism said that Mr Minihan was very wrong if he thought that the Irish representation at conferences abroad was greater than that of other countries. Ireland had only the same number as the other countries and the minutes of any particular conference would not like anyone to think that there was no value to be gained from participating in International Conferences because there was a lot to be learned.

Both Collr Tommy Wade Dungarvan and Collr T F Byrne Wexford also stressed the value of attending conferences abroad.

Mr Minihan however maintained that the delegates going to these conferences were not

reporting back and making findings available to the other members and said that this was the point he most wanted to stress. "If they go abroad, they should come back and hand in a report on any information they obtained that might be of benefit to the rest of us," he said.

Ald Martin also disputed this and recalled that a S.E.R.D.O. group went to Scotland and very good and detailed reports had been made available.

The Giant European Parliamentary "Quiz Game"

What is the amount of tapioca imported from Taiwan? Is it true that 5 million kilos of haddock were destroyed in Germany in 1978? What is the rent of the European Court of Justice in Luxembourg per square meter?

No this isn't part of a radio quiz game but an example of questions asked by members in the European Parliament in 1978. In all more than 1,000 written questions were asked and all received a written reply from the European Commission during the current debate when the powers of the newly elected European Parliament are being discussed. This existing right is frequently over-used. The right to ask questions is one of the most important it permits the Parliament to exercise some democratic control on the Commission of the European Community.

Sometimes the Commission is virtually powerless to do anything about the questions raised. This was the case when an Italian Parliamentarian asked the Commission if it knew that Italian postal services were disrupted after mail in Italy to arrive in Luxembourg. It was also true when a member from Luxembourg drew its attention to the fact that confiscated automobiles driven by Frenchmen living in Luxembourg and bearing Luxembourg plates but travelling in France.

In both cases the Parliamentarians asked the Commission what it planned to do about these situations. Not much actually - the Commission has little influence over national administrations. But the fact of having raised the incidents in these situations is a member of Parliament recently involved egg markings.

In principle thanks to a Community regulation eggs sold in the time Community countries are required to carry a number indicating the week of the year when they were packaged to allow the customer to judge their freshness. However a German showed how through the complex regulations which spoke of a conventional beginning of a week and a tolerance of four

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# Mind and Body: Ageing

[By Dr Brendan McGann]

We know very little about the process of ageing. It is part of the lore of our culture that age is a period of decline and that only some people manage to remain productive to the end. Galileo published his dialogues on mechanics at 74 and Caesar Franck's significant compositions (his symphony, chamber music organ chorales and Grande Piece Symphonique) were produced between his 56th and 66th years. Verdi composed Falstaff in his 77th year and finally Bach wrote the Art of the Fugue possibly the most superb music ever written when he was 65 and blind.

When one adds to the foregoing the long list of continuously productive people like Russell Stravinsky, Shaw, P. Casals, the obvious question arises whether they lived long because they were productive and not the other way round.

### WHAT IS NORMAL?

Much of what we take to be normal ageing is in fact illness not the ageing process if there is such a thing. People behave as if they had a fixed store of energy which they must preserve if they are to survive. Nothing could be further from the truth. For decades both medical and popular culture have been advising people to rest and take things easy. There are very few conditions for which this is good advice at least if followed for more than a couple of days.

By raising you can make yourself quite sick within three to four days. One of the classic symptoms in old age is brittle bones. This is caused by loss of calcium, which in turn is caused by lack of activity and probably also a deficiency of Vitamin D in the diet.

### MYTHS

The myths about old age not only persist, they proliferate. There is one particularly silly one which has been going the rounds for some years now that we lose many millions of brain cells each year after the age of 20 or so. In the first place if you did lose these brain cells it would not matter very much. But the research on which this idea is based was done in the 1920s and 30s. It is based on a total of 10 cases. The brains were museum specimens and in two cases (the oldest) were those of long-stay mental hospital cases. The whole affair does not even amount to a good scientific note.

brain tissue can be regenerated in certain circumstances. **MOST IMPORTANT**

The most important thing for ageing people to do is to remain active physically and active mentally. Retirement has killed off more people than we will ever know about and is an invidious concept which should be drastically overhauled.

Isolation of older people is also bad practice. An interesting experiment in France is reversing this. In Grenoble new housing estates have flats included to cater for older people. There are no old people's clubs. Everyone uses the same ones.

When we isolate older people at progressively younger ages we also deprive ourselves and our children of a level of experience and stability which is essential to dynamic communities. It is very sad to see Trade Unions fighting for earlier retirement ages. Have they really thought about what they are doing?

