Popular Teacher Retires - Padraig O Flannusa, life-long lover of the Gaelic language and tireless worker in the cause of its revival has retired from teaching after more than 30 years faithful service with the Vocational Education Committee. A true son of Slabh Gcua he has always maintained contact with his native place and every function of Gaelic cultural or religious significance received his unstinted support. He has a deep and abiding interest in folklore and local history and his work in that connection is tremendous. He aroused in his students a great love and pride in their own localities and so laid the foundations of true and lasting patriotism.
Two years ago at the grave of his friend and neighbour Padraig Miller he delivered eloquent and sincere oration to a large and distinguished gathering.
In connection with his work as an Irish teacher he has prepared a series of articles which are of vital importance to anyone interested in gaining a speaking knowledge of the language. He has published a full length novel in Irish 'Ghabh Leithel An -Sli Tra' which depicts vividly the life of the ordinary people of Slabh Gcua in the 19th century - their joys and sorrows, their hopes and their undying confidence in the ultimate victory of their cause.
His voice and pen have never been idle in the service of the ideal to which he has devoted his life - "Ireland Gaelic and Free".

BOUND TO PEACE SEQUEL TO ASSAULT

The whole background to the case was unfortunately, sad and tragic said District Justice W F O'Connell at Dungarvan Court on Wednesday when he heard evidence in a charge against Michael O'Brien, 19, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, of assaulting Thomas Nolan, 56 Cathal Brugha Place on July 11.
Thomas Nolan in evidence said that on the day in question he left his house around 5.30 pm to go to Pat O'Shea's shop for a bottle of lemonade on the way he met O'Brien and his sister Mary O'Brien saluted him in a sneering way and he used to say to O'Brien "Mikey you should be proud of the marks on my daughter's body".
Witness said that O'Brien replied that he had not been responsible and that what she got did herself. He said he then told O'Brien that he was going to hand the matter to a solicitor or over to the Garda's and O'Brien told him "if you take me to law I will stretch you if I'm dead". O'Brien then caught him by the throat with his two hands and pressed him against the railings behind him. He also said you're nothing but an f---ing tramp" and other things and he then struck him across the side of the face and on the head with his closed fist.
Replying to Mr J P Gordon, Solr who defended witness agreed that he had O'Brien bound to the peace in 1978. He said that his daughter was 30 years old for some time and he resented that fact. He denied that his story of the assault was a concoction of that he had just made it up to cause mischief.
LOCKED IN
Defendant in evidence said that the plaintiff's daughter had been staying in his house and that she did not like him. She came to him because she had been locked in at home. On the evening in question he met Nolan who said to him about the marks on his daughter's body and he told Nolan that he had nothing to do with them and that she had been bruised when she fell down the stairs.
Asked if he had caught Nolan by the throat or struck him defendant replied "no way" and added "if I did hit him he would definitely have been marked".
Having made the comment quoted at the outset the District Justice added that he did not know what the liaison between plaintiff's daughter and the defendant was. He said that there was not enough evidence to convict on the assault charge but O'Brien appeared to be a man who needed to be restrained.
He had sympathy for the plaintiff's daughter and the very little for O'Brien.
He then dismissed the assault charge but made an order binding the defendant to the peace for a period of 12 months.

