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INDUSTRIAL PROGRESS IN WEST WATERFORD

Chances such as the industrially starved West have appeared elsewhere so often in recent years when reference is being made to some possibility of industrial development in the West Waterford area that even now I am inclined to shy away from referring to the matter at all. So many hares have been risen only to disappear over the horizon and the hopes of so many have been encouraged only to be dashed to the ground that I have become an absolute doubting Thomas where the industrial development of West Waterford is concerned.

The problem is how to sift the fact from the fiction and the truth from the rumours. Having gone so far I might as well proceed with the facts as I know them. Fact one—Waterford County Council at their meeting in Dungarvan last Friday unanimously agreed on the proposal of Clr. George Armstrong seconded by Clr. Jack Cullinane, to dispose of a site at Townparks East, Tallow to the industrial development authority fact two—the area of the site is 7 acres 3 rods and 16 perches fact three—the site was formerly part of the estate of the late John Lane and has been acquired from the Irish Land Commission, fact four—the price paid was £3,000 per acre plus legal fees.

I understand that this site is the one on which the proposed industry to be started shortly in Tallow will be located but despite inquiries which I directed to sources from which I expected to receive information I was unable to ascertain anything positive as to when the development would take place. However I was led to believe that the plans for the industry are going ahead and visual proof of this will appear in due course.

In addition to this I learned over the week end that an industry has been secured for the IDA advance factory at Cappoquin and that it is hoped (this is as far as I can put it) that work here will commence about the third week in June. The information such as it is that was passed to me was that the factory will be taken over by a firm trading under the name of "Cypass" and will be concerned with the making of plastic wind protectors for the side windows of cars. The provision of 30 jobs in this development has been mentioned.

However when I again sought some kind of confirmation about this on Tuesday from the source which I expected to have the facts I was unable to obtain anything positive. In the circumstances I pass on the information for what it is worth and in the hope (it's that word again) that there is more than a grain of truth in it.

NATIONAL ANTI-LITTER MONTH

May is to be declared National anti litter month and full details of the Bord Failte backed campaign will be announced during the coming week.

The Minister for Tourism and Transport Mr. Padraig Faulkner announced the campaign in Dublin on Monday night and said that last year he had called for "a major national push to tackle the problem and he was now happy to see that Bord Failte had responded to that call.

But to make the campaign a success a full response will be required from the general public. We are indeed far from being a litter conscious people and so far all appeals for litter clean streets and roadways have fallen on deaf ears.

A case in point was the absolute filthy condition of Dungarvan Square on Wednesday evening of last week when

the street traders who had once again "taken over" the Square throughout the day folded their temporary shops and pulled away. Having turned the Square almost into a pedestrian area, thereby causing day-long traffic chaos they moved off leaving the area litter strewn. Something will really have to be done to curb both of these unwanted activities.

Farmers too would need to be much tidier about their fertiliser spreading methods. In recent trips through the countryside I have noticed hundreds of discarded empty plastic bags stuck in hedges, rows and strewn on roads and fields, creating a most unsightly scene.

We are quick to take offence when foreigners refer to us as "the dirty Irish" but we will have to make a much greater effort if we are to give them the lie where such a description is concerned. Next month's "National anti-litter campaign" might be accepted by everyone as the start to a sustained effort which will free our towns and the countryside in general of the pollution that at present destroys so much of our national beauty.

MORE ABOUT OLD DUNGARVAN

Further historical facts about old Dungarvan which are taken from the Journal compiled by Micheal Usal O'Donnahill, Colaiste na Rinne include the following:

From Marmion's History of the Maritime Ports of Ireland 1856 "Dungarvan comprises an area of 8,499 acres of which 392 are in the town. In 1841 it contained 1,231 houses and 8,625 inhabitants. In 1851 there were only 1,070 houses and 6,965 inhabitants. A decrease of 161 houses and 1,660 persons. It sent two members to the Irish and is still represented by one in the United Parliament present representative John Francis Maguire, Esq. of Cork, the constituency in 1853 consisted of 228 rated occupiers and 75 of other qualifications—total 303.

