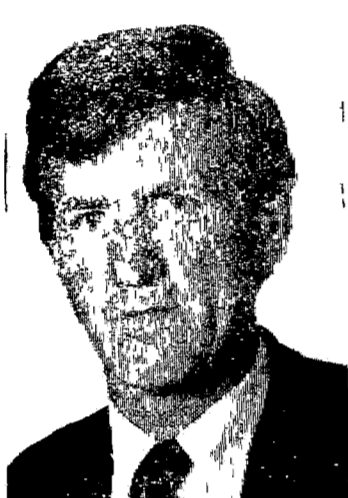

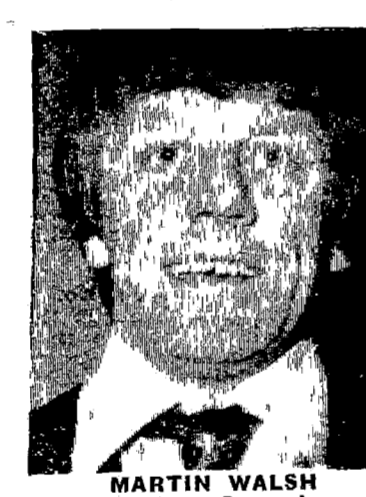

Minister's anti-litter appeal at opening of new housing scheme

Mr P Whelan, Chairman Dungarvan Urban Council joined with the Minister for the Environment Mr Sylvester Barrett in appealing to the tenants of the Council's new housing scheme at Brynneville at Shandon, Dungarvan to make every effort to maintain the high standard in which the scheme had been handed over to them.

The appeal came as the Minister performed the official opening of the new 34-house £400,000 scheme on last Friday evening Mr Whelan, Chairman of the Council presided at the opening which was attended by many of the tenants of the new houses and welcomed the Minister to Dungarvan.

Following the ecumenical blessing of the scheme performed by Venerable Archdeacon Cassidy P.P. VF Dunry, the Minister, C Warren Rector Stradbally, the Minister cut the symbolic tape and declared the scheme officially opened.

HOUSING RECORD

The Minister referred earlier 'said the Minister to the pride of Dungarvan citizens and expatriates in their town. They should be proud too of the housing record of their Council. To date the Council has provided 131 dwellings they are building 13 dwellings for old persons and plan to provide up to 40 houses in 1980.

"The Linney" to be Preserved

For those readers who may not be aware of the fact "The Linney" is a small narrow leanto open shelter at the Quay in Dungarvan. In the past it was used by old people to sit there on summer days and have a chat. In later years it has become derelict and a haven for "winos" and is now almost a blocked off area since it has become the practice to store tons and tons of bagged artificial manure in the open space in front of it.

However it has a sentimental association with old Dungarvan and the days when the Old Boro was noted for its sailing ships and sailing men. It was this old tradition that prompted Cllr D. Goode to move a motion at the April meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council that the Council approve the necessary expenditure for the re-roofing of "The Linney". Members expressed divided views as to what should be done and when the Town Engineer submitted an estimate of £425 for the re-pair and re-roofing of shelter it was agreed to defer a decision until the May meeting. The engineer suggested that instead of repairing it that it should be incorporated into the Council's adjoining turf yard.

This was held last Monday night and before the matter came up for discussion a deputation from the Dockers Section of the local branch of the A.T. & G.W.U. were received to put their views on the matter before the Council.

The Union deputation consisted of Mr. T. Mansfield District Officer, Mr. J. Byrne, Chairman and Mr. J. Havens Dock Steward.

Mr. Mansfield said that they had been asked by their members to request the Council to refurbish and retain the Linney. He pointed out that dockers working at the quay had no place to shelter in adverse weather except the Linney and for this reason it was essential that it be retained and maintained. On behalf of the Union he thanked the Council for all the work they had carried out in

repairing the quay and pointed out that as a result 30 boats had come into Dungarvan since last September which was big business for the town.

Mr. Byrne said that as far as they were concerned it was essential that the Linney be put into a proper state of repair not only for the sake of the dockers but for the old citizens of the town who would find it an amenity where they could sit and chat. He added that it was part of the old Dungarvan and it would be a pity to allow it to deteriorate.

Mr. Havens said that it was disgraceful that the Linney should have been allowed to get into its present state. He said that dockers would have no where to go to drink a cup of tea if it were to be demolished.

NEW ANGLE
 When the deputation with-drew the Council again dis-cussed the matter and Mr. A. Deasy, T.D. said it had only been decided to defer a decision at the previous meeting. At that time he was not aware that the Linney was used by the dockers but he was glad to have heard the views of the deputation on this angle.

Cllr R. O'Brien said that since the previous meeting she had taken a look at the place herself and having done so she realised that it was part of the quay and for the small cost involved it would be a pity to see it go. She added that several people in the town had spoken to her since the last meeting and said that they would be horrified to think that the Linney would be knocked down.

Cllr D. Goode who put down the original motion to have the structure repaired said that later-ly a dump had been created at the Linney. An old barrel buoy and a rusted refuse bin which did not appear to have been shifted for at least 12 months were thrown in their way. Finally on the proposal of Cllr O'Brien seconded by Deputy Deasy Cllr Goode's motion that the Linney be repaired and re-roofed at a cost of £425 was unanimously approved.
