We add our small voice of welcome to the rapturous chorus which will swell through the whole land and make the welkin ring in welcoming Pope John Paul 11 on his historic visit to Ireland this coming week-end. Plans are all now well laid for the exception of the Vicar of Christ at each of the provincial centres which he will visit commencing when the Aer Lingus plane on which he will travel from Rome touches down in Dublin on Saturday morning. Later that day he will travel to Drogheda while on Sunday he will cross the country to Galway and then in the afternoon he will visit the Marian Shrine at Knock. On Monday morning he will be in Limerick before finally travelling on to Shannon en route to the U.S. where he will spend a further six days. To cope with the hundreds of thousands of people who will be travelling to the various centres involves a massive transport plan mainly mounted by CIE, and equally massive traffic control and security arrangements being handled by the Garda Siochana and the Army. Everything has been worked out on paper and the hope is that the theory can be effectively translated into practice without too many hitches.

For the pilgrims, the invalids and the travellers in general the state of the weather over the three days involved will be a most important factor and in this regard it is also hoped that the elements will favour this historic once-in-a-lifetime occasion. Having said that much I find I must also refer to the confusion which has been created by those who are merely interested in the Pope's visit from the commercial gain it can bring them. The spite of commercialism that has surfaced since it was officially announced that the Pope was coming has been rather worrying and embarrassing to the majority of people. The 'can't be repeated' offers of medals and medallions at 'prices to suit all tastes' are, to say the least, offensive and not at all in keeping with the spirit of the pastoral nature of the Pope's visit.

There has too been evidence of over ostentation and a greater than necessary reaction and it would appear that in some areas the authorities have been so carried away that they have gone overboard in their preparations. The provision of an acre of carpet at the Phoenix Park and the gongerring of the City's Freedom by Limerick Corporation on three other religious leaders as well as the Pope are cases in point.

Pope John Paul is not only a deeply religious priest but he is also a humble man of the people who loves his fellow man in the true tradition of Christ whose Vicar on earth he is. It is a great honour for Ireland and a wonderful privilege for all Irish people that he is coming to visit us.

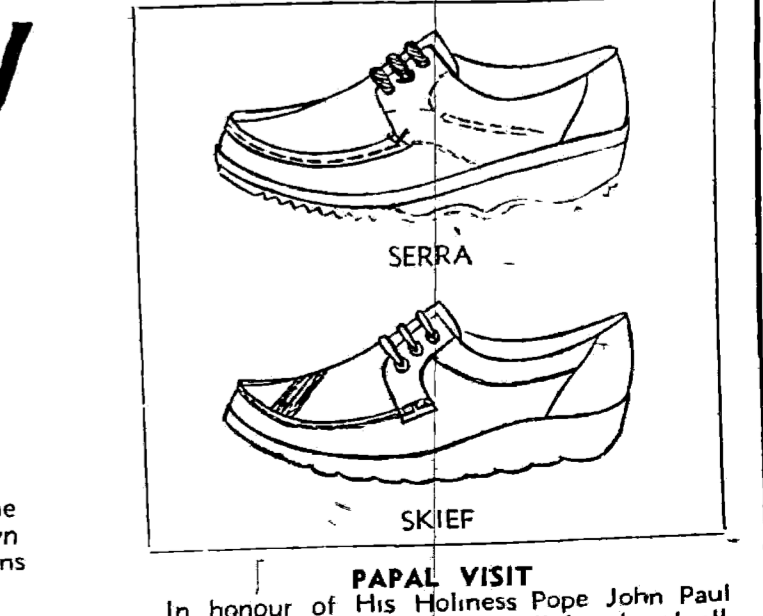

**ALL STARS**  
Congratulations to Abbeyside and Ballyduff who have qualified for the All-Stars panel which will travel to the U.S.A. on October 12th for a three match tour. Both players have won the Munster jersey and both were listed among the early nominations for selection. Both are very deserving of the honour and we join with their friends in the county in wishing both a successful tour.