"Its trade is not extensive, probably owing to its shallow harbour as vessels drawing more than 11 or 12 feet of water cannot come up to the quay. Its exports of grain, cattle and butter in 1835, were estimated at £69,486, and its imports which consisted of timber, coal and British manufactured goods, came to £16,312."

Then comes the following note from Smith's History written in 1756 "The Dungarvan fishery has of late much failed. About 60 or 70 years ago (c. 1690—the year of the Battle of the Boyne) the place was much frequented by a considerable number of fishing vessels, not only from many parts of this Kingdom but also from England. The fish now taken from this coast are hake, ling, cod whiting, whiting-pollack, mackerel, red gurnard, grey gurnard called by some knowledges bass mullet, bream sole dab, plaice, fluke, turbot, and sometimes the hollybird, the skate or ray, dog-fish, herrings etc. The haddock some years ago frequented this coast and were taken in great plenty but at present there are none to be seen, scarce one being taken in a year.

Writing of the Dungarvan Hake Fishery, Smith says

"Some years before (1756) six men in a boat with a hook and line could take 1,000 hake with quantities of other fish in one night but now (1756) only half that quantity could be taken. The 1,000 hake were valued at £6 and when saved were worth £12."

It would appear that the cod fishery had also declined in 1756 as larger quantities were dried and shipped from Dungarvan before that period. Dungarvan cod and ling were esteemed as well fed fish and considered better than those caught off Newfoundland. Sole and plaice found here were also considered excellent for eating and it was not uncommon to take 100 pair of large sole, with a large quantity of fluke, plaice etc at a single draught.

Smith condemned the beam-trail method of taking flat fish because first, it tore away sea-plants, moss, herring grass and other feeding for flat fish in an effort to scrape them from the bottom second, it frightened away the larger fish, third it blended up the spawn of several fish and destroyed them and fourth, mother fish by instinct, forsake the place where it found its spawn destroyed. He then demanded that the law should step in to prevent this wholesale destruction of fish. The trail nets were first introduced in 1731 and a table for the seven years export of hake before the introduction (1724-1730) showed a total of 458,648 while in the seven years from 1738 to 1744 the total had dropped to 274,410.

It is of interest to note in the context of the new fishery regulations which are currently the centre of such a deal of controversy that more than 200 years ago moves for the conservation of fish stocks in the same areas were being called for. It would seem to be obvious that the decline of the hake fishery for which Dungarvan was famous dated from that period in the mid 18th century.

Hopefully we will return to this interesting topic again next week.

Plans to deal with week-end casualties in Dungarvan. Dungarvan doctors have signified their intention to cooperate in the provision of the much advocated casualty rota system at week-ends.

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NEW ATTITUDE REQUIRED TOWARDS CARE OF ELDERLY SAYS REPORT

The 80-page report prepared by the special committee for the care of the elderly in their homes and in hospitals in the south-east region has been presented to the South-Eastern Health Board which will now consider the recommendations in the report.

In a foreword to the report the Chairman of the special committee, Dr Hugh O'Brien-Moran states that the essence of the Board are more norms but that there is an urgent need to re-deploy those resources that passively and ad hoc treatment of the elderly leads to disastrous long-term pressure on the scarcest and most expensive resource - the acute hospital bed, that a new attitude and positive approach is required to support the elderly in the community with liaison between all responsible so that a first admission to hospital does not initiate a state of physical or psychological invalidism leading to a long-stay hospital bed from which death is the only discharge.

The special committee was appointed to investigate the position in response to a motion moved by the then Board's Chairman Clr C Curran at the October 1977 meeting of the Board requesting the Community Care Committee to consider ways and means of providing voluntary organisations of improving the care of the elderly in their homes especially in isolated areas.