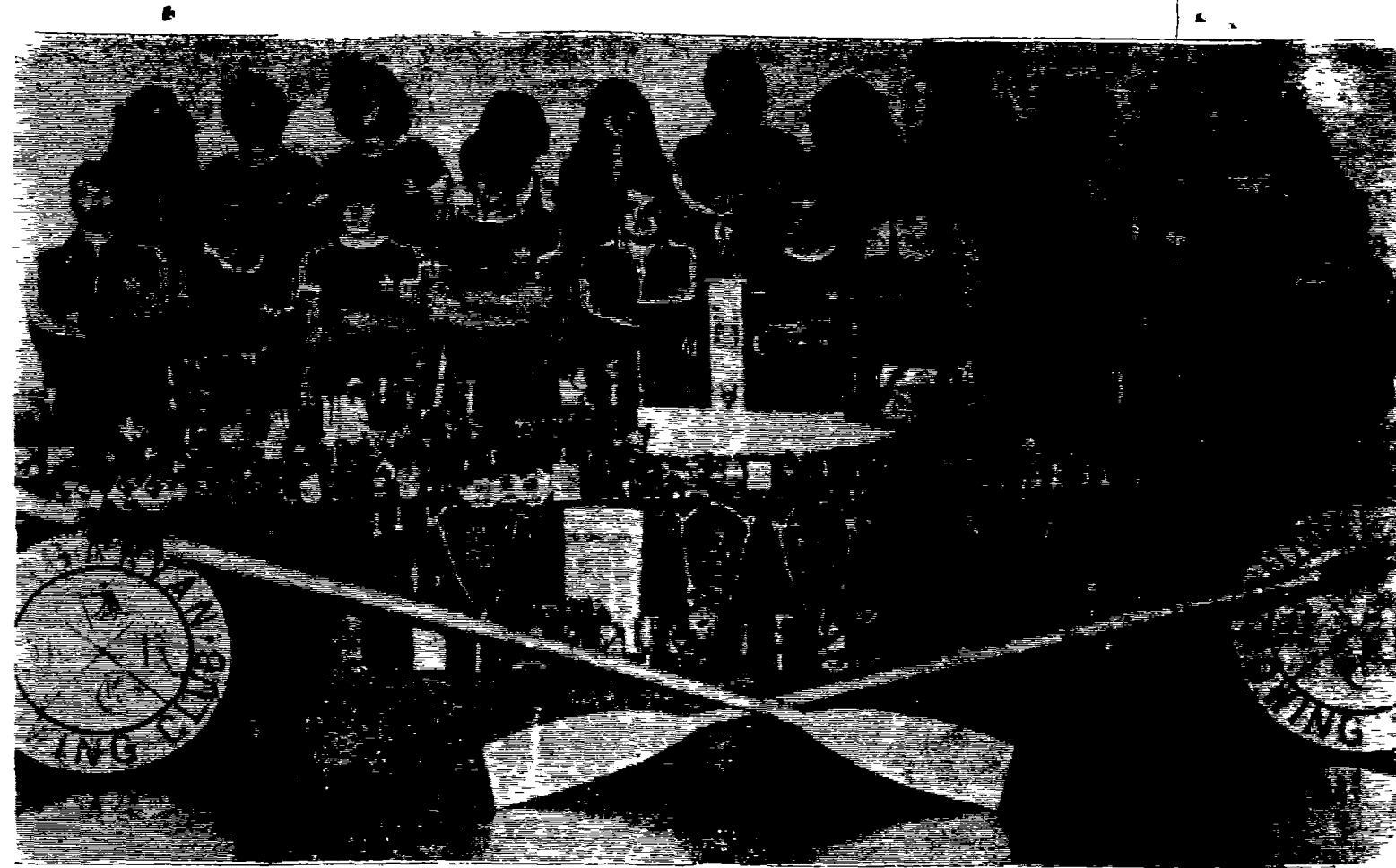

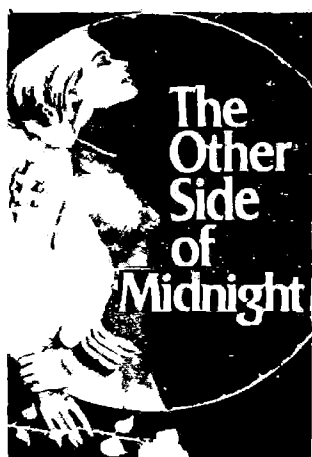



Pilgrim Pope - Pilgrim People

 A pilgrimage is not like ordinary travel. Some instinctive and spiritual impels the pilgrim to undertake a journey that costs something—money, weariness, discomfort—all of which is accepted as a penitential exercise and prayer. It is an integral part of all true pilgrimages. This autumn sees us a pilgrim people—our leader a pilgrim Pope. By a strange coincidence the pilgrimages of 29 and 30 September both converge on Cnoc Mhuire for a little hill adjoining the fifteen acres in the Phoenix Park which was formerly known as Knockmary.

Our pilgrimage may mean fatigue, scanty meals, perhaps long waiting in bad weather. Such inconvenience part of every pilgrimage worth the name are nothing compared to the hardships of Irish pilgrims in centuries when communications, transport and other facilities were primitive indeed. The generations who went before us were great people for pilgrimages. In medieval times they set out from Galway, Dingle and Waterford for Europe, trudging on foot to Rome to Compostella and even to distant Jerusalem. A letter from the Archbishop of Armagh in 1350 begged the Pope to exempt his flock from doing the same year and following. The native Irish and the Anglo-Irish were bent on killing one another he said so much so that no man dared leave his family defenceless for the year more required to make so long a journey. On the seas are pirates on the roads robbers in France warring armies and pilgrims from that island off the edge of the world. In the time of the great famine, the Irish might starve to death waiting at seaports for ships to take them home ships that might never come.

