## PENSMAN TAKES YOU behind the SPOTLIGHT

### CONFUSION FRUSTRATION AND FEAR

Despite assurances by the government that 95 per cent of last year's petrol requirements were available the counter-claim by the Irish Petrol Retailers Association that the current shortfall amounts to as much as 20 per cent has left the general motoring public in a state of confusion. Wherever the truth lies the fact of the matter is that there is a great scarcity and the proof of this is the long queues that build up at filling stations in any area whenever word goes out that some supplies are available.

Over the week-end, the Taoiseach, Mr Lynch, admitted that the situation was serious but said that it had been exacerbated by what he described as "the usual reaction of motorists". While there have been widespread complaints of greedy motorists topping up their tanks, a great bulk of ordinary motorists in genuine need are also caught up in the panic situation and find themselves compelled to spend precious time in queues waiting for the few gallons which will enable them to go about their ordinary business.

Something must be done if it has not already been done, to cut these "topping-up" motorists from the queues. I am aware of one situation where during the past week a motorist in a queue could not take even a single pound's worth before his tank was full. There have been other such cases also and from the observations I have made of the situations the people involved in this kind of activity are those with plenty of time on their hands who can afford to wait for hours if needs be. It gives the hard-pressed working man with not much time to spare very little chance of ever getting near a pump.

The frustration which all this waiting and hunting around creates is most unfair and even if it is caused by fear of being left high and dry or whatever, it is not just good enough for the government to sit idly by and let it to the public and the petrol retailers to sort out the problem. In situations such as this the reaction of the public is generally one of selfish self-interest. This reaction was highlighted in a Confirmation address by the Coadjutor Bishop of Cork and Ross last week when he said that even though there is a growing abundance of knowledge in society today there is still an acute scarcity of wisdom. Most Rev Dr Murphy said that our increased knowledge can cause enormous problems and our failure to recognise the fact that we must learn to once again love our neighbour as ourselves and to recognise our own worth and accept our limitations and frustrations is one of the root causes of the present discontent that is so evident at all levels of our society.

However despite the wise observations of his lordship the name of the game for most people is survival and when people are not prepared or inclined to practice self-discipline then the only solution is to impose restrictions which will ensure that chaos does not rule and that everyone will get a fair share of the resources that are available.

P.S. — While writing the above on Tuesday Mr Des O'Malley Minister for Industry Commerce and Energy has taken action in an effort to break the petrol queues by fixing the minimum purchase of petrol for large cars at £5 and for cars with tanks of a capacity of 3 x gallons or less at £4. He has also fixed a general speed limit of 55 mph for all cars as a conservation measure.

The Minister's action is to be welcomed but it can be judged only in light of its efficiency. If it succeeds in

### THE LOCAL ELECTIONS

Nominations for the Local Elections which will take place on June 7 closed last week-end and in Dungarvan seven candidates have entered the contest for the 9-seat Urban Council. Fianna Fail have nominated six candidates, Fine Gael have five, Labour have four while the Socialist Labour Party have one and there is one independent. Details of the various candidates and their party affiliations are published elsewhere in this issue in an official notice of poll.

A big surprise was the almost last minute withdrawal from the Urban election by former Labour Deputy Tom Kyne who had been nominated earlier at a Labour Party selection convention for re-election. Tom has been a member of the Urban Council since 1942 the year which marked his entry to public life which eventually saw him become a member of Waterford County Council and the first Labour Deputy for the Constituency for many years a position he held, with a brief break, until he announced his retirement from that level of politics at the dissolution of the last Dail. He had been Chairman of the Urban Council for 19 years.

When I asked him about his decision to withdraw from the Urban election during the week he told me that he had done so after discussing the position with Labour Party Leader Frank Cluskey who was in Dungarvan last week and with the consent of his Party Executive and I gathered that Tom's main reason for pulling out of the Urban election was aimed at affording his son Billy a newcomer in the Labour Party who is standing for the first time a more solid opportunity of election. Without doubt there will be a big disappointment among a big number of people in the Urban at Tom's decision to stand down as, irrespective of politics he has been one of the outstanding members of the Urban Council since he first became a member almost 40 years ago. However his supporters will have the consolation of knowing that he will be contesting the County Council election in the Dungarvan electoral area where he should be well able to retain his seat.

The Urban nominations also cleared up other rumours which have been circulating in the area for several weeks past. The original team of six selected by Fianna Fail included the five sitting members of the Council of which Cllr John A. Murphy was one. Subsequently Cllr Murphy's name was dropped from the Fianna Fail panel and a substitute in the person of Angela Creedon was nominated to replace him.

Following this decision Cllr Murphy expressed the view that he could possibly stand on an independent ticket and he kept an open mind on this issue but when nominations closed on Saturday he had not entered the list so that has now put an end to the rumours of the preceding weeks.

The last Council was dominated by Fianna Fail who had five elected members with Fine Gael and Labour having two each making up the nine-member Council. It is quite on the cards that after June 7 there could well be a change in the party representation. One thing however is quite certain two of the outgoing members will be absentees when the Council meets again.