It was in an effort to defuse the situation that at present existed in this area, the Minister concerning the new fishery regulation Mi C Curran Chairman told members of Waterford County Council that the fishing boats in Dungarvan last Friday when he moved a motion requesting the Council to call on the Minister for Fisheries to modify the new regulations in the Iismore No 4 Fishery District.

Mr Curran said that the regulations should be changed to allow the 45 mesh depth for nets to be restored and the extension of the fishing season to August 15.

Mr P Kenneally who seconded the motion said that the new regulations meant that half the fishermen and he felt that no section of the community should be subjected to the hardship which curtailed their livelihood to this extent.

Deputy Deasy supporting the motion said that the fishermen in this part of the country felt they were being victimised because of the new regulations. Of course they are said officials of the Post Office Workers Union in an effort to resolve the dispute.

Deputy Deasy added that this poaching had not only gone on for a long time but had actually increased. The long and short of the 'nation was that it was this poaching that was causing the problem. Until this illegal fishing is stopped' he said the legal fishermen in this area will continue to be victimised and if the law is not adhered to while poaching is concerned there would be no need for the present restrictions.

Clr M Harly said that the Monday ban on fishing which was also part of the new regulations should be removed as well.

The motion was passed as was the motion seconded by Clr J Cullinane calling on the Minister to receive a deputation from the Council to discuss the entire problem.

In the event of the Minister agreeing to receive the deputation the Council agreed that it should consist of members of the Council and the members of the Oireachtas on the Council.

Members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday joined in paying tribute to the late Mr Sean Brosnan T.D. Youlghal as a fine type of a man, a footballer on the playing pitch and as a great public representative at all levels.

The formal resolution of sympathy to the late Mr Brosnan was adopted and was proposed by Mr W Kenneally T.D. and seconded by Mr A Deasy T.D. former Deputy Tom Kyne and all the other members of the Council joined in the tributes and associated themselves with the expression of sympathy.

A vote of sympathy proposed by Clr J Cullinane and seconded by Clr Kyne was also passed with the wife and family of the late Mr Michael Creagh NT Ballyduff, Kilmeaden.

COUNCIL HAS MIXED VIEWS ON POST OFFICE STRIKE

Mixed views were expressed by members of Waterford County Council at their monthly meeting in Dungarvan last Friday when Standing Orders were suspended to allow a discussion on the Post Office strike.

The Chairman Clr C Curran informed the meeting that he had received a resolution proposed by Deputy Deasy and seconded by Clr Kyne but said that before it could be discussed Standing Orders would have to be suspended. The Council unanimously agreed to follow this course.

The motion called on the Council to request the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs to enter into direct negotiations with officials of the Post Office Workers Union in an effort to resolve the dispute.

Deputy Deas said that he did not want to vote on the motion because of the dispute a great many people especially those in receipt of certain social welfare benefits are now in dire straits as the benefits to which they were entitled were not getting through to them. He said that the strike was also causing great damage to the country's tourism and otherwise as well.

ESB SAFETY-ELECTRIC FENCES Don't Let Your Electric Fence Become A Source Of Danger

It can be unsafe to erect an electric fence too close to electricity overhead power lines. If by accident an electric power line comes in contact with an electric fence the whole fence can become live at a very high voltage. This can cause serious or even fatal injury to people and livestock.

A few common sense precautions can minimise the risk of such an accident happening on your farm. Never attach an electric fence cable to an ESB pole. It must have its own supports. Don't run an electric fence parallel and very close to a power line. If your electric fence must run parallel with the power line, set it off at least 6 metres (20 ft) to one side of the line. If the electric fence must cross the route of a power line, run it on its own supports, so it crosses the line at right angles 1.2 metres (3 feet) out from an ESB pole.

Cllr C Curran Chairman said that in view of the County Manager's statement that the matter was concerned with the Council's Planting Dept. he added that Cllr Cahill had been gracious in subsequently withdrawing the allegation and in apologising for what he had said.