### ACTIVITY ENERGISES

It is activity and movement that makes the body systems work and create the energy the body needs. The worst thing you can do is to take things easy—you will kill yourself. The Russians did one experiment in which they took a group of 60-year-olds and put them through a weekly gymnastics programme. At the end of 10 years the group were physiologically younger than they had been when they started. There are now hundreds of documented cases in America of 60-year-olds who were victims of massive coronary but who are now happily jogging ten to fifteen miles a day and fitter than they have been for thirty or forty years.

**PRACTICAL**  
The cost of looking after older people in Ireland is relatively large compared to other countries. It is also simply good economics therefore to get as many old people active again and more capable of looking after themselves. The cost of preventing the physical effects of old age is small compared to the cost of supporting those who develop them. As a culture we largely produce the syndrome of old age and then dump people when they develop it. I remember an acquaintance who opted for a job in CIE (at the age of 20) because it was pensionable. It was not so much that he got peace of mind but rather that his mind rested in peace. The greatest gift you can give an old person is to put them back to work. It is not due to chance that the suicide rate doubles at the week-end.

## FINED FOR MALICIOUS DAMAGE TO GARDA CELL

The adjourned hearing of the charges for malicious damage against James King 17, Murphy Place, Abbeyside, was resumed at Dungarvan Court before District Justice W F O'Connell on Wednesday, April 11. King was charged with causing malicious damage to a cistern closet the property of the Board of Works to the amount of £150 at Dungarvan Garda Station on January 27 and with malicious damage to the extent of £40 to the front door at Lawlor's Hotel the property of Ann Gannon and with being drunk and disorderly on the same occasion. When the charges were first dealt with at Dungarvan Court on March 14 evidence was given by Frank Ahearne doorman at the hotel on the nights of social functions who stated that when the defendant came to the hotel around midnight on January 27 he refused him admission as he opposed the motion "That it is not foolish to believe in ghosts". ship did not arise and was not material to the hearing. He had put the charges to the defendant at the outset and he did not now propose to make any alteration in the charges.

The defendant was then called and in evidence said that he was aged 23 and now worked in Dungarvan on the night of January 27 he was in some public houses in the vicinity of the town and approaching midnight he went to Lawlor's Hotel with a friend Henry Havens.

Witness said that he knocked at the hotel door and the doorman, Frank Ahearne answered. If he likes your face, witness then said, he'll let you in but if not he won't let you in. District Justice—How do you know that or how can you surmise what Mr Ahearne was thinking? Witness—I have been there before and I know. The District Justice pointed out that it was Mr Ahearne's privilege to do this. Witness then went on to say that the doorman refused to let them in. He saw Mrs Gannon in the hallway and tried to ask her to be allowed in but the doorman closed the door. The next thing the witness in the door went in. He said that it was Henry Havens who broke the glass. It was accidental as Havens just put his foot to the door and it kept it open. After the incident witness said that he remained standing outside the door for 10 or 15 minutes and then the Gardai came along. Havens had run away. One of the Gardai arrested him and he was taken to the station in the patrol car. On the way he asked why he had been arrested and said he was accused of breaking the glass. A thing he did not do.

### VERY AGGRESSIVE

Witness went on to say that at the station the Gardai were very aggressive towards him and they put their hands in his pockets and took his property. He was put in a cell around 12.45 a.m. and was not released until 10.10 a.m. the following morning. During all that time he had never been charged and when he was taken to the station he asked for a lawyer and a doctor but both requests were refused. Questioned by his Solicitor about the damage to the cistern closet witness said that it had been damage it was accidental. He admitted that he had a few drinks taken that night but denied he was drunk. He also agreed that he was very angry when he was arrested as he felt he had been wrongfully arrested and had not been charged with any offence. Asked why he did not tell the Gardai that he had broken the glass, witness replied "I'm not an informer".

Cross-examined by Supt. English, witness agreed that he would be correct to say that he had been abusive to the Gardai while in the station. He agreed that Sgt. Hayes told him the following morning you're free to go.

### NOTHING TO DO WITH IT

Henry Havens in evidence said that on the night of January 27 he met James King outside the door of Lawlor's Hotel around midnight. King knocked but they were refused admission. When the door was closed against them he stumbled against the glass and broke it. He said that James King had nothing to do with it. Witness said he went away immediately after the incident. Cross-examined by Supt. English who asked him why he did not go about his business when he was refused witness said that they wanted to get into the hotel for a few drinks. He said he was travelling on a motorcycle that night. He admitted that he had never returned to the hotel after the incident to offer to pay for the damage and agreed that he did not have a clear recollection of what happened that night.

