## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### IT'S A FACT FOR CAPPOQUIN

Our exclusive reference in this column a couple of weeks back about an industry for Cappoquin has now become a fact of life and this was confirmed by the IDA at a reception held in Dungarvan last night (Wednesday) when full details of the new industry for the town were announced. At the time of writing this I am not in full possession of the facts but if they become available in time before we go to press, readers will at least get the relevant details elsewhere on this page.

In common with the people of Cappoquin and district we welcome this announcement and congratulate all concerned in securing the factory for the Comerstone town.

### LATE MARTIN POWER

Elsewhere in this issue we carry news of the unexpected death of Mr. Martin Power, which occurred while he was indulging his greatest hobby since he retired from sailing the high seas, gardening at his home in O'Connell Street, Dungarvan.

The name of Martin Power of Dungarvan was a familiar one to sailors and especially to those who served on the vessels of Irish Shipping Ltd. during and after the Second World War.

In the long and eventful seagoing career of Martin Power undoubtedly the most memorable and dramatic experience took place at the very beginning of the War which broke out on September 3 1939. This was when his vessel the "Royal Scaptra" was sunk by enemy action some 300 miles west of distant Island. This happened on September 5, 1939, less than one week after the commencement of the war. It can be seen from the following letter sent to Mr. Power's wife in Dungarvan by the owners of the "Royal Scaptra" that the crew of the vessel had been given up for lost. Dated September 25, 1939 from Hall Brothers Steamship Company, Newcastle-on-Tyne, it stated:

"Dear Madam, You will no doubt have heard the official announcement relating to the personnel on board the ss "Royal Scaptra," by the Board of Admiralty on Saturday night. We feel that this would come as a great shock to you as indeed it did to all of us here. We fear we must reluctantly face the position that all of your enquiries have failed to establish any news of survivors having been picked up by other steamers.

"In these circumstances we wish to tender to you our sincere condolence in what we know must be a very severe blow to you.

However the worst fears expressed in the letter did not come to pass and some weeks later word was received that the "Royal Scaptra" crew had in fact been picked up near Madeira by the British freighter "Browning". The vessel which had sunk the "Royal Scaptra" and her master was told to search for lifeboats from the sunken ship. The "Browning" kept radio silence until she arrived in Bahia on September 26 1939 and it was only then that news of the rescue of the "Royal Scaptra" crew was made known.

Martin was again involved in war action in 1941 when on March 26 as a crew member of the locally owned "Lady Belle" on a voyage from Dungarvan to Cardiff they were attacked by a German plane

but although the vessel was badly damaged there was no loss of life.

As a boy and young man, the late Martin Power served on sailing ships which made Dungarvan and its seamen famous in many ports. These included the "Harvey," the "Catherine Ellen," the "Par-ton" and the "Maggie West". His association with Irish Shipping began in July 1943 when he signed on the "Irish Ash" and continued until July 1949. He also served on the "Irish Spruce" and the "Irish Larch" under fellow townsmen, Captain Tom Donoghue and Captain Dev Foley until April 1965. Martin continued his seagoing career on a number of British freighters and tankers when he retired to his native Dungarvan and in the words of Tom McHugh, Principal Garrahan National School to whom I am indebted for the foregoing "Martin Power and the men of his time served their country and their company well."

### HOW IRISH FISHING INDUSTRY DECLINED

In recent weeks we have been dealing in this column with extracts from the Journal of Micheal Uas O'Donnahill, Colaiste na Rinne with particular reference to old Dungarvan and the importance of the fishing industry to the town and how it declined in the year following the great famine of 1847-48.

Just in order to tie up any loose threads in this regard we will return to this aspect of activity in the Old Boro' in those years just one more time.

Marmion the historian who showed a deep interest in the social and business activities of the people in the middle years of the 19th century, writing in 1856 about what he described as all but the extinction of the Irish sea fisheries claimed that the causes which produced such a result had to be sought otherwise than in the drain made by emigration or supplying men for the (British) navy.

He then goes on: "The cause is to be found in the numerous Acts of Parliament which have been passed since the reign of Charles I to encourage the fisheries of Great Britain and cripple as much as possible those of Ireland, these may be stippled legion and many have been the pretexts used for their enactment. Sometimes it was the protection of the Irish timber plantations and at other times the protection of the salmon fisheries."