### A REQUEST TO POLITICAL PARTIES

Now that activity for the forthcoming Local and Euro elections will be gaining

momentum in the coming weeks a rash of posters and election literature will break out at every possible vantage point. Telegraph and ESB poles are prime targets for these purposes but I would ask all the political parties to ensure that they place their posters in a manner which will enable their easy removal from the scene once the elections are over.

### GARRETT'S WHIRLWIND TOUR OF WATERFORD

The ebullient and charismatic leader of the Fine Gael Party Mr Garrett Fitzgerald made a whirlwind tour of the Waterford Constituency on Tuesday to launch the Party's Euro election campaign in the constituency.

He was accompanied by three of the Party's four Euro candidates for the Munster Constituency Alan Dukes Jim O'Keefe and John Blair. The fourth candidate Tom O'Donnell was absent as he had been detained in Dublin on Dail business.

Meetings were held in a number of West Waterford venues during the evening rally a major rally in Dungarvan where the Party Leader was played from one of the local hotels where he had stopped for a meal on the Square by the Pipe Band where the meeting took place.

Mr Fitzgerald who was intro-

duced by local Deputy Austin Deasy who incidentally presided at the meeting spoke impressively about Fine Gael's plans for Europe and the role it would play as members of the powerful Christian Democrats group in the Euro-parliament.

As his speech was unscripted (something we did not become aware of until it was too late) we are not able to afford it full coverage.

Points from the speech were that Fine Gael had the best team to send to Europe as their association with the Christian Democrats would make them an influential power.

As Fianna Fail were aligned only with a very small group a vote for them or indeed for any independent candidate would be wasted.

Of the four Party candidates for Munster it was recommended that the Waterford Constituency should adopt Alan Dukes although in introducing the others Deputy Deasy reminded the crowd that both Jim O'Keefe and John Blair had family associations with Dungarvan — Mr O'Keefe being married to a grand-daughter of Mr and Mrs Jar Condon Abbeyside and Mr Blair being married to a daughter of Mr Jim Wyse former Manager National Bank Dungarvan.

Before the meeting concluded Garrett Fitzgerald was given an ovation by the crowd as he was whisked away in his special tour bus to Youghal and Middleton where he addressed further meetings.

On the platform at the Dungarvan meeting were the Fine Gael candidates for the Local Elections for Dungarvan Urban Council (Dungarvan area) and each was introduced individually to the crowd.

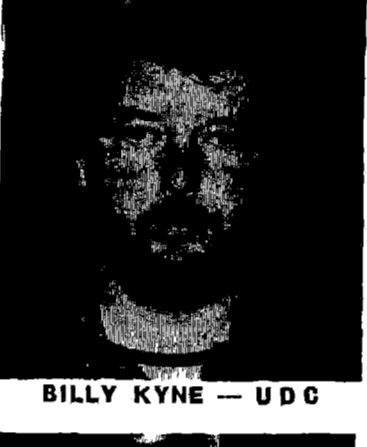

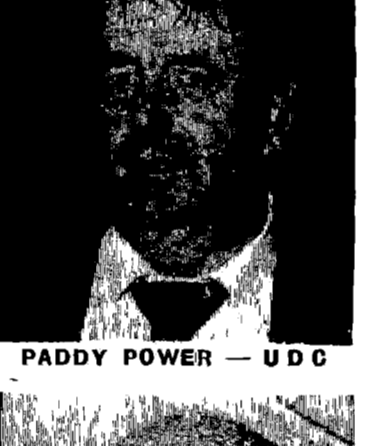

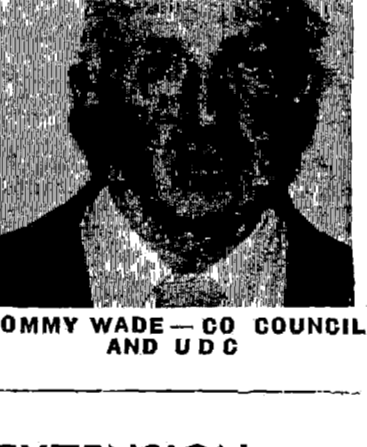

# NO JUSTIFICATION FOR "VICIOUS ASSAULT"

In a fracas outside an Old Parish license premises on Christmas Eve night last a man was kicked into unconsciousness and his knee cap broken in two places and had to spend four weeks in hospital.

Matthew Whelan Ballinamona Old Parish Dungarvan Michael Power Moonfoun Old Parish Nicholas Veale Rathles Old Parish and Martin O'Donnell Loskeran Old Parish were all charged with unlawfully assaulting Patrick Lally. Lally was actually badly maimed.

Lally was charged with common assault on Veale on the same occasion and with causing malicious damage to a window in the licensed premises of John Paul Walsh.

Patrick Lally told the court that when he left Walsh's pub around 11.30 that night he was approached by Michael Power and asked him for a drive home as he (witness) was fairly drunk.

Power struck me a belt of a fist in the face and in the struggle we fell to the ground. Lally went on Whelan and O'Donnell then closed in on me and the three of them kicked me from every angle until I went into unconsciousness.

