Drift Men's Nets Seized By Bailiffs

Defiant drift net salmon fishermen from West Waterford and East Cork have pledged that "the fight for survival will continue and that a full scale protest 'fish in' will take place in Youghal Bay next Monday."
The fishermen's pledge follows last Monday's incidents at Ballycotton sparked off by the seizure of fishing nets from two Youghal boats earlier in the day by bailiffs from the Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators.
The incidents were the most serious by far since the commencement of this year's salmon fishing season already looking like the worst on record as far as catches are concerned in the Lismore No. 4 District.
The presence of a large force of uniformed gardai at Ballycotton very probably averted the development of an explosive situation while the decision to call out the Naval vessel Gramme only highlighted still further the tension of the occasion.

Harmony rules at first meeting of new Co. Council

At the first annual meeting of the new County Council of Waterford held in Dungarvan on Thursday last for the purpose of electing Chairman and Vice-Chairman and appointing Statutory Bodies members Committees everything went off with absolute harmony and there was no bitterness. The election of Cllr. Curran as Chairman and Cllr. Curran as Vice-Chairman was a foregone conclusion. The outgoing Chairman Cllr. Curran (FF) presided at the outset and his re-election was proposed by Cllr. P. Kennelly (FF) and seconded by Deputy P. Kennelly (FF). Tributes to the tremendous work done by Mr Curran during his 13 year term as Chairman of the Council and to the extremely fair manner in which he had acted were paid by members from all sides of the house.

A vote was then taken and resulted as follows: Cllr. Deasy, Harty, O'Brien, O'Connell, P. Coffey, McDonald, Walsh, Bulbulia, Carey, Collins, Quilty, (all FF) and Kyne (Lab) - 11. Cllr. Curran - Collins, Curran, Goode, P. Kennelly, Fahey, Henery, O'Riain, Armstrong, Quilty, Cahill, Healy, W. Ken-

nealy - 11. Declaring Cllr. Kyne elected as the new Chairman Cllr. Curran extended his warmest personal congratulations to him and wished him well during his term of office. All members joined in an ovation for Cllr. Kyne as he took the Chair and was invested with the chain of office by Cllr. Curran. Returning thanks for his election Cllr. Kyne said that in the local elections Fine Gael had received an overall majority of 12 votes to 11. He said he felt it incumbent on him to support them for the Chair. However they had decided to put him forward and with no strings attached he had decided to accept. Thanking them for the honour Mr. Kyne stressed that he had always been a democrat and he proposed to do things fairly and honestly as Chairman. If I do happen to make mistakes he said they will be made honestly.

At a recent meeting of the Council Cllr. Curran (FF) proposed that Cllr. Michael Harty (FF) be elected Vice-Chairman. The proposal was seconded by Cllr. P. Coffey (FF) who referred to Cllr. Harty's long association with the Council. Cllr. Curran (FF) proposed Cllr. P. Cahill (FF) pointing out that he was a long-time member of the Council a man of the people and that no member was more suitable. This was seconded by Cllr. T. Healy (FF). A vote resulted in Cllr. Harty being declared elected by 12 votes to 11 (the same as for his election). Cllr. Harty spoke in Irish and in English in returning thanks for his election.

When it came to the election of members to the various Statutory Bodies and Committees the Chairman Cllr. Kyne said that he could not be a party to complete black-out of the Fianna Fail party from these bodies as they had done the last term of office. 



PRESS COUNCIL QUERY BY DEPUTY DEASY

Mr Deasy said he thought he saw an article in The Cork Examiner where the Taoiseach had asked the Comharle Corcaigh to study the matter.

The Taoiseach agreed he had requested this association to undertake studies of matters of public importance. They did study this matter in 1972 and he had invited them to look at it again.

There had been a suggestion that a Press Council should be set up and this had been supported by journalists, but in the long run it would be a matter for the newspaper industry itself to decide on it. It was something that could not be imposed.

He had no plans to discuss this topic with the National Union of Journalists in the immediate future but a seminar would be held by Comharle Corcaigh which was an associate of the Press Council and if anything emerged from it he would take the matter up with the NUJ.