"As far back as 1777," Marmion states, "an Act was passed which in itself was sufficient to annihilate the Irish sea fisheries it prohibited the tanning of nets and lines for fishing purposes with bark and rendered compulsory the smearing of them with tar and oil, the colour and smell of which frightened away the fish and contributed to the decay of the nets while the English fisherman was allowed to tan his nets with oil-bark which preserved them from 10 to 12 seasons. The greatest enemy to the Irish fisheries could not have devised a happier scheme than this to extinguish them."

"In 1842 an Act was passed to increase the size of the meshes of the Irish fishing net to 3 1/2 inches from knot to knot and that even these nets which the subsequent Acts of Victoria admitted were too large and permitted the escape of a great quantity of valuable fish and reduced the meshes to 2 1/2

inches, were not allowed to be shot during the day-time under excessive penalties. The bounties granted by the legislature in 1764 and subsequently in 1819 were withdrawn in 1830 and the Commissioners of Public Works now enforced with vigour the payment of loans made to poor fishermen which drove many of them, and their securities to America.

"While the (British) government was acting so in this part of Ireland, it gave £14,000 a year to encourage the fisheries of Great Britain, £500 of which was granted annually to poor fishermen to repair their boats, nets, etc., and during the five years of recent famine they received £2,500 for such purposes, while the Irish fishermen, instead of receiving assistance and support from the Board in this period of dread calamity were actually obliged to pay £260 in fines and a forfeiture of their gear for fishing for herrings in the day time or using trammel or trawl nets at the entrance of bays or rivers. The consequence of this partial legislation and official mismanagement has been to deprive the Irish ports of that remnant of their deep sea fishing which two centuries ago had been so successful that it was only second in importance to the Dutch fisheries.

"It has now centred itself in Great Britain and particularly in Scotland where, in the season 1809 the total quantity of herrings cured was only 90,185 barrels but which in 1849 increased to 770,698 barrels and Ireland which formerly even exported its herrings to Holland, has for the thirty years commencing in 1820 and ending in 1849 imported from Great Britain 3,560,144 barrels, which at a moderate price amounts to considerably over £5,000,000 while the rest of Europe has only taken from that country 1,267,046 barrels."

The foregoing extracts clearly show how the Irish fishing industry was all but stamped out by penal enactment by the British Government in those times and explain the present low place in European ratings of Irish fishing. In this context it must be remembered that a hundred years is a comparatively short period.

## CALL TO REMOVE CONTROVERSIAL 2% LEVY

The Fianna Fail controlled County Waterford Committee of Agriculture has castigated the Government's introduction of the controversial 2% levy and has unanimously called for its immediate removal.

Mr P. Croft (Ind) told this week's meeting in Dungarvan that the farming community had been singled out from all other sections and that there would be no development of agriculture if the Government persisted with this grossly unfair 2% levy.

"There is no justification whatever for the levy which could set agriculture back thirty or forty years," Mr Croft went on. "Already the PAYE sector was being taxed out of existence and now the Government wanted to place the farming community in the very same position. The Fianna Fail Government had been elected two years ago on the votes of the farming community but it was now clear that the Government got those votes under false pretences."

Supporting Mr Croft Mr M. Harty (FG) said the farmers of County Waterford were already paying over £5 million a year in rates and now they were being further harassed by the Government.

Mr M. Quelly (FG) said he still believed the levy would not go ahead. "I don't believe any government would be stupid enough to press ahead with a taxation system that would leave the farming community bankrupt," he said. He added that he believed a land tax would be acceptable to the vast majority of farmers.

Mr J. Cullinane (FF) said every farmer should be made keep accounts and he should estimate what he would be able to pay. "It is a simple but very fair system," Mr Cullinane added.

### LET FARMERS DOWN

Mr P. Wall (FF) said the farming organisations had had ample time in which to come up with their ideas of a fair farming tax but they had failed. He believed they had not heard the end of the farmer taxation question at all and was convinced that by the end of this year an equitable taxation system would have been formulated. The present Government has never left down the Irish farmer and never will, Mr Wall added.

The Chairman Mr K. O'Ryan said the PAYE sector would likely turn down a 15% pay increase this year but farmers were being told they need not expect any increase in 1979.

## First New Zealand Company to set up in Ireland

Cyprus Industries (NZ) Ltd a New Zealand Company is to establish a plant in the IDA advance factory at Cappoquin. The company which was recently approved for grant aid under the IDA's Small Industries Programme will manufacture washers. It is expected that 30 persons will be employed within 3 years.