Lally said he was very seriously injured. His face was badly bruised, his knee cap was smashed in two places and he spent four weeks in Ardkreen hospital.

Cross-examined by Mr E P King Solr for Veale Whelan and O'Donnell Lally agreed that he had been making a bit of a nuisance of himself in the pub earlier that night and had been involved in another assault in the pub. He also agreed that he had been put out of the premises and when outside broke a window.

Andrew Lally (17) a brother of the previous witness said he arrived at the pub and saw Whelan, Power and O'Donnell kicking a man on the ground when they left witness saw that it was his brother Patrick who had been beaten and kicked and he was virtually unconscious at the time. He then saw Veale come out of the pub and kick his brother in the stomach.

Mrs Mary Foley Old Parish said she saw Power and Lally scuffling outside the pub and also saw Lally break the window. Lally's evidence however about Whelan and O'Donnell kicking him was all lies. Replying to Mr Joe Curran

Solr for Power witness said she saw Power give Lally a slap in the face. She also saw Veale give Lally a tap of a shoe.

When Justice O'Connell refused Mr King's application for a direction in the cases of Whelan and O'Donnell both defendants gave evidence and denied ever assaulting Lally that night. They stated that they had seen Power strike Lally.

Nicholas Veale in evidence admitted giving Lally a slight kick when he was on the ground.

Michael Power said when he left the pub he saw Lally with his face covered by a man and he was holding up one leg as though he had been kicked. Lally threatened to smash his face in the face and he (Power) pushed him and he fell against the wall. He denied striking him in the face or kicking him and while he accepted someone had badly injured Lally, it was not witness. The injuries had been caused when I came out of the pub he added.

Justice O'Connell said that whatever provocation Lally may have been guilty of that night there could be no justification for the vicious assault made on him.

The Justice dismissed the charge against Whelan and O'Donnell but convicted Power and Veale and fined them both £20 with £3.50 expenses each.

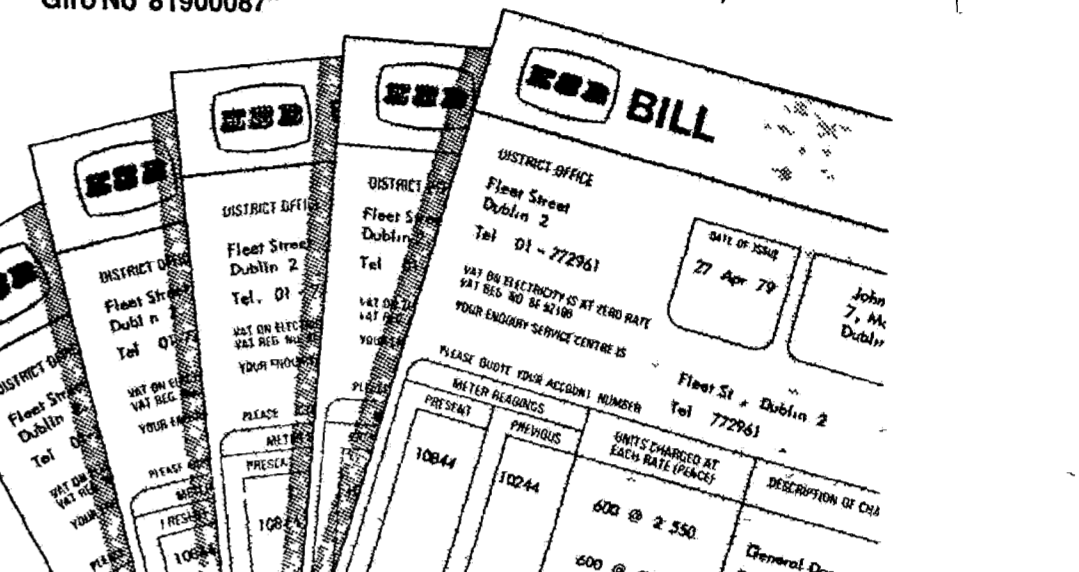

1978 Ireland's first ever International Music Camp for young people (12-17 age bracket) will be held during the months of July and August, 1979, at Mogeely near Castlemartyr. A total of 128 young people, some of whom will be coming from England, France and Germany, will be taking part in this unique educational holiday. An 18th Century Georgian House near the country village of Mogeely will act as the base for the Camp which will be run in weekly sessions.

A very varied range of activities are planned for each week: a session from music tuition in a range of instruments including piano, guitar, clarinet, saxophone, oboe, tuba, etc., to orienteering, hikes, sports, visits to the seaside, dances and workshops on poetry, drama and film-making.

The Camp will be open to 16 people at the one time: eight males and eight females. Five adults will run the Camp including two music teachers, a Bean an t'Fla, a nurse and a Sociologist. The venture is completely non-profit making and is a totally new concept in educational holidays for young people.

Many teachers and parents both in Ireland and abroad have shown great interest in this new idea. Educational holiday and despite the postal difficulties it is almost completely booked out.