The Archbishop, an Anglo-Norman cannot have known the Irish very well. Dangers did not deter them from setting off in their grey frieze pilgrim gowns and mantles their only luggage a drinkin' bowl a stout stick and a leather pouch. The Archbishop described a fifteenth century pilgrimage that included Tomhaltach O'Connor King of Moylurg MacGeoghegan Prince of Kinealy the MacNeill and the O'Driscoll. One leading scholar of the pilgrims was that distinguished lady Margaret O'Carroll of Ely the flower of her kindred. O'Carroll was the patroness of Orally Margaret the patroness of letters and music and art the mother of orphans who did not hurry home, her pilgrimage to Compostella Rome and Jerusalem took four years to complete. Other pilgrims who left in the same year and followed the same route were the first to bring back to us that Constantinople had fallen to the Turks. Irish people knew of the disaster long before it was intimation of it reached London.

Two friends Thady O'Kelly of Hy-Manie (Wicklow) and the Maguire Mor of Fermanagh set out together for Rome in 1800. Their arrival caused no stir but their departure was sensational. They both died on the same day and the same hour while doing the rounds of the basilicas. A Roman chronicler recorded their path as having traversed the extremities of Europe and then expired during the pilgrim devotions a voice appeared to rise from them. Now O'Lord dismiss thy servants in peace because our eyes have seen thy salvation. A century later Red Hugh O'Donnell having arrived in Spain to seek help from Philip II went on a pilgrimage to Compostella the shrine of St. James Patron of Spain. He was received with honour and given rich gifts when leaving. The Prince of the North never met the King he died at Simarra on his way south.

DURING PENAL TIMES
 Fewer pilgrims ventured to Europe during penal times. Those who reached Rome in 1650 could call at the Irish College and be guided by the students as they did the pilgrimage exercises. Peter Brian Befermone Plunket of Armagh were students there that year in an Irish College in Flanders. Owen Ferris of Ballymalis Co Kerry was educated after his ordination in 1700 he went on pilgrimage to Rome Pope Innocent XII enlisted his services as a holy smuggler entrusting him with the Bulls nominating Edward Comerford Bishop of Cashel. Though Father Ferris delivered the documents safely the authorities learned of his mission and kept so close a watch on him that he had to keep constantly on the move. Irish people who were unable to go on pilgrimage to distant places did the rounds of pilgrimage centres in Ireland before the Reformation the shrines of Maigue na Gras Our Lady of Guire in Youghal Trim and Limerick were popular with pilgrims. Later these shrines were wrecked but pilgrimages to honour St. Patrick at Lough Derg and Croagh Patrick at Lough Derg at Faughart St. Declan at Ardmore and St. Gobnait at today pilgrims continue to today pilgrims still "do the rounds" at these hallowed places. The endurance of Irish pilgrims in the past and at Lough Derg and Croagh Patrick today is an inspiration to

us all. Compared with their pilgrimages ours of 29-30 September will not entail great penance but it will be a call to repentance and prayer. The Year of Christ Pastor of the Flock of God, will pray with us and for us. In the Mass the central and highest point of our pilgrimages. We shall pray through, with and in Christ Our Lord.

A UNIQUE OCCASION
 It will be a unique a once-in-a-lifetime occasion. Already one can imagine the mighty cheers that will greet the Pope who has so highly honoured our island. The first country after its own privileged Poland to welcome him into a little time each pilgrim will pack an immensity of experience and devotion a renege of faith hope and charity. Our pilgrimage prepares not only the souls journey from birth to death but also the great cavalcade of the pilgrim Church on her journey through time. We shall pray for the John's pilgrimage and ours will bring about, for Ireland and for the world the coming of that kingdom for which we so often pray. We shall pray for a kingdom of justice love and peace.

SOME MORE ABOUT SHARKS
 Between 300 and 400 species of sharks and dog fish live in our seas ranging from the very small sharks and dog fish to the second largest fish in the world. It can weigh up to over 10 tons. It depends on plankton, cruising along with open mouth the plankton being filtered as the water passes through it. The shark is the hammerhead shark and its main diet is eels, rays.
 The blue shark frequent our coast line. They feed on eels and other fish. It is usual to meet them when fishing for blues to have what is called a rubby dug tied to the anchor. This is prepared by crushing up mackerel and adding a real bloody mess and adding oil. This is put into a mesh bag so that the particles can get out into the water and thus leave a trail for the sharks to follow. The quite large shark measuring over 11 feet is the white shark.