Cyprus Industries (NZ) Ltd which was founded in 1964 is the first New Zealand Company to establish a manufacturing plant in Ireland. The present

owner Mr Keith Millar acquired a 50% interest in the company 7 years ago and since then has expanded its operations. Increasing demand for the company's products in Europe has led to the decision to create a plant in Ireland to cater for this expanding market.

Washers which are fitted to the slot windows of cars are used to let in the air while keeping out wind and rain. The entire production of the Irish factory will be exported to Europe and sold to car manufac-

turers including Renault Peugeot Volvo and Citroen.

A major selling point in attracting additional industry to locate in West Waterford. This company will give much needed employment to the area which has been mainly dependent on the food and agricultural based industries and the new technology involved in this manufacturing operation will lead to better diversification of skills in the locality.

Mr John Stephenson Manager of the IDA's company has already taken up residence in the area.

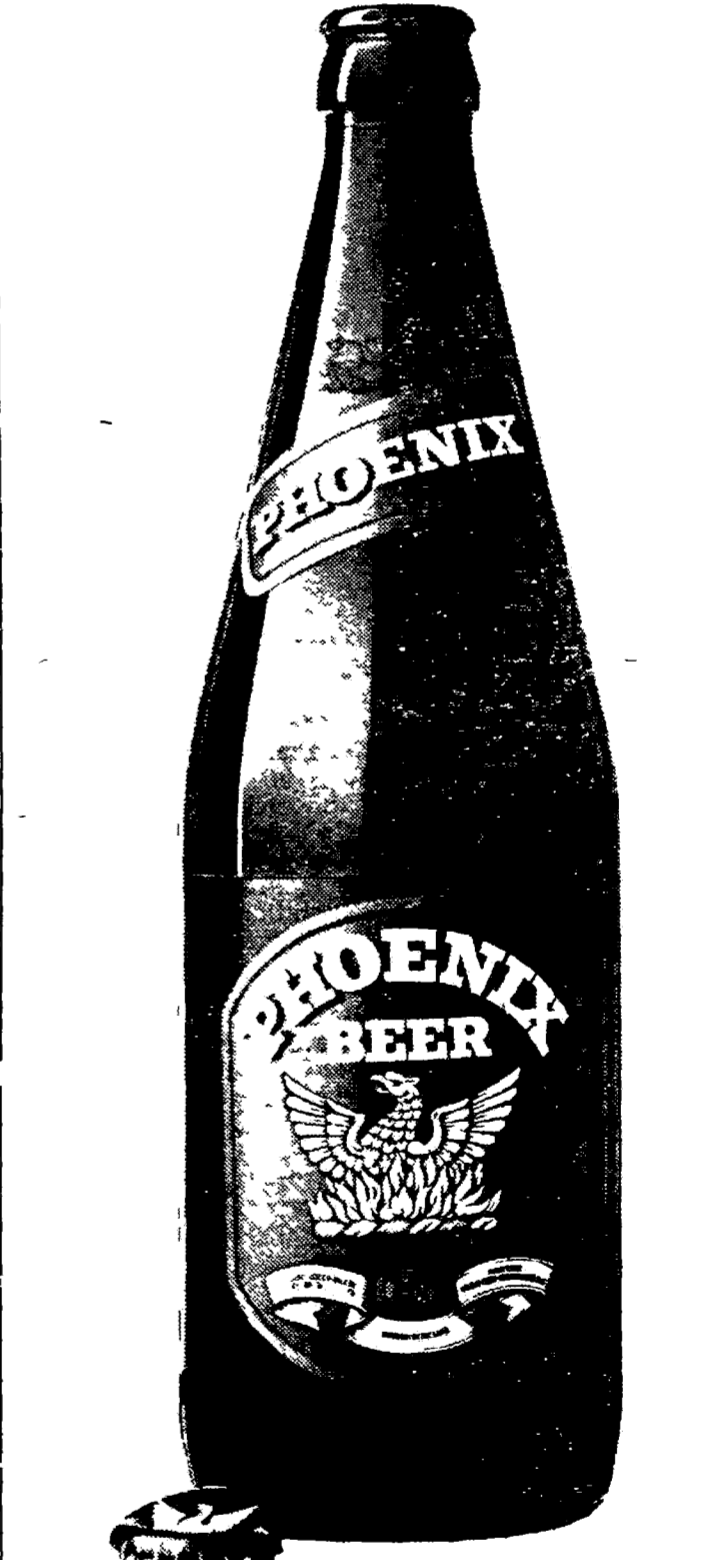
**Caravan Dweller Contravenes Car Park Bye Laws**