### ELEMENT OF DOUBT

The District Justice said that according to the evidence there must be an element of doubt as to who broke the glass in the hotel door and accordingly he would dismiss this charge. In regard to the damage to the toilet bowl in the cell he felt that he could not hold the defendant responsible for the entire cost of this as it had been previously damaged. However he was satisfied that the defendant had willfully damaged the toilet and convicted him of maliciously damaging it. He also convicted him on the drunk and disorderly charge.

Asked for the defendant's record the Superintendent stated that he had been convicted among other things for robbery and manslaughter in England and had served a number of prison terms. The District Justice then imposed a fine of £20 with £50 compensation and a further £2 on the drunk and disorderly charge.

## FIRM PLAN FOR ABBEYSIDE PROMENADE MAY QUALIFY FOR GRANT

The onus was thrown back on Dungarvan Urban District Council to come up with a firm scheme for the completion of the pedestrian promenade at Abbeyside Strand when grant assistance was advocated for the project at the annual meeting of South East Tourism Ltd in Waterford. The matter was raised by former TD Mr Tom Kyne who told the thronged meeting that he would like to suggest that a grant of some sort be made available to the Urban Council to continue and finalise the extension of the promenade. He said that work on it was originally started when grants were available for such purposes from the Department of Local Government. However the work was never completed and this rendered it obsolete.

Mr Kyne said that the Dungarvan body was prepared to match any grant £ for £. Finishing the project would serve two fronts in that it would be available for tourists to walk along the seafront as well as giving a certain amount of employment in the construction stage. There was sand and gravel on the seafront that could be used for the construction and he did not think it would be too costly. He explained that the Town Engineer Mr Walsh would be more than willing to co-operate with South East Tourism. It might be too much to expect to have the full job completed in one year but they would be prepared to accept an on-going arrangement whereby it would be finished in two or three years. He asked the Organisation's Directors to consider his request. In reply Mr William Walsh, General Manager of South East Tourism said that if Mr Kyne cast his mind back to July 1976 he would recall a meeting he had with the Dungarvan representatives on the County Council and with members of the Urban Council. In 1977 as a result of this meeting Bord Fáilte provided £5,000 for this project but unfortunately there was some difficulty at official level as to how it should be spent and Dungarvan Urban Council did not come forward with a firm scheme agreeable to all concerned. He said that if this was done they would be too happy to include it in their budget for 1980.

## Call For Inheritance Tax Review By IFA Chairman

Mr Pierce Casey, County Chairman of Waterford IFA, speaking at a County Executive meeting in Dungarvan called for an immediate review of inheritance tax (Capital Acquisitions Tax) with regard to agricultural land and holdings. He explained that because the threshold for inheritance tax has never been reviewed we are now in a position where any one who is inheriting a farm from a father has to buy that farm from the State. The cost of transferring the farm has to be paid immediately at a time when a young farmer will need capital to develop his farm and at the time when he has to make a great financial commitment to a young family.

### DUTY OF GOVERNMENT

In relation to the discussions on farm taxation that are now taking place between the Government and the farming organisations Mr Casey made it clear that the IFA itself will not devise any new system of taxation for farmers. That is the duty of an elected government. The IFA will put forward the reasons why farm taxation has to be worked out in such a way that agricultural production will not be hurt and in such a way that more production and more employment will be created. Encouragement will have to be given to the intensive and hardworking farmer. Farmers accept that they have a duty to support the underprivileged sectors of the community but they also believe that the inclusion of proper incentives in the tax system is the surest way of making agriculture contribute the maximum amount possible to the welfare of our people.

### NEED FOR INCENTIVE

The absence of incentive will destroy initiative and resourcefulness said Mr Casey not only in agriculture but in all sectors of our society. The crippling tax system which is at the core of the philosophy of the modern state gives us nothing but a nation of people handicapped in mind and body. It can only be hoped that the government and all other people will see the folly of this approach and will realise that the new measures to be introduced for the self-employed and PAYE sectors need every incentive to encourage people to work hard to provide industrial peace and to give a harmonious society with all sectors working diligently together for their mutual benefit.