**MUNSTER DRAWS**  
The Munster championship for 1979 was made at a meeting of the Munster Council on Friday night last. In football it was decided that all the four counties Waterford Tipperary Clare and Limerick would play-off for the right to meet Cork in the semi-final — the winners of this go into the final on Sunday. The idea behind the proposition was that should any of the weaker counties have to play Kerry in a first or second round the event would be a 'no contest' because of the big difference in standards.

When I discussed the decision with our Munster Delegate Tom Cunningham during the week he told me that he was very much opposed to the new arrangement and believed that it was a poor decision. Tom's opinion was that the football supporters in the weaker counties would be given the opportunity of seeing Kerry in action against their own counties even though the result would be a foregone conclusion. It would be a good thing to let the public in these counties see how good the footballers are as well as to let them appreciate the experience of playing Kerry.

Other football men with whom I have since discussed the matter are of the same opinion. However the decision is taken under the new arrangement Waterford will play Tipperary at Dungarvan and Clare will meet Limerick. The winners will meet in the quarter-final.

**SENIOR HURLING**  
In senior hurling Waterford will meet Clare and the winners will meet Limerick in the semi-final. In the other semi-final Tipperary will meet the winners of the other semi-final against Clare.

On the proposal of the Chairman Cllr R. A. Walsh Dungarvan Urban Council at their meeting last Monday night unanimously extended congratulations to schoolboy athlete Frank O'Brien Mapstown, on his recent outstanding athletic success.

**Go Councillors' Tour Of The West** — The Waterford County Councillors together with the County Engineer, Mr J. D. Hally and Council staff, toured West Waterford last Monday and visited many housing estates and the new road improvement scheme in Tallow.

**TALLOW AND ROUNDABOUT NOTES**

Councillor Willie McDonnell pointed out the burning point at Tallow bridge. He asked that a new link road be made behind Mrs Connors farmhouse to join the Fernoy and Sweep roads. Mr Hally said that this was not included in the immediate plans but said that he would look into the matter and hoped to widen the existing road at the bridge side or at the farm house end.

The Councillors visited Woodview Park where they were told that plenty of ground was available for new houses if required. Cllr McDonnell said it was an eye-sore to the people of Tallow and it presented an intolerable situation to many who had to live near it. He also questioned derelict sites in West St.

Mr Hally said he agreed with the principle of the removing of all these sites but often found it hard to act owing to ownership problems. He promised to give these problems his attention.

Cllr McDonnell thanked Mr Hally for his co-operation in these areas.

### NEW Group Account Allowance Scheme

A new allowance for electricity users

If you are 66 years or over and receiving a pension from the Department of Social Welfare or if you receive a Blind Pension or an Invalidity Pension from the Department of Social Welfare or a Disabled Persons Maintenance Allowance or a British Retirement Pension AND you are a consumer of electricity on a GROUP ACCOUNT you may be entitled to a cash allowance as an aid to meeting your electricity costs.

(A GROUP ACCOUNT is one where there are a number of slot or coin meters operating from one E.S.B. meter and the registered consumer is usually a landlord). The scheme is of particular interest to pensioners living in flats.

NOTE: A group account allowance is not payable to those in receipt of, or eligible for, a free electricity supply

### EXTRA Free Bottled Gas Refills Allowance Increased

The number of cylinder refills under this scheme is being increased to 14 refills per year from 1 October 1979 in order to bring the value of the bottled gas allowance in line with the value of the free electricity allowance. The additional refills will be divided over the year in the following manner:

- 2 EXTRA refills for the period January to April
- 1 EXTRA refill for the period May to June,
- 1 EXTRA refill for the period July to August,
- 2 EXTRA refills for the period September to December

If you are already receiving a Free Bottled Gas Allowance do not apply for the increase as additional vouchers will be issued in the near future