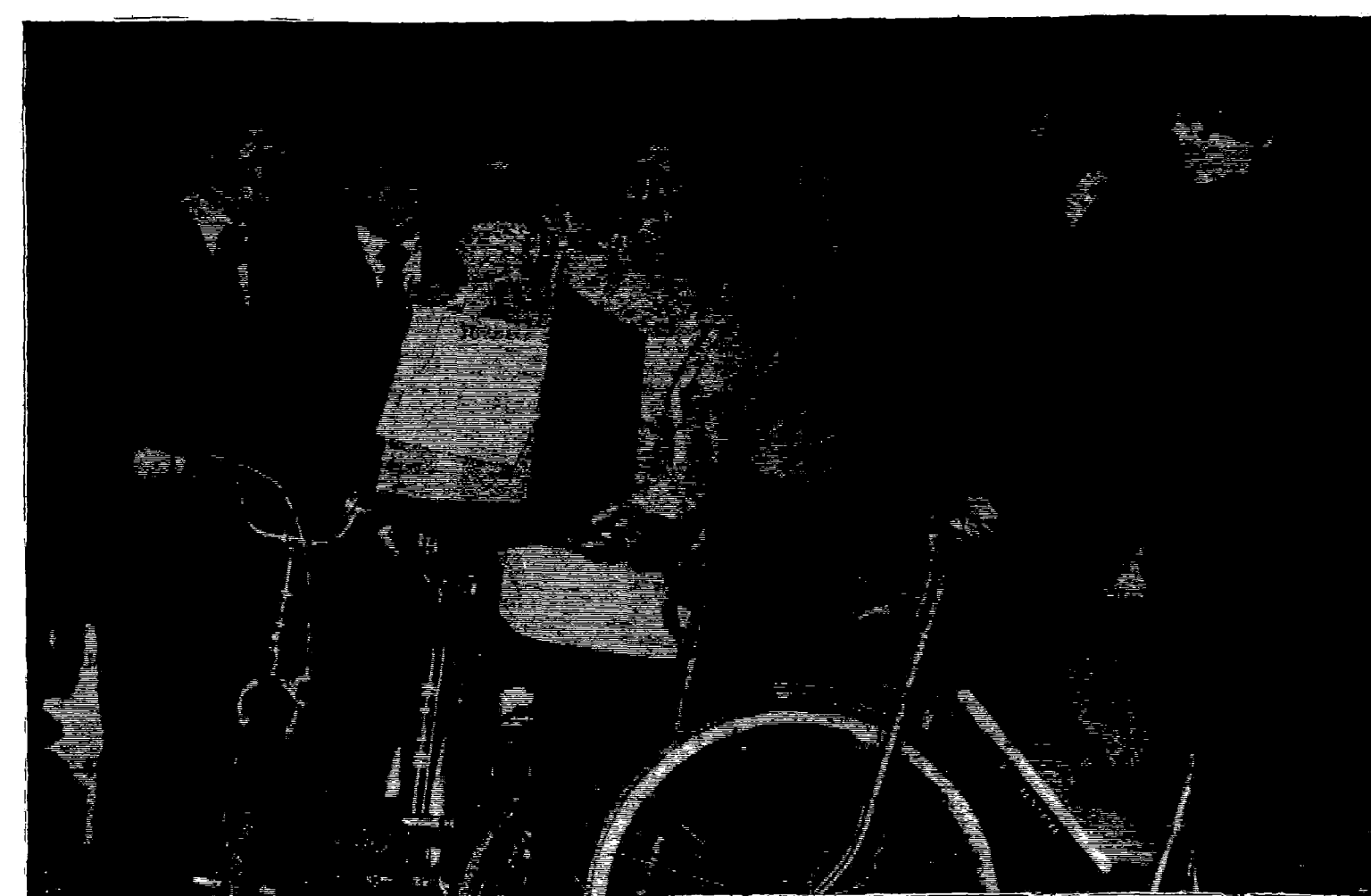

## OIL PRICES SLAMMED BY AGRICULTURAL COMMITTEE

Diesel oil is now freely available in County Waterford at 76 pence a gallon. Mr S Whelan told this week's meeting of the County Committee of Agriculture in Dungarvan when it was decided to urge the Minister for Industry Commerce and Energy O'Malley to ensure that adequate supplies were made available for agricultural purposes.

