TRAFFIC HAZARDS

The Causeway Bridge at
Abbeyside was again one of
the items discussed at last
Monday night's monthly
meeting of Dungarvan Urban
Council and the members
generally agreed that the
bridge and its approaches con-
stitute a major traffic hazard
at one of the principal entries
to the town.

Some years back when plans
were well advanced to replace
the bridge by an open parapet,
"straight" structure, strong
opposition was raised to the
removal of the bridge "on
aesthetic grounds" as it was
one of the most beautiful
single arch bridges in the
country. Mainly because
agreement could not be reach-
ed on this point and partly
because of other reasons the
plans were dropped.

While we always agreed
that the bridge was a thing
of beauty we have advocated
from the beginning in this
column that it is no longer
capable of coping with the
volume and extent of the traf-
fic which passes over it en-
tering and leaving the town.
It has become a nightmare
for pedestrians who have to
negotiate it while it consti-
tutes a major traffic hazard
for motorists attempting to
pass through the junction on
the town side.

Because it creates an al-
most total blockage of vision
due to its hump back and
solid stone parapet motorists
driving from the quay towards
Abbeyside are constantly at
risk and as one member of
the Urban Council put it at
last Monday night's meeting,
motorists who have to do this
have to take their lives in
their hands. Of course part of
this hazard is caused by
speeding motorists shooting
in across the Causeway at
speeds much greater than
those legally permitted.

I pass along the Causeway
several times each day and it
is nothing new while driving
at 30 m.p.h. to see cars
sweeping past as if I was not
moving at all. There is a
great tendency among certain
motorists to totally ignore the
speed limit signs and indeed
traffic signs generally within
the urban area. These people
are not only a danger to them-
selves but to all other road
users as well and this particu-
larly includes pedestrians
who experience great diffi-
culty at certain points to even
cross the roads from one side
to another.

The Urban Council has now
referred the matter once more
to the County Engineer with
a request that an "island" or
some system of clear traffic
markings which might reduce
the dangers on the town side
of the bridge be put into op-
eration.

However there can be no
doubt but that solutions of
this type can only be seen
as short term and that in the
long run the ring road with
a new bridge further up the
Colligan estuary or a replace-
ment of the existing bridge
by an open flat structure is
the only way to deal with the
problem.

OLD DUNGARVAN

The extent of the hake and
ling fishery on the Nymph
Bank of Dungarvan more
than 200 years ago is referred

the Nymph Bank by a Mr
Doyle who sailed on board the
Nymph a boat of about 12
tons on July 15 1736 is in-

of the boat with other fish.

the first that he soon deter-
mined to take another voyage
in order to make observations
in different places, as well
westward and southward of
the first station. For this pur-

ed markings which would help
to control traffic negotiating

island on the town side of
the bridge would be a help. He

the quay and you want to go
on to Abbeyside the way the
traffic comes shooting over the
bridge.

It was agreed to ask the
County Engineer to put down
traffic lines at the junction to
help in the control of traffic

Circuit Judge Adjudicates Detention Appeal

PROMENADE AT ABBEYSIDE STRAND

The ambitious promenade at Abbeyside which was being built on the 'hire purchase' system through the old winter relief scheme grants and which had to be abandoned several years ago when these grants were discontinued was referred to at the monthly meeting of Dungan Urban Council last Monday night