A fracas at Court House Road, Fermoy on May 12 following which a man had to be flown to Dublin by helicopter to have his broken jaw wired up had a sequel before District Justice K J McCourt at Dungarvan. John Druman of Duntahane, Cork Road Fermoy was charged with occasioning actual bodily harm to Michael Hogan 2, Woodview Park Tallow. Hogan told the court that he was going with a man about a football match when defendant appeared and struck him on the jaw. He went to the doctor the following day who referred him to a Waterford Hospital from where he was flown to Dublin by helicopter. Defendant in evidence told the court that he had seen Hogan and another man fighting in an effort to stop a fight he went down to them and asked them to stop. Hogan stepped back and stood on my foot so I pushed him off. He fell and hit a parked car and was unconscious for some time. Defendant said that he was employed on the door of the Top Hat Ballroom at the time. Defendant was fined £10 and ordered him to pay £106 witness expenses. Supt J T Finlay prosecuted.

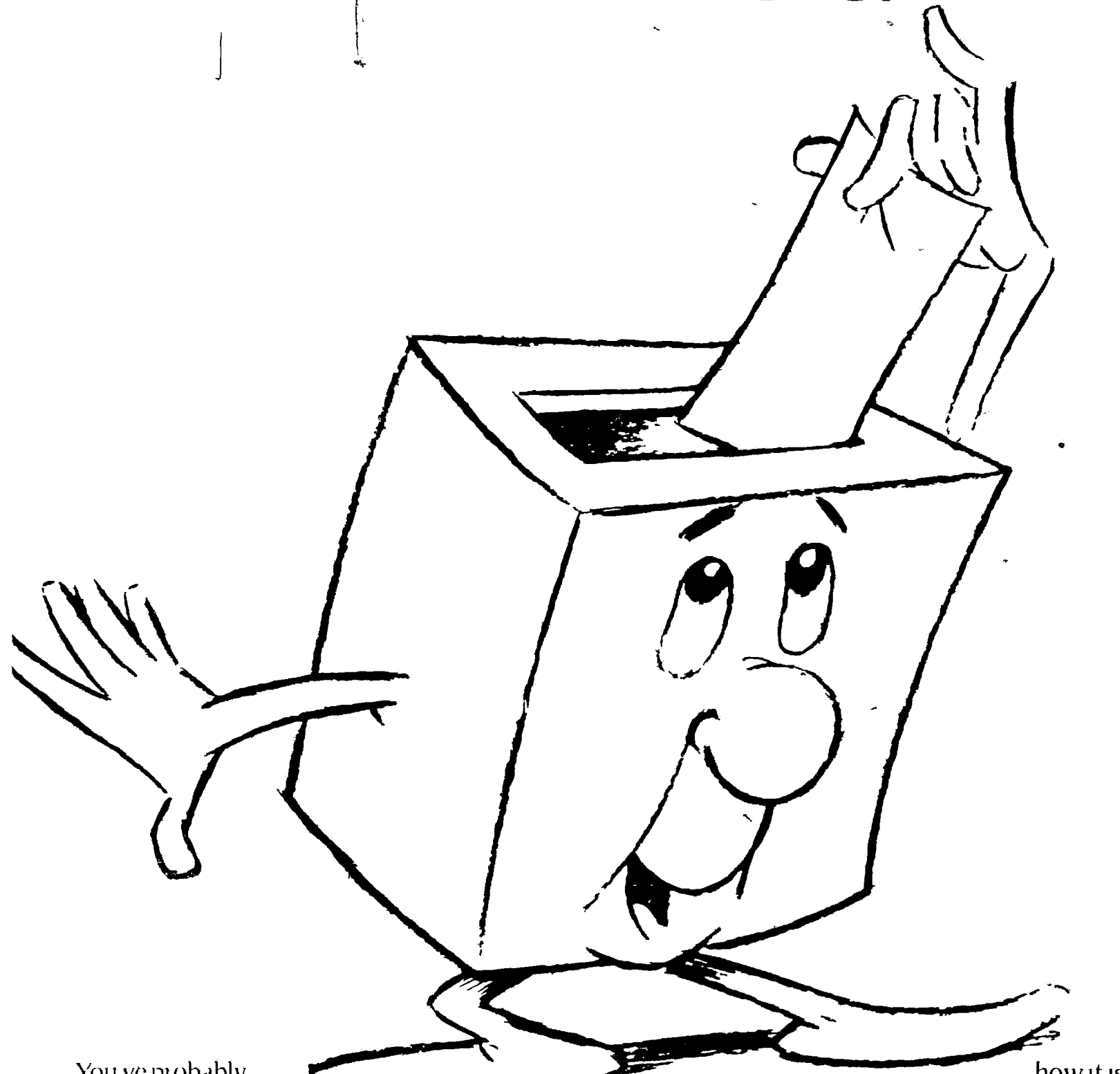