Mr Whelan said it was nothing short of disgraceful that people should charge almost twice the normal price for oil. Unfortunately they have us over a barrel and if we want oil then we must be prepared to pay an outrageous price for it, he said.

The Chairman Mr K O'Ryan said he had paid 70 pence a gallon for oil which was down-bought on to the Minister. In that way it would be stamped out, he said.  
Mr J Quirk said anyone paying 70 pence a gallon for oil should demand a receipt and that in turn should be passed on to the Minister. In that way it would be stamped out, he said.

If he had proof that people had been charged 70 pence a gallon for diesel he would raise the matter in the Dail and have it exposed. 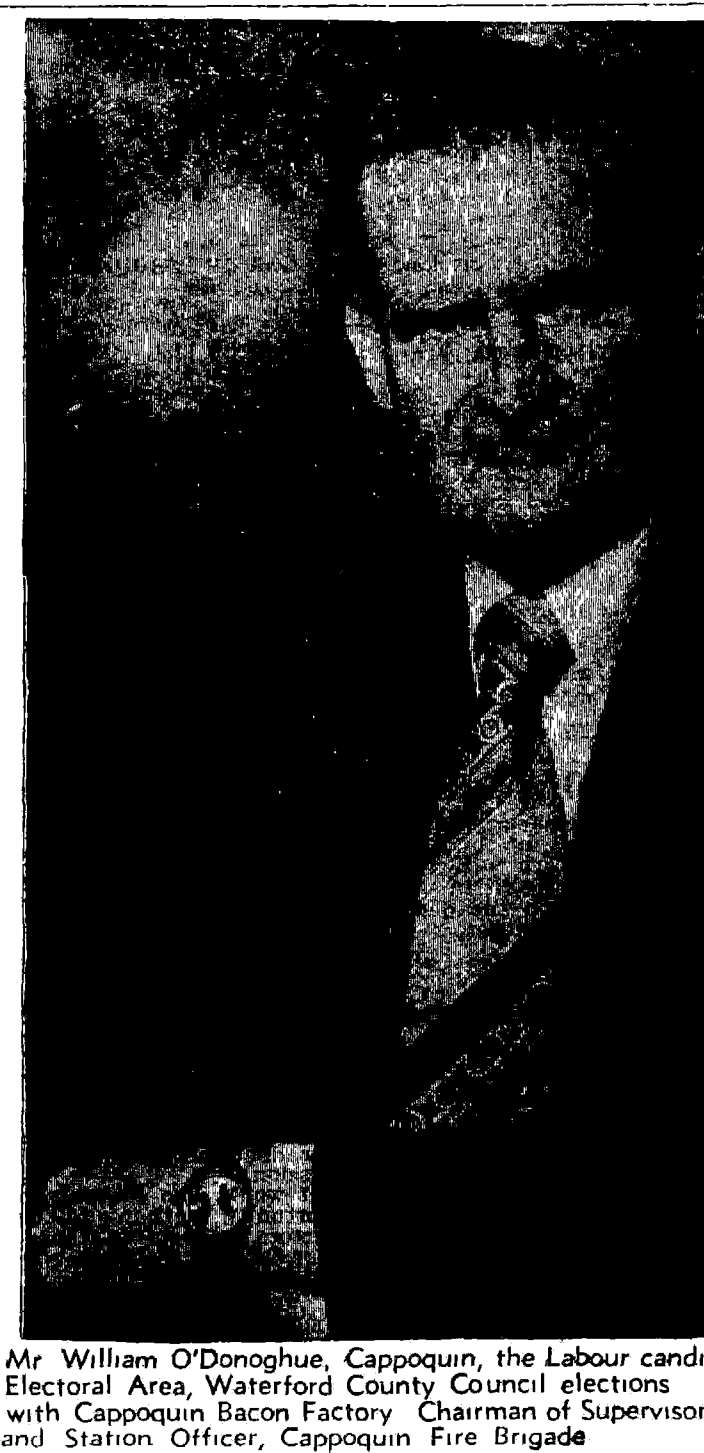
